My dear brothers and sisters, probably by now you have heard the sad news that Fr. Walter will be leaving us. This news comes at a time that is hard for all of us: a world-wide pandemic, economic hardship, countless cancellations, an entire Easter Season swallowed up by the lockdown, and three months of no Mass and limited access to the sacraments. In particular, both Fr. Walter and I regret the loss of a full quarter year of a fuller contact with our church family.

I am very thankful for the time we have had with Fr. Walter. I am grateful for his effective ministry as preacher and confessor and for all the one on one ministry he has given us through teaching, counseling, sick calls, and administering the sacraments. He has touched many lives. When we took on this cluster of churches, I was often asked how we were handling it all. Time and time again I said the best part about my new assignment was that I had a fellow priest and a partner to live and work with. Both of us feel that we ministered together in a complementary and synergistic fashion. We always loved to discuss over dinner all the good things God was able to do through our united priestly teamwork.

However, in Christian faith, we believe and understand what St. Paul teaches us in his epistle to the Romans, that “all things work together for the good for those who love God...” (Rom 8:28) God is so wise and powerful that He can take even the misfortunes of life and weave them into the tapestry of his good plan for us. Despite our trials and hardships, we are buoyed up with hope. God is in control! When facing difficulties, I often think of the prayer, *Anima Christi*, the first few lines of which are: “Soul of Christ, sanctify me. Body of Christ, save me. Blood of Christ, inebriate me. Water flowing from the side of Christ, wash me. Passion of Christ, strengthen me...” In particular I repeat to myself and meditate upon the line, “Passion of Christ, strengthen me.” Holding before the eyes of my mind Our Savior’s sufferings, I say in my heart, “Jesus, if you can endure this for me, what can I not endure for you?” It is meditating on the Passion above all that gives me strength to do God’s will no matter how hard life gets. I hope this simple but powerful prayer helps you like it helps me.

On a positive note, we are glad that Fr. Walter will move on to his new home at St. John of Rochester and help out Fr. Peter Clifford to do good things there. Our prayers go with him. I am also excited that we are getting another young priest, Fr. Mike Merritt. In fact, Fr. Merritt is the youngest priest in our diocese, having walked this earth for a whole 31 years! When Bishop Matano makes placement decisions at this time of the year, one of the ways he tries to take care of the communities entrusted to him is by paying extra attention to his new priests and their assignments. For our communities to be spiritually healthy, we need spiritually healthy priests. The first few years of a priest’s ministry are often critical years that determine whether the rest of his ministry will flourish or flounder. Fr. Merritt’s three-year term in Seneca Falls recently came to an end, and he was looking for a new home. I trust the Bishop’s judgment that it will be good for Fr. Merritt to be here with us—with me as his pastor and you as his people. And I am confident he will be good for us too. Fr. Merritt is known for being a very friendly and optimistic man, and I think he will bring us a lot of life. I look forward to working with him to help restore to us all a sense of peace and wholeness after so much hardship. Fr. Merritt’s first week with us will be the first week of July.

One more positive note—isn’t it great to be able to shout a belated Easter ‘Alleluia’ for Sunday Masses restored this Father’s Day weekend? God bless you all!

Un Reto a los Padres de Familia

¡Tanta influencia tienen los padres en las vidas de sus hijos! La influencia no es solamente en la niñez y la juventud de sus hijos, pero extiende por toda la vida de sus hijos. Los niños adquieren los valores y actitudes de sus padres. Las intereses y actividades de los padres cuando están acompañados por sus hijos muchas veces son adquiridos por los hijos. Mi padre le gustó béisbol, y él jugaba con nosotros en el patio de la casa. También íbamos a algunos juegos de los Rochester Red Wings. Por eso, hasta hoy me gusta ese deporte.

Puede ser que un hijo ha dicho a su padre: “¡Quiero ser como tú, papá!” Wow, si has escuchado eso de su hijo, quizás has empezado a pensar en el tipo de ejemplo que estás dando a sus hijos. ¿Realmente quieres que ellos sean como tú? Examínate en cómo estás viviendo los aspectos de tu vida: físico, espiritual, familiar, laboral, económico y social.

Cuidado de su salud: no fumas, no tomas mucho alcohol, no comes demasiado, te acuestas temprano para tener 7 o 8 horas de sueño, haces ejercicio (y con sus hijos)...

Vida espiritual: oración es parte de tu vida diaria, asistes a la Misa dominical, oran en familia, ayudas a sus hijos orar, asistes devociones especiales en la iglesia, lees la biblia y las lecturas de cada día, participas en un grupo bíblico...

Vida familiar: te quedas en casa después de un día de trabajo, escuchas a su hijo cuando te cuenta lo que pasó en su día, juegas y pasas tiempo con los hijos, como familia rezas ante de comer, bendices a los hijos ante de salir, salen de vez en cuando como familia para hacer algo juntos...

Vida laboral: buscas trabajo, das un día honesto de trabajo, no quejas sobre su trabajo, explicas la importancia del trabajo a los hijos, no permites que su única conversación en casa sea el trabajo, compartes las alegrías de tu trabajo...

Posición económico: hablas a los hijos sobre el buen uso del dinero, ayudas a ellos entender el valor del dinero, explicas el por qué a ellos de que no es posible comprar todo lo que ven en la tele o lo que otros niños tienen, explicas a ellos la importancia de trabajar para ganar dinero, animas a ellos tomar su responsabilidad en los quehaceres de la casa...

Vida social: ustedes como familia de vez en cuando se encuentran con otras familias para pasar el tiempo, participas en fiestas como familia, haces cosas con tus amigos de vez en cuando, animas a los hijos hacer cosas con sus amigos, permites a sus hijos ir a la casa de sus amigos, pones confianza en su hijo...

Espero que cada padre de familia sea un buen modelo a seguir y un buen maestro que enseña a sus hijos cómo vivir. Hay que saber cuándo no debe seguir llevando su hijo en brazo y cuándo le enseña a caminar con dirección y propósito. Tu hijo va conduciéndose por la vida guiado por las huellas que tú, padre, dejas para él, pero él agrega sus propios pasos y ritmos en la vida. El hijo necesita conocer lo material y lo espiritual, lo visible y lo invisible, el mundo real y el mundo divino y todo eso reflejado en el ser, la actitud y el comportamiento de su padre. Family Ministry

Gospel Reading *Matthew 10:26-33*

Jesus assures the Twelve that God cares about them.

It is not only individuals who need reassurance about God's love and protection. Communities need this reassurance as well, including the community of the family. Children rely on the confidence of their parents for this assurance. Parents can help the entire family's growth in trust and confidence in God by witnessing ways in which daily family needs are entrusted to God's care.

As the family gathers, distribute pieces of paper to each person. Tell them to write or draw ways in which they believe that God's help is needed for each person and for the family as a whole. Each slip of paper can then be collected in a basket.

Invite one member of the family to read aloud today's Gospel, Matthew 10:26-33. Recall together how well God knows your family and thank God for this wonderful grace. Conclude by praying together for each of the needs identified on the slips of paper. After each need is read, pray together, "God, we trust you because you know us so well." Conclude by praying the Glory Be to the Father.

This practice might become a regular part of your family's prayer. Set the basket in a place of prayer and encourage family members to add other needs throughout the week. Perhaps your family can pray for these things together during a family meal.
