HOLY HOUR



My Dear People,

Last weekend in my homily in Newark and Lyons I spoke about the importance of parents and grandparents praying for the return to the Faith of their children and grandchildren. These prayers are powerful and God listens. But while the Church is divine, and will last until the end of time, the Faith of individuals can and does die. What is at stake is not the health of the *Church*, but the spiritual and eternal health of *future generations*.

There are many reasons why younger people don't practice the Faith, not the least of which is a culture hostile to basic principles and morals of the Gospel. But it's not only the culture as cause, it's also an unspoken attitude that has subtly permeated *within*. There are different ways of describing it, but I like to call it "self-help Catholicism". Meaning, the Faith is first about "me" and what I decide to make of it, like other things I buy and choose to make my life "comfortable" and pleasant. In a wealthy, consumer culture, religion becomes another option among many. This attitude, even if many people wouldn't admit it, is the way they have come to frame and determine their practice of the Faith. And let's be honest, even priests have promoted it! At first, it sells.

But what is at stake here is much deeper. The question is: can I determine what the Faith is- is it really up to me? Can I decide what I like and dislike, and then reject what doesn't suit me? Is church, Mass or God something purely therapeutic? In other words, *is my relationship with God on God's terms or mine?* But what is more to the point is that "Self-help Catholicism" reduces the Church to a merely human organization that has no capacity or even right to mediate my relationship with God. I'm not accountable to anyone. If the Church presents things I don't like, then it must be wrong, because anything that makes me feel bad can't be true. There are clever ways to package this which seem reasonable, *but in the end, I decide who God is and what the Church should do and say.*

But Christ said: "I am the way, the truth and the life," not "follow your own path." He began His announcement of the Kingdom of God by the words: "repent and believe." not "stay comfortable and decide for yourself." And either Jesus established the Catholic Church to guide us, teach us, help us, and bring *us to Him and Him to us*, or it is a merely human organization with no authority besides what we give it.

There is a reason our churches have a crucifix in the center. It's not self-help, it's God-help. Faith requires obedience. Obedience is hard. But so is dying on a Cross. The cross, obedience, don't always sell, but they save. And sometimes, comfort can kill.

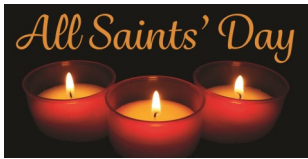

award, please pick up a nomination form, which are in the
gathering space, or stop by the Parish Center to pick one up.
Once all nominations are received by the deadline, the senior
will then be contacted by mail with a letter explaining the
award. Any youth nominated will be asked to write an essay
about why they feel they should be considered for this recogni-
tion, being nominated does not mean they will receive the
award.

All nominations need to be received, TODAY, October 27,
2019. Nominations will not be accepted after this date, as we
have to contact the youth and give them time to write their
essays.

After all essays are received, the parish staff will decide on the
recipients of the award.

Beginning this year, any seniors who receive the Hands of
Christ Award will also receive a scholarship award from St.
Michael Parish.

Please keep in mind the following criteria for someone to re-
ceive this award:

- Has **consistently** demonstrated a Christian attitude by
word and example.
- Has been **actively involved** in the parish as well as their
school or community.
- Has been a **positive role model** to their peers, younger
children and adults.
- Is a **practicing Roman Catholic** in a parish in the Diocese
of Rochester and attends Mass.
- Is currently a **high school senior.**
