

Feast of Christ the King

My Dear People, Of the four Gos

Of the four Gospels, St John alone records certain details of the mysterious conversation between Pontius Pilate and Christ during the Savior's passion. Facing the subtle interrogation of Pilate, Christ responds to the question of His kingship by saying that His kingdom is not of this world. But the shrewd Pilate, sensing evasion in Christ's answer as tacit acknowledgement of a higher sovereignty, probes again- "So you are a King?" And with noble and quiet dignity Christ declares: "You say that I am a King, for this was I born, and for this I came into the world, to bear witness to the truth." Jesus does not need to receive human approval to lay claim to power. He does not come to barter authority from earthly rulers. He is Lord by His very nature as God. But it is a curious and disconcerting Royalty. Earthly Kings conquer territory by shedding other men's blood in battle. This King, to whom everything belongs by right from the beginning of the world, sheds not the blood of other men, but His own. The territory He would conquer is not the soil of some foreign region, but the soil of the human soul and heart. To claim a land for their own, rulers plant their flag as a sign of conquest. But the flag that Christ plants into the tender soil of the human heart is His Cross.

For indeed the human heart had become a land and territory foreign and alien to God. No prophet, no earthly King could ultimately reestablish God's reign in this inhospitable domain. But God's goodness and wisdom were greater than man's sin. And so He did not send an emissary or prophet to fix the disorder that humanity had made and could not escape, *but came Himself* among His own creatures, born in poverty, living in obscurity, and dying in shame. He drank the dregs of the chalice of suffering, receiving in His sacred body the price of our sins.

But Jesus was no luckless political revolutionary, no ill-fated, failed zealot, no naive and reckless teacher, He was, *He is* the Son of God. And in the inscrutable divine plan, the throne by which God would reign once again upon earth became the Cross, his viceroy a humble fisherman, and His empire, the hidden realm of sanctifying grace.

At the end of time, Christ will come in glory, and there will be no choice but to bend the knee to His Lordship. But now He still comes as He did at Nazareth, at Calvary, hidden, humble, and begging. It remains for us to choose. The world passes by the spectacle of the Cross and asks, like Pilate, "are you a King?" But when it hears Him answer, it responds, just like Pilate, "What is truth?" In the end, Pilate was not deciding Christ's fate, life or death, as he surely thought, but his own. And so, of course, are we.

"Este Es el Rey de los Judíos"

El letrero arriba de la cruz lo proclamó un rey. No es la manera en que pensamos de Jesucristo. Quizás buen pastor, amigo, hermano o maestro. Pero ese título de rey suena un poco extraño a nuestros oídos. ¡Rey Jesús! Estaban burlándose de Jesús cuando colocaron ese letreo, pero aunque no lo supieron, estaban escribiendo la verdad.

Terminamos el año litúrgico de la Iglesia por celebrar la fiesta de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo, Rey del Universo. Así Él es. Vimos eso en las lecturas del evangelio este año. Él tiene todo poder en el cielo y la tierra. Él es nuestro todo, Él es nuestra luz, Él es nuestra verdad, Él es nuestra vida. Él está con nosotros ayudándonos a seguir los ejemplos que Él nos dio en su camino de la vida.

Los soldados parados bajo de la cruz de Jesús, al burlarse de Jesús, le decían, "Si tú eres el rey de los judíos, sálvate a ti mismo." Y uno de los malhechores crucificado al lado de Jesús, le dijo, "Si tú eres el Mesías, sálvate a ti mismo y a nosotros." No tenían confianza y creencia en Jesús. No lo conocían aunque seguramente habían recibido noticias de Él.

Muchos hoy en día no queremos cargar nuestros cruces, pero queremos entrar al reino. Algunos ejemplos pueden ser: la cruz de los hijos, la cruz de un hijo discapacitado, la cruz de la castidad prematrimonial y de la fidelidad conyugal, la cruz de una enfermedad larga o dolorosa, o la cruz de un cónyuge incómodo. Ante todos estos no cabe la petición del malhechor: "Sálvate a ti mismo y a nosotros," sino la del bueno: "Cuando llegues a tu reino, acuérdate de mí." Y quizás deseamos agregar: y échanos una mano con nuestras cruces. Es difícil vivir las cruces de la vida, pero la manera por la cual lo hacemos es importante.

Y nosotros ¿creemos en Jesucristo? ¿Podemos poner nuestras vidas en sus manos? Este rey nos ayuda como deben hacer los que gobiernan sobre otros. Jesús había sido un rey bueno.

Después de la multiplicación de los panes, sus seguidores querían proclamarlo rey, pero El escapó, y continuamente corregía esta perspectiva de poder humano, económico, político o militar. ¿No había dicho que Él no había venido a ser servido, sino a servir?

Este rey dedicaba su tiempo a los demás, lavó los pies a sus discípulos, y entregó su vida por todos. Jesucristo no estaba preocupado por títulos y privilegios, sino se mostraba siempre dispuesto a ofrecer algo o sí mismo a otros. Ojalá que nosotros aprendamos esta lección. Nuestra actitud no debe ser de dominio, sino de servicio. No de prestigio político o económico, sino de diálogo humilde y comunicador de esperanza.

Piensa en la oración que Él enseñó a sus discípulos: "venga a nosotros tu reino." Es un reino de paz, de misericordia, de justicia, de amor, de entrega, de servicio, de gracia, de verdad... Jesús era y es el camino a ese reino; Jesucristo caminaba ese camino y nos ensenó como caminarlo. Solamente tenemos que abrir nuestros ojos y nuestros corazones en el amor. Hermana Kay
