My Dear People,

Lent is a privileged time for *conversion*. What is conversion? Its origins from the Latin root reveal the fundamental meaning: to turn around completely. The physical image helps us grasp what God will give us the grace to do over the next 40 days if we cooperate- to turn away from what makes us turn away from Him. Lent culminates in the mysterious drama of our salvation, when death and life are locked in mortal combat. Sin is death, Christ is life, and as the powers of evil unleash themselves upon the Savior, all the malice and hatred of the entire human race concentrate in one satanic rage to extinguish forever the Light of the world. The frenzied passion of the crowds, officials and executioners is in stark contrast to the silent suffering of Jesus, whose sacred Passion becomes itself an encapsulation of all human pain, physical, moral, and spiritual. All the weight of man's disobedience is born on the innocent shoulders of Christ; if He were not God as well as man, the burden would crush Him absolutely. Sin, which hides itself under a thousand masks of justifications, excuses, and rationalizations, is unmasked for what it is: the rejection of God's goodness and love. This is the real tragedy of Christ's suffering- the rejection of love. Or, as St John writes, men loved darkness more than Light. They would not *convert*, they would not turn from their "works of darkness".

All of us need to convert, from big sins or from little attitudes of the heart. Lent helps us, it gives us a goal, it challenges us. Lent is both a combat and a love story. Love is the core, the essence of Christ's mission. From His five sacred wounds, life and mercy, healing and strength flow to the world. But it is also a combat because sin and the devil war against us to keep us from this saving love. The combat is not only from without, but from within. Lent summons us to face the greatest battle possible for any man or woman, that of the heart and the will. It's easy to get angry at bad things other people do, it is terrifying to look inward and realistically and soberly face the evil and disobedience inside of ourselves. We are so good at hiding from it!

In this combat, though, we are not alone, this is the point of Lent. One is fighting with us and for us. No one can flee the fight, we have to take up the solemn task of our baptism which vows to live in and for Jesus Christ. To convert isn't to turn away, but within. It is to recognize what God is trying to do in us, drawing us to Himself in love. Love this deep is frightening, it ought to be. It should, if we let it, scare the 'hell' out of us. Hell fears your conversion. Convert anyway.

Ah, ya estamos en el tiempo de la Cuaresma. Yo sé que a muchas personas no les gusta este tiempo del año de la Iglesia. Es porque se parece más triste, más callado; la música no contiene la vida alegre, no hay flores ni mucha belleza en la iglesia—es un ambiente más austero.

La Cuaresma es un tiempo de reflexión y de centrarse más en la persona de Jesús. Es un tiempo para entrar más profundamente en nuestra relación con Jesucristo, y dejar lo superficial y la rutina para cuestionarse, para ver cómo se vive la vida cristiana y el evangelio. Hay que renovarse, mirarse en el espejo de la verdad y cuestionar su vida. ¿Realmente está viviendo lo que Jesucristo había enseñado y vivido? Puede cuestionarse: día domingo es como cualquier otro día, salvo que uno va a la iglesia para orar un poco y cantar o no cantar. Hay esa rutina, pero nada realmente le atrae a usted. Usted va a la iglesia porque piensa que es un deber y otros van a pensar mal de usted si no va.

Ah, pero todos somos hijos e hijas de Dios por nuestro Bautismo. ¿Quiere actuar como hijo(a) de Dios? Esta Cuaresma actúe más como hijo(a) de Dios. Deje que sus criterios, actitudes y acciones sean juzgados por la Palabra de Dios. Use bien este tiempo de la Cuaresma para superar la rutina y el conformismo que quizás está tomando control de su vida. Use este tiempo para que Dios penetre su vida.

¿Se acuerda de los 40 años de la peregrinación de los israelitas en el desierto, los cuarenta días y noches de Moisés sobre la montaña del Sinaí, y de Elías en camino hacia la misma montana santa? Ellos estaban enfrentándose y sus vidas y lo que era importante en la vida, y si realmente el Dios de Israel era el enfoque de su vida, y si estaban dejando Él ser su único Dios y su guía.

Aproveche de este tiempo: escuche la homilía y las lecturas cada domingo, cada día, use el librito *La Palabra entre Nosotros* y el librito negro o el librito de Cinco Minutos de Oración para reflexionar sobre lo que dice Dios por medio de los profetas, evangelistas y escritores de la Biblia. Ore sobre todo esto, y abra su corazón a la acción de Dios dentro de ti. No puede venir a la Misa solamente por una rutina; tiene que enfrentarse y una vez viendo lo débil y lo negativo, pida a Dios su ayuda para dejar

cualidades negativas para reemplazarlas con cualidades y actitudes positivas. Piense en este tiempo de la Cuaresma como un regalo precioso para acercarse más a su amigo Jesucristo. Intente hacerlo con esfuerzo y lucha para que al final de la Cuaresma se encuentre





aún más cristiano. Este tiempo es un camino hacia la Pascua. Camine bien; tome la mano de Jesucristo. *Hermana Kay*
