

3RD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men." - Mt 4:19



Last week I wrote to you about the importance of seeing our struggles, not as an indication of God's absence in our life, but even as a sign that He is actively transforming us. At the heart, this is the mystery of the Cross, and the Cross is the heart of our Catholic Faith.

We have to understand that, objectively speaking, suffering is an evil. It is an indication or sign that something is 'not right', there's a problem. But then, how can suffering be *useful if it is objectively evil*? Well, if what is making us suffer is directly caused by our own current sins, then God can use it to force us to admit something needs to change, to convert. If we suffer because of something we did in the past, then we can be sorry and to turn to God more lovingly for help. Most often, we suffer from things that no one is 'guilty of', like many diseases, or unexpected events, or even personal limitations that are in

God's plan to save us was to take our human nature on Himself, and in doing so, taking the weight and burden of all human suffering, sin and evil on Himself as well. By dying on the Cross in a perfect act of love and obedience, Jesus, Who is both God and Man, not only merited the forgiveness of all sin, but He also made it possible that our sufferings could be something we could offer to God as a means to bring us closer to Him and make us holier. But here is the necessary ingredient to making the objective evil of suffering into something transforming and even powerful in God's eyes: first, we have to be willing to give up (or sincerely try to give up) anything sinful causing the suffering, and we need to offer our sufferings, whatever they may be, to Jesus. And, even more practically speaking, this can only happen through prayer. Prayer opens us up to the power, mercy, and love of God. And this power, mercy, and love come to us how? Through the gift of the Cross- the supreme moment of saving Love and Gift in the life of Jesus Christ. The moment of supreme weakness became the moment of greatest power and victory. This means, there is no human sin or evil greater than God's goodness.

I am sure that every single person reading this article has some suffering, small or large, that needs to be offered to Our Lord. When you do this, He Himself will help you bear it, in other words, He will carry your cross with you since He carried His cross for love of you. And then, even if it still hurts, it will become something of eternal value. Or, in the words of St John Vianney: "When we carry our Cross, we shall soon find that it begins to carry us to heaven".

LA PAZ COMO CAMINO DE ESPERANZA

Cada año desde 1968 los papas han publicado un mensaje por la Jornada Mundial de la Paz. Abajo es la primera parte del mensaje de Papa Francisco de este año:

"La paz, como objeto de nuestra esperanza, es un bien precioso, al que aspira toda la humanidad. Esperar en la paz es una actitud humana que contiene una tensión existencial, y de este modo cualquier situación difícil «se puede vivir y aceptar si lleva hacia una meta, si podemos estar seguros de esta meta y si esta meta es tan grande que justifique el esfuerzo del camino». En este sentido, la esperanza es la virtud que nos pone en camino, nos da alas para avanzar, incluso cuando los obstáculos parecen insuperables.

Nuestra comunidad humana lleva, en la memoria y en la carne, los signos de las guerras y de los conflictos que se han producido, con una capacidad destructiva creciente, y que no dejan de afectar especialmente a los más pobres y a los más débiles. Naciones enteras se afanan también por liberarse de las cadenas de la explotación y de la corrupción, que alimentan el odio y la violencia. Todavía hoy, a tantos hombres y mujeres, niños y ancianos se les niega la dignidad, la integridad física, la libertad, incluida la libertad religiosa, la solidaridad comunitaria, la esperanza en el futuro. Muchas víctimas inocentes cargan sobre sí el tormento de la humillación y la exclusión, del duelo y la injusticia.

Las terribles pruebas de los conflictos civiles e internacionales, a menudo agravados por la violencia sin piedad, marcan durante mucho tiempo el cuerpo y el alma de la humanidad. En realidad, toda guerra se revela como un fratricidio que destruye el mismo proyecto de fraternidad, inscrito en la vocación de la familia humana. Sabemos que la guerra a menudo comienza por la intolerancia a la diversidad del otro, lo que fomenta el deseo de posesión y la voluntad de dominio. Nace en el corazón del hombre por el egoísmo y la soberbia, por el odio que instiga a destruir, a encerrar al otro en una imagen negativa, a excluirlo y eliminarlo. La guerra se nutre de la perversión de las relaciones, de las ambiciones, de los abusos de poder, del miedo al otro y la diferencia vista como un obstáculo; y al mismo tiempo alimenta todo esto.

...La paz y la estabilidad internacional son incompatibles con todo intento de fundarse sobre el miedo a la mutua destrucción o sobre una amenaza de aniquilación total; sólo es posible desde una ética global de solidaridad y cooperación al servicio de un futuro mostrado por la interdependencia y la corresponsabilidad entre toda la familia humana. Cualquier situación de amenaza alimenta la desconfianza.


Entonces, ¿cómo construir un camino de paz y reconocimiento mutuo? Debemos buscar una verdadera fraternidad, que esté basada sobre nuestro origen común en Dios y ejercida en el diálogo y la confianza recíproca. El deseo de paz está profundamente inscrito en el corazón del hombre y no debemos resignarnos a nada menos que

esto. La paz es un camino de escucha basado en la memoria, en la solidaridad y en la fraternidad.'

Podemos pensar en nuestras propias actitudes frente otras personas y otras naciones y quitar nuestros prejuicios. Como individuos necesitamos hacernos personas de paz. Hermana Kay
