An Easy Way to Start Praying

My Dear People,




Many people have trouble **knowing where to start when it comes to praying.** Let’s be honest, this is a normal reaction, since prayer is *speaking to God*, and God is, by His nature, *invisible*. Some people wait to pray until some ideal combination of emotional and spiritual conditions intersect to provide the ‘right moment.’ I think (from my experience speaking with people), that a lot more people struggle with this than admit openly. Here’s an easy solution: **the rosary.**

The rosary is a very simple prayer—at its core merely saying the Our Father and Hail Mary (you can’t get much simpler than that to start), while thinking about certain events in the life of Jesus and Mary. Some people think the rosary is *too simple!* Or, because it’s so easy to get distracted when praying it, they give up trying to say it, thinking it’s just not worth it. **Let me make a very important point, it is much better to pray badly, than to not pray at all.** Not praying because we get distracted is like not eating because the food isn’t perfectly nutritious and organic. No one would withhold feeding a starving person until the ideal food was found. God knows we are trying, and certainly Our Lady does as well. That’s the point!

We are all children in our faith, however old we may be. Children are part of a family and get help from their parents and brothers and sisters. Our spiritual life is the same in God’s plan; we come to Jesus (and through Him to the Trinity) with the help of our spiritual family. **Praying the rosary (even badly), is our way of taking Mary’s hand and allowing her to bring us to Jesus, and all His saving acts.** The “Mysteries” of the Rosary are not empty historical events or charming mythologies, but living and powerful moments of salvation history which we ‘touch’ by faith. In fact, we are *entering into them* and getting untold blessings and graces through the hands of Mary.

Saying “I need to pray more” (or pray at all) will likely remain a vague, unaccomplished ideal, but saying “I need to say a decade of the rosary every day” is very doable. How many blessings will come from the easy fulfillment of this little resolution! It’s likely we’re not going to experience spiritual ecstasy when we begin to pray it, but that’s not what a true relationship is about, even with God. Relationships are about communication, and the rosary teaches us to *talk to Jesus through Mary*. Don’t wait until things are ‘perfect’ to pray the rosary—**begin today.** Mary is waiting to shower Heaven’s blessings upon us and intercede with Jesus for all of our needs. Make Our Lady happy, and let her help you to know, love and serve Jesus!

Our Tradition of Mass Intentions

One of the traditions of our Church is offering Mass intentions for our deceased family and friends. You can find these listed in the bulletin and they are spoken out loud during the Prayers of the Faithful. *We have Masses available in the coming weeks.* Please note that for daily Masses, these can sometimes be scheduled within a couple of weeks while the Sunday Masses are often scheduled months in advance. You might ask why we have Mass intentions. It is not simply a token of respect. The idea of offering the intention is that their time in Purgatory be swift and easy. When we celebrate Mass, the sacrifice of Jesus giving his life on the Cross is made present for us. In offering the Mass intention, we are offering sacrifice for our loved one. You will also find intentions that are "for the people of the parish". This is an intention that each pastor is required to offer by Canon Law for the parishioners he leads. *All you have to do to schedule a Mass intention is call the parish office.* A \$10 stipend is requested.

¿Cómo Reciben el Mensaje Sobre Jesús?

Si tuviera que comunicar la verdad a otros sobre quién es Jesús, ¿qué dirías? ¿Cuáles acciones muestran mejor el tipo de persona que era?

Jesús envió doce discípulos para enseñar. Él tenía el poder y usaba su poder, pero a la vez dio poder a los doce— poder de echar demonios y sanar los enfermos. No hacía eso solamente para que la gente pensara bien de él. Estas acciones fueron conectadas con el Reino de Dios. Es lo que quería hacer Jesús—dar a conocer cómo es vivir en un mundo o un ambiente gobernado por el amor y las leyes de Dios—donde reinaba Dios.

¿Se acuerdan cuando Jesús envió a sus doce discípulos para ser misioneros? Estaban aprendiendo; es parecido a los que estudian educación en el colegio; primero estudian y después tienen que practicar cómo enseñar por hacerlo en una sala de clase. Los discípulos tuvieron que ir de pueblo a pueblo sin tener provisiones. Tenían que ser dependientes de los que querían convertir a Jesús. Ustedes saben cómo ustedes responden a los que llegan a su puerta sin invitación previa. Quizás ustedes tienen paciencia o impaciencia. Van pensando: ¿Por qué esta persona está, y realmente no quiero escuchar su mensaje? Me parece que él tiene hambre y sed, y va a pedir algo para comer. ¿Por qué está caminando en el campo sin haber comido y por qué no está trabajando? Están dependiendo de otros. ¿Su mensaje tiene valor? ¿Bastante valor que voy a darle comida?

Sí, los discípulos tenían que depender de la hospitalidad de los que estaban escuchándolos. Para las personas que tomaban el tiempo con uno o dos de los doce, valía la pena, valía el tiempo gastado; el mensaje de Cristo y su mensaje tenía el poder de cambiar las vidas de los oyentes. Después de escuchar y creer, seguramente los oyentes querían dar comida a los discípulos porque ellos habían recibido comida espiritual.

Para nosotros en 2019, ¿queremos escuchar el mensaje sobre Jesús y vivir según ello? ¿Queremos conocer personalmente a Jesucristo, tener una relación íntima o estamos impacientes y no queremos que alguien nos habla de Jesucristo? ¿Es real Jesús en su vida o solamente una idea que tenemos que creer? Siéntese con Jesús en oración y descubre cómo es y lo que él desea para usted. *Hermana Kay*
