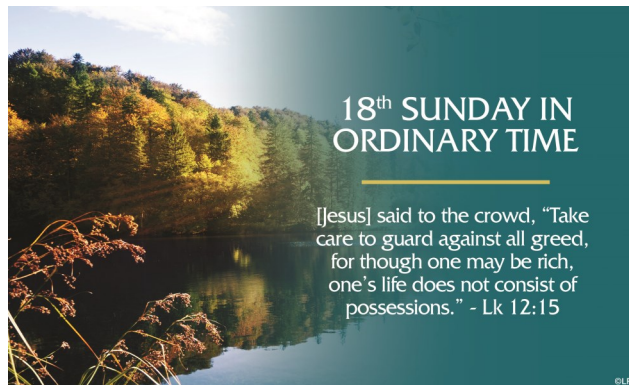

Passing the Test of Life God's Way

My dear People,

No one likes tests! Or, I should say, most people don't. There are those select few among us who delight in the opportunity to have their skills challenged under pressure. If we broaden our definition of tests, many more of us don't mind as much as we might think. After all, athletes are tested every time they play a game, they either win or lose. Many challenges, physical or intellectual, offer the occasion of victory. If we don't like tests, we can all admit that we like the feeling of succeeding in something difficult that could have turned out otherwise.

Tests of all sorts are important because they set goals and hold us accountable. A life without any real goals and without any consequences to our choices might appear easy at first, but in the end would be horribly depressing and discouraging. **Without goals and consequences, it would mean that *nothing we do really mattered at all, that our choices have no real impact, and that nothing is worth striving for or even living for.***

Some people think that because God loves us He won't judge us severely, even if we do bad things that we don't repent of. But if we analyze this for a moment, that would mean that *God doesn't really care what we do, and that our choices don't matter to Him. It would mean that He has no goal for our life, and that nothing is worth striving for.* Communism seemed like a golden path to universal economic success, until they found out that no one worked hard if what they did didn't matter to anyone at all and had no effect whatsoever.

God loves us very much, and this is why *what we do matters to Him.* This is why He takes our choices so seriously. And it is for this reason that He is so quick to forgive us if we are sorry, to reward us for whatever little good we do for Him, for every suffering offered to Him, and every kindness to our neighbor for His sake. If life is a game that we win or lose, it's a game that we play *with God on our side.* Who wants to help us win and get to heaven at all costs. **Even if we may not always feel like it, God has set things up so we can win easily by all the assistance He offers us in things such as the Sacraments, (like Confession, Communion), the prayers of Mary and the Saints, and the graces He offers to help us rise when we fall and to keep going.**

I said God wants to bring us to heaven at *all costs.* What has it cost God? The Blood of His Son, Jesus Christ. He has paid the cost more dearly than we ever will. Whatever it may cost *us* to "put to death immorality," as St. Paul tells us in our second reading, and to invest in heaven, it is well worth it. God wants to help us win the ultimate test of life for an eternal victory, let's work *with Him,* and not *against Him!* God bless you.

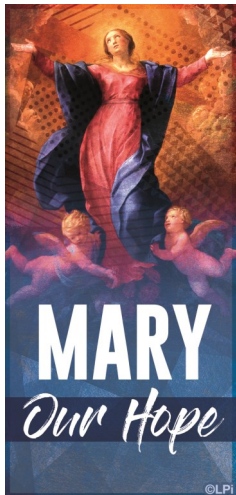

**Día de Acción Católica para los
Hijos de Inmigrantes**

Protestas de no-violencia fueron la manera por la cual Mohandas Gandhi obtuvo la independencia del país de India. Hoy en día este tipo de protesta todavía puede lograr algo positivo. El 18 de julio hubo en Washington, D.C. afuera del edificio del Senado una protesta de unas 200 personas de fe: monjas, sacerdotes, hermanos y otras abogando por la justicia y compasión para los inmigrantes y niños de refugiados. Estos están detenidos en lugares sucios y con poca comida y pocas cosas para higiene personal, como si fueran criminales. Afuera del edificio algunas monjas daban discursos y todos cantaron y oraron. E. J. Dione escribió un editorial con el título: "Para los inmigrantes una luz en la oscuridad." El describió la situación. Después de los discursos, como 70 personas entraron la rotunda del edificio, con algunas acostándose, haciendo una cruz y otras no se movían cuando les pidieron salir. La policía arrestó este grupo, incluyendo como 10 Hermanas de la Misericordia (mi congregación religiosa), incluyendo dos de mi grupo de Rochester. Las hermanas dijeron que es importante poner su cuerpo donde están sus palabras. Un escritor católico dijo, "Fue obvio que la policía no se sentía bien poniendo esposas en las manos de monjas de 80 años. Ha sido un tiempo oscuro para nuestra iglesia, pero cuando se ve una hermana de 90 años con esposas y un rosario en sus muñecas, me da esperanza."

Pedimos a nuestro Dios de amor que muestre a las autoridades cómo tratar bien a los extranjeros y niños. Tenemos que terminar el tratamiento inhumano de otras personas especialmente los niños que tienen que dormir en el piso sin poder limpiar sus cuerpos, dientes y pelo. El gobierno no está actuando en nuestro nombre.

Debemos dar la bienvenida a los extranjeros entre nosotros. Cristo dijo que él era el extranjero a quien ustedes me dieron la bienvenida. ¿Cómo tratamos al extranjero sabiendo que en esa persona vive Cristo? En Éxodo dice, "No maltratarás, ni oprimirás a los extranjeros, ya que también ustedes fueron extranjeros en tierra de Egipto." ¿Olvidamos que nuestros antepasados vinieron de otros países buscando una vida mejor?
