The Beginning of Wisdom My Dear People,

Last week I wrote to you about the difference between *information and wisdom*. We are inundated with *information*, noise and data, and yet

we are desperately in need of *wisdom*. You're not going to find this sort of wisdom on the News, in self-help books or in the checkout line of a store. This is why I encouraged you to get and actually read from the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*. Even the bible references alone make it worth your time. But what about wisdom itself? How do we get it? Reading the Catechism is certainly a good start, but it's not the only ingredient necessary.

The book of Proverbs contains a famous phrase which offers us a key insight: The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom (Proverbs 9:10). Many times, you find that the bible qualifies as good, or 'just', those people who 'fear the Lord'. Fear is not a positive word for us. We typically fear things which are evil and can harm us, and so we avoid them. This is not what the fear of God is, in other words, avoiding Him. But we can 'fear' someone who is good, *out of respect*, as in a coach, a teacher, or a parent. We can fear offending them, or hurting them, or displeasing them.

The Bible highly prizes this 'fear of the Lord'. For example, Psalm 34, v. 11 invites: *Come, children, harken* to me, I will teach you the fear of the Lord. Now, if the biblical 'fear' isn't fright, there is a connection between our ordinary meaning. Truly great, overwhelming or powerful things normally produce in us a reaction of awe and respect. A lion, the ocean, or even human love can be 'frightening'. We should have a healthy respect for what is magnificent, awesome (in the true sense) or untamable. Authentic love should make us respect another person. The biblical fear of the Lord is all of these and more. At its root it is a holy respect and *reverence* for God who is all powerful and all good. This reverence towards the supreme holiness and 'otherness' of God lays the foundation for any ordered relationship with Him.

Unfortunately, modern Western society has in many ways lost any real respect for God. For many young people the idea that there is an All Powerful God who will hold them accountable for their actions, has a plan for them, and to Whom they owe worship is not even remotely in their world view. If "me" is the center of the universe, then God certainly can't be Lord. Respect is needed for love, as every happily (or unhappily) married couple knows. **Reverence for God is needed to know and love Him**. This is true wisdom, or its beginning at least, and the foundation of our salvation and eternal happiness. Let's all be truly *wise* Christians.

Octubre: Mes de Conciencia Nacional del Cáncer del Seno

¿Quién desea tener la enfermedad de cáncer? Creo que nadie, pero en los Estados Unidos el cáncer en los senos es el segundo más común cáncer en las mujeres. Más de 40,000 mujeres mueren de esto cada año. Recién una periodista muy conocida, Cokie Roberts, murió de esto.

Me acuerdo muy bien cuando yo fui por una mamografía hace diez años y tuvieron que hacer el examen dos veces y tercera vez con ultrasonido y biopsia para investigar y asegurarse. Después me llegó la llamada de la médica diciendo que tenía tumores cancerosos en el seno. Mi reacción después de colgar el teléfono fue: "¿Dios, que quieres de mí ahora?" Bueno, ustedes saben que tuve cirugía y una mastectomía y me sacaron nódulos linfáticos de un brazo. Aquí estoy hoy día sin cáncer espero, y siguiendo mi ministerio entre y con ustedes.

Yo aconsejo a mujeres especialmente: que vayan cada año a tener una mamografía. (Siempre yo tenía una cada año.) Así por la mamografía descubrieron mi cáncer y pudieron tratarlo por la cirugía. Pero hay otras maneras de reducir la posibilidad de tener el cáncer del seno: mantener un peso saludable, estar físicamente activo, comer frutas y vegetales, evitar el uso de alcohol, no fumar, no usar píldoras anti-conceptivas, y consultar a su doctor sobre los riesgos de reemplazo de hormonas en el cuerpo. Así se puede tener más confianza en no tener cáncer. Hay que mantenerte bien físicamente.

Yo creo que Dios respondió a mi pregunta: "Yo quiero que tú sigas respondiendo a mi pueblo con mucho cariño, y que ayudes a ellos conocerme y amarme más."


