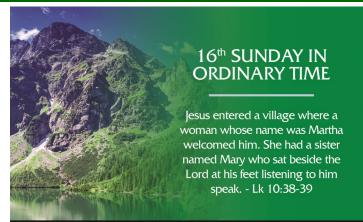

We need air to breathe, we need God to live.



We need to pray every day—no matter what. There's no way to 'soft sell' this point. Just the opposite—if we're not doing it, we need to start. It doesn't matter at what stage of life we

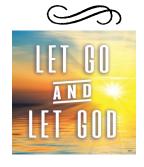
are, young or old. It doesn't matter where we are in our relationship with God—if we feel far from him or near, if we struggle with big sins or small, if we are angry at God or grateful. No matter what happens in our life, we still eat and drink every day and breathe air. These are basic functions for living biologically. Prayer is the basic function for living spiritually.

First of all, the prayer I mean here is not a technique, it is *talking to Someone*. Clearing our minds and getting in touch with our feelings are important and this is one of the purposes of prayer. However, prayer can't be reduced to these psychological aims. We need to pray every day because God created us, he loves us and saves us, and especially because we need his help. God is, quite literally, always thinking of us, otherwise we couldn't exist! When we pray, we're making ourselves aware that Someone sees us, that Someone loves us, and that Someone wants to help us... and we are opening ourselves to this Someone's help, without which we can do nothing for ourselves in terms of our own spiritual growth and salvation.

Many Catholics feel bashful or embarrassed if they don't pray often, as if they have no right to start if they haven't been doing it. Wrong! God is waiting for us. How can we start then? An easy and powerful way is to make the sign of the cross when we wake up or are getting out of bed and say, "Jesus, help me and be with me today". Then we could say the Our Father. When we're going to bed, we could pray the Hail Mary, before which we could say, "Lord, thank you for helping me today". This won't take more than a minute and a half, total. But it's a start, and we are letting God into our life. Even if there are some serious problems in our life, we can begin to pray like this.

God created us to bless us and give Himself to us. We must learn to accept this Gift, without which our life has no meaning, purpose, nor potential for authentic happiness. Young people and teens especially need to learn this 'live or die' truth. There is too much darkness in the world and even in our own hearts to shut out the Light that is Jesus. We need to pray every day, if only for a minute and a half, no matter what. We need *air* to *breathe*, we need *God* to *live*.

Hospitalidad en Nuestra Comunidad

Piensa en qué pasa cuando tú entras la iglesia cada semana para participar en la celebración de la Eucaristía. Algunas personas están dándote la bienvenida, saludándote, preguntando por la familia, tu salud y el trabajo. Tú eres un individuo, no un número. Tú tienes un nombre; tú has hecho varias cosas en tu vida; tienes algunos gustos y deseos y el ministro de hospitalidad debe reconocerte como un individuo. Para ser una comunidad debemos conocernos y es importante que hagamos conexiones. Cuando una familia nueva llega, es importante darle la bienvenida y aprender sus nombres para poder dirigirte a ellos por nombre para que todos podamos conocer a los nuevos y tratar a ellos con respeto y amor.

¿Tenemos algo en común con todos que están en la comunidad? No siempre. Si tengamos amor, vamos a sentirnos más conectados con los demás en la comunidad a pesar de diferencias. Vamos a reconocer la presencia de Dios en la otra persona y vamos a querer responder a sus necesidades.

Piensa en la primera lectura de hoy. Abraham estaba sentado en la entrada de su tienda, y llegaron tres hombre en la hora del calor. El ruega a ellos detenerse, sentarse y comer, y él los sirve a ellos. ¡Qué hospitalidad! Tan acogedor fue Abraham. Él no los conoció, pero los recibió completamente con mucho cariño. El no cuestionó las intenciones de los forasteros; él se abrió a ellos y realmente a Dios en ellos. Para él esta hospitalidad fue necesario; él estaba dando descanso, alimento y amor a Dios. Realmente Abraham estaba creando un ambiente de hospitalidad donde era muy posible valorar a la otra persona; él tenía un interés en ellos, y su bienestar.

Espero que cada uno de nosotros tenga una sensibilidad a las necesidades y deseos del otro y que respondamos a ellos. Si hay alguien nuevo, preséntate a ellos, preséntales a otras personas, enséñale donde es el baño o los boletines o las oraciones en el cancionero. Posiblemente vas a poder anticipar sus necesidades sin que ellos tienen que preguntar. Así es la hospitalidad. De a poco pueden ir formando relaciones. Algunas personas son muy tímidas y no van a poder formar una relación de amistad sin la ayuda de otra persona. Tú puedes ser esa otra persona—la persona que puede encontrar algunos dones en la otra e invitarle usarlos por el bien de la comunidad. Como cristiano debe ser persona de amor y atento a los demás. Que sea agradecido por cada individuo en la comunidad—cómo es y qué don entrega a la comunidad.

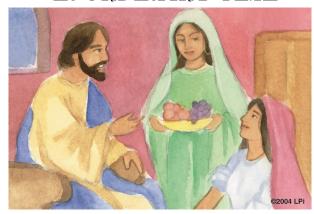


FALL RUMMAGE SALE

No Salt Vegetables: *corn, green Beans, carrots, peas mixed veg. beets & spinach*Light In Syrup, Unsweetened Fruits: *pineapple, pears, fruit mix, applesauce, mandarin oranges, cranberry sauce*Low Sodium Soups: *chicken, creamed , vegetable, tomato, misc.*
