

The Almighty and Compassionate God of St. Therese

I don't know about you, but I certainly wouldn't have taken any special note of last week's first reading from the prophet Isaiah unless it didn't already mean something to me personally. "For thus says the LORD: Lo, I will spread prosperity over Jerusalem like a river, and the wealth of the nations like an overflowing torrent. As nurslings, you shall be carried in her arms, and fondled in her lap; as a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you; in Jerusalem you shall find your comfort." (Is 66:12-13)

What makes this passage special to me is that it was beloved by St Therese of Lisieux—"the Little Flower". In fact, when she discovered it by accident, (since it was not read in the Mass before the 1960's), she knew that God was confirming to her what she called her "way". She was so taken with the phrase, "you shall be carried in her arms", that she understood immediately that her intuition about the infinite tenderness and compassion of God was well justified. She deduced from this that she was right to teach those who would listen that we must have supreme trust in God, surrendering ourselves to His goodness with the confidence that a tiny child has in its mother. Even more to the point, it is precisely because of our weakness and our helplessness that God comes to us, our God, who is moved, not by our imagined strength, but by our very need.

Therese died in 1897 at age 24, and we can now be sure that her intuition was more than wishful thinking on the part of a naive young nun. The millions of people devoted to her, the countless miracles ascribed to her, and the formal recognition by all the Popes of the 20th century, culminating in her being declared a Doctor of the Church, all prove that God was speaking to the world, the Church, and to us, through her.

St. Therese knew, not through emotions, but by faith, that God was infinitely and supremely tender, and that we should trust Him, not because we feel or think we are strong, but because we are not, and we need His help. She knew that the spiritual life consists, not in making a good show for God, but in letting Jesus see our weaknesses so He can heal us and save us. But Therese's God isn't the harmless Teddy Bear that sometimes our contemporary culture wants to reduce Him to, demanding neither morality nor obedience, reverence nor worship. The God of Therese, our God, is the all-powerful Lord of the Universe and our Creator, He to Whom we owe everything good-whether that good is inside of us or outside of us. But if He is all powerful Lord, He is all powerful Father, He is infinite Mercy, He is Crucified Savior. Teddy Bear gods can't save us, but our Almighty Father can and does.

Catholic life isn't a painkiller for life's problems, it's a roadmap to learn to trust God and love Him in spite of, and even because of them, transforming them into victory. Trusting God means letting Him take us in His arms. But how do we do this practically? The answer is in all the myriad ways He wants to help us be close to Him: daily prayer, Confession, devotion to Mary and the saints, Scripture reading, holy friendships, and so forth. God is not waiting for us to be perfect so that He can start loving us, He is waiting for us to admit we need Him, that we are sinners, and that we acknowledge to ourselves that we need a Savior. There's a reason why Jesus said, 'unless you become like little children, you will not enter the Kingdom of heaven'. Or, as St. Therese puts it: 'We can never have too much trust in a God who is so powerful and so good.'

No es tan difícil vivir los mandamientos; es posible y no necesariamente tenemos que referir a cada uno de los diez mandamientos para ver si estemos viviéndolos. Están a nuestro alcance si seamos personas de amor—un amor a Dios que nos transforma, haciéndonos personas que aman a otros. Viviendo en el amor de Dios y conociendo ese amor tanto, vamos a poder transmitir ese amor a otras personas. El mandamiento de amar o mejor dicho el amor está en el corazón y desea entregarse a otras personas. Desde el corazón el amor entra la boca y los brazos y las piernas para que seamos personas que viven el amor, usando toda nuestra persona. De a poco vamos cambiándonos y el precepto de amar no es tanto un precepto pero se pone una actitud nuestra—algo tan normal, que no hay necesidad de recordarnos: tengo que amar a tal persona—sea amigo o enemigo. Voy a amarlo. Está a nuestro alcance; está en nuestra boca y en nuestro corazón. No será algo que tengo que pensar: ¿voy a amar a Fulano? Por supuesto voy a tratar al otro con amor.

Hay que llenarnos con la Palabra de Dios y un reconocimiento del amor de Dios en nuestras vidas diarias. Así Dios realizará su voluntad en nuestras vidas. Solamente tenemos que estar atentos a su palabra y así responderemos por amar a nuestro prójimo como en el evangelio de hoy.

Puede preguntarse: ¿Oro para que pueda conocer a Dios más íntimamente y experimentar ese amor profundo de Dios para mí? ¿Dejo a Dios cuestionarme y transformarme o quiero yo estar encargado de todo? ¿Me dejo estar sorprendido(a) por las acciones de Dios en mi persona, la comunidad y la Iglesia? ¿Realmente muestro el amor a otras personas, a todas las personas?
