Christian Joy



My Dear People,

In the last article on gratitude, I made an important distinction. The gratitude of a Christian is more than ‘staying positive’ or being optimistic, it is *supernatural*. This distinction is even more pivotal to understand joy.

Christian joy comes, above all, from the Holy Spirit.



In his letter to the Galatians, St. Paul lists it as a fruit of the Spirit. But the immediately preceding passage reminds us of a crucial and lifesaving fact that our contemporary culture wants us to forget: this joy can only come after we *repent of sin*. In other words, true joy and being in opposition to God’s plan for us in the moral life cannot go hand in hand.

Pleasure is ‘cheap’, joy is not. Pleasure can come, both from good things as well as bad. Sharing a finely prepared meal with those we love, travelling to interesting places, watching or playing a favorite sport, reading an interesting book, all these things are pleasurable, and they are also *good*. But doing drugs, cheating in marriage, and stealing money can also be pleasurable, and they are *bad*. And here is where we see the difference between pleasure and joy. Joy is not cheap, and if it is a gift, it is also *earned*. **Pleasure can come from our senses, but joy is something spiritual which is caused by the possession of a true and authentic good which fulfills the deepest longings of our hearts. In other words, joy comes when we possess God and His friendship.** Joy comes from the knowledge of being loved by a God who has blessed us with His salvation and His grace. It is ‘earned’ because we have been willing to let go of sin, we have humbled ourselves in repentance.

A friend of mine currently studying for the priesthood had a life changing experience in a mission trip to South America in High School. Leaving his comfortable and self-satisfied suburban world, he encountered real poverty for the first time. But what he also encountered was that these people who had none of the things that he thought he needed to make him happy, *had something he had never really seen before—joy*. Whatever they lacked, they possessed God, and they knew it. His journey to the priesthood began at that moment.

The place where we are guaranteed to find joy is in the Sacrament of Confession. There, we name our sins, repent of them, and receive, not only God’s forgiveness, mercy and healing, but especially, and overwhelmingly, His joy. It is a foretaste of the life of heaven, a preview of eternal happiness. Our culture can promise and deliver all sorts of pleasures, some never known to man before our day. *But only Jesus Christ can give joy.* Repentance, gratitude, joy—this is our inheritance as Christians. God is not frugal with His gifts. May we not fear to receive them.

Our Tradition of Mass Intentions

One of the traditions of our Church is offering Mass intentions for our deceased family and friends. You can find these listed in the bulletin and they are spoken out loud during the Prayers of the Faithful. *We have Masses available in the coming weeks.* Please note that for daily Masses, these can sometimes be scheduled within a couple of weeks while the Sunday Masses are often scheduled months in advance. You might ask why we have Mass intentions. It is not simply a token of respect. The idea of offering the intention is that their time in Purgatory be swift and easy. When we celebrate Mass, the sacrifice of Jesus giving his life on the Cross is made present for us. In offering the Mass intention, we are offering sacrifice for our loved one. You will also find intentions that are "for the people of the parish". This is an intention that each pastor is required to offer by Canon Law for the parishioners he leads. *All you have to do to schedule a Mass intention is call the parish office.* A \$10 stipend is requested.
