My Dear People,

The increasing spread of the novel coronavirus has, within a few short weeks, drastically altered our everyday routines and lives. What is most frightening perhaps is the uncertainty it engenders; where will the next outbreak be, what will be cancelled next, what else is going to change? In addition to this is the very real concern about catching an illness that could result in death, our own or someone we love. Who is not disturbed by the fact that we are facing an infectious disease that can be spread before any symptoms appear?

But this very recent outbreak, now labelled pandemic, has in fact uncovered another disease, even more hidden, and far more deadly. This disease has been growing steadily, and in most cases completely unchecked in recent decades. young as much as the old. What is it? This sickness is to forget how short life really is, and how much we are in complete dependence upon God. This second sickness is young as much as the old. What is it? This sickness is to complete dependence upon God. This second sickness is uncovered by the first because, as things become more uncertain, and more lives may be at risk, whether or not people begin to think of the condition of their souls, whether they turn to God immediately, and whether they place more trust in God is quickly revealed. I say this second disease is more deadly because it has eternal consequences.

> The ultimate purpose of our existence is not to try to live as long as possible no matter what and squeeze as much pleasure and comfort out of life as we can. We do, most certainly, have a responsibility before God to take care of ourselves. Likewise, the instinct to preserve life and avoid danger is healthy and a necessary part of being human. But as Christians we know that our real purpose is to live according to our identity as made in God's image and to enter into a saving relationship with Jesus Christ. As the pandemic spreads, it has become painfully obvious how, in the Western World, the health of the body is of far more importance to us than the health of the soul.

Atheistic communism denied the afterlife, but quickly devalued all human life. The irony is, if we live only for this world, then even life below becomes worthless. But if we live for God, then live is of far greater value, be it long or short. Putting our trust in God, and putting the life of our souls before the body doesn't mean we don't get scared by what's happening, nor does it mean we shouldn't wash our hands, or take care of ourselves. It does mean, though, that we know God is our ultimate refuge, in this life, and in the next. Maybe the coronavirus can help us. It will, if it makes us remember how fragile our lives are, and how much we truly depend on God for everything.

Vivan como Hijos de la Luz

En este tiempo del año estamos teniendo doce horas de la luz. pero aunque el sol supuestamente sale a las 7:30 am y se pone a las 7:15 pm o más tarde, muchas veces no vemos mucha luz directa del sol. Son muchos los días nublados, y cuando está lloviendo, los días no son claros. Conozco a algunas personas que se ponen un poco deprimidas cuando el sol no se muestra durante el día. No reciben la energía del sol y no tienen mucha energía y desean dormir y no hacer nada. El sol afecta la personalidad y las acciones. Así es nuestra relación con Jesucristo. Cuando estamos en contacto directo con El por medio de la oración es como estamos llenos de luz y con la capacidad de volar y transmitir alegría a otras personas a nuestro alrededor. Pero si nuestro contacto con Cristo esté apagado, la luz de nuestra vida espiritual está apagado. ¿Usted se siente muerto a Dios a veces y su vida espiritual interior no te alimenta? Es porque no está alimentándola. Las preocupaciones cotidianas y las cosas materia-les son sus prioridades. Examinen su vida y qué hace durante el día. ¿Ha reservado algún tiempo para Dios? Si no, ¿de dónde va a recibir la luz espiritual que es tan necesario?

En la segunda lectura de hoy San Pablo escribe a los Efesios indicando que deben vivir como hijos de la luz. Por nuestro bautismo somos hijos(as) de Dios; Cristo dijo que Él es la Luz. ¡Y tan brillante es esa Luz! Pablo mencionó algunos frutos de la luz: la bondad, la santidad y la verdad. Es cierto que si estemos cerca a Jesucristo vamos a intentar seguirlo y eliminar las tinieblas en nuestras vidas: las cualidades negativas, las acciones y pensamientos que nos distancian de Dios y de otras personas.

Jesús había dicho: "Yo soy la luz del mundo; el que me sigue, no andará en tinieblas, sino que tendrá la luz de la vida." Es una garantía dada por Jesús. Esa luz de Cristo entra nuestras vidas, nuestras personas, nuestros pensamientos y acciones. Gradual-

mente vamos distanciándonos de las tinieblas del mal, del pecado, del egoísmo, de todo lo que nos separa de Dios. La luz nos entra e ilumina nuestras acciones. De a poco es mucho más fácil hacer el bien y no el mal.

Deje esa Luz tan bonita iluminarse a sí mismo e iluminar su camino; así va a estar más generoso y amable con otras. Va a ayudar a otros sin pensar en una respuesta de sí o no. Por su-



puesto sin pensar, si haya necesidad, va a ayudar. Jesús había dicho en cuanto ayudar a los demás: "...cuando lo hicieron con alguno de los más pequeños de estos mis hermanos, me lo hicieron a mí." Hermana Kay


