True Progress

My Dear People, The twentieth century has brought the greatest advances in science, medicine, and health in human history. When the 20th century began, few places even had electricity. In thirty short years, not only had electricity become nearly universal, but likewise the telephone, x-rays, radio, films, and the airplane. When the century closed, the computer alone created a different world than had existed in 1900. But if humanity has made such progress in technology, has it progressed in morals?

Last week, I wrote to you about the Rosary, mentioning that Our Lady appeared in 1917 in Fatima, Portugal, to three shepherd children asking them to pray the rosary. This year—1917—was a critical year for several reasons. It came during the height of the First World War, and it marked the beginning of the Communist Revolution in Russia. Not only did Mary ask the children, (and through them, the world) to pray for peace, she also said that people must stop offending God, "Who is already too much offended". Now, in 1917, most parts of the world were still religious in some form or other. But soon atheistic Communism was to take over an entire portion of the globe, bringing about a situation where a large percentage of humanity would deny that God even existed. As the years sped by, fewer and fewer people were concerned with God, the practice of the Faith, or with living according to the morality of the Gospel. By the end of the century, Communism had collapsed as an economic and political system in certain places, but atheistic materialism took the place of religion in many Western nations. The brilliant light of electricity illumined our towering cities, but in the hearts of so many, the light of Faith had been extinguished. Antibiotics brought life to those whose illness once meant certain death, but immortal souls languished without the medicine of Eternal Truth.

God, however, is not overcome by sin. From the vantage point of eternity, He had a plan and antidote for this confusion: devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. A mother's heart is a refuge for her children, protecting them, watching over them, and helping them. If Mary's pure heart was prepared by the Holy Spirit to become the Mother of our Savior, it was likewise prepared to love every single person for whom the Precious Blood of her Son was spilt-you and me. If a mother's love is allpowerful, what can we say of the love of the Queen of all Mothers? At Fatima, Mary taught the little children this simple prayer: My God, I believe, I adore, I trust, and I love Thee. I beg pardon for those who do not believe, do not adore, do no trust, and do not love Thee. That we would pray this angelic prayer daily! Jesus found refuge as a child in the sweet love of His Mother, Mary. May her Immaculate Heart be our refuge in life and in death. Fr Walter





Hands of Christ: The Hands of Christ is a recognition program of the Diocese of Rochester which helps to assist parishes in affirming their high school seniors who have been the "Hands of Christ" in their church, home, school and community; it is sponsored by the Department of Evangelization and Catechesis.

If you would like to nominate a 2020 graduating senior for this award, please pick up a nomination form, which are in the gathering space, or stop by the Parish Center to pick one up. Once all nominations are received by the deadline, the senior will then be contacted by mail with a letter explaining the award. Any youth nominated will be asked to write an essay about why they feel they should be considered for this recognition, being nominated does not mean they will receive the award.

All nominations need to be received by <u>October 27, 2019</u>. <u>Nominations will not be accepted after this date</u>, as we have to contact the youth and give them time to write their essays. After all essays are received, the parish staff will decide on the recipients of the award.

Beginning this year, any seniors who receive the Hands of Christ Award will also receive a scholarship award from St. Michael Parish.

Please keep in mind the following criteria for someone to receive this award:

- Has **<u>consistently</u>** demonstrated a Christian attitude by word and example.
- Has been <u>actively involved</u> in the parish as well as their school or community.
- Has been a **<u>positive role model</u>** to their peers, younger children and adults.
- Is a **<u>practicing Roman Catholic</u>** in a parish in the Diocese of Rochester and <u>attends Mass.</u>
