

My Dear People,

This is my last bulletin article. I think everyone has learned by now that I have been transferred to St John of Rochester parish in Fairport to be the assistant priest there with Fr Peter Clifford. I ask for your prayers that God use me in whatever way He wants in my new assignment, just as I hope He has used me here to be His instrument. Thank you for all the good things you have done for me, may God Himself reward you for it.

One year has seemed a very short time to be with you, especially since three months of this year were under the quarantine when we did not see each other, apart from computer videos. As Fr Tedesche explained, priests are at the service of the Diocese. The Bishop, who is the chief Shepherd of all the souls under his care, places priests as needed in different places to share this task. The shortage of priests makes the Bishop's job of assigning priests to cover even more challenging. He has many considerations in mind that we may often be unaware ofthere are many moving parts to coordinate in a Diocese of 12 counties, both among the parishes and the priests themselves.

One year is very short, I know, but it is also a long time. What do I mean by this? I mean, God's time is different than ours. In a single instant He can change the world, and years upon years are but a single instant in His eyes. Most of you know I have a great devotion to St Joseph, and have consecrated my vocation to the priesthood to him. I asked St Joseph, even before my ordination, that I would do the work he desired me to do in my first assignment. What that work is or was, I am not entirely sure, you may know better than me! What I do know is that God uses the smallest things to make a big difference. Whatever it is that St Joseph, (who is working for God obviously) wanted me to do with you and for you, I trust he has done. Whatever it is that St Joseph wanted me to receive from you, to learn from you, to grow from you, he has had his time to accomplish, even with my hard head! Priests need the people as much as people need to the priest. We need you because our identity and mission is to bring you closer to God and help you stay close to Him. We continue the mission and work of Jesus, take His place even, to do it. But we, (I) find God by serving you just as you find Him through us (me). A priest needs to get people to heaven in order to go there ĥimself.

Life is short, in an 'instant' it will be done. Yet relationships with people, if they are joined in the love of Jesus, will never end. Let us be joined in the love of Jesus. Such bonds are forever.



Family Ministry

Gospel Reading Matthew 10:37-42

Jesus outlines the costs and rewards of discipleship.

One can tell a lot about a family by the way they welcome others into their home. Despite parental efforts to elicit the best behavior from their children, family efforts to entertain guests are sometimes difficult. Practicing a spirit of Christian hospitality within the family can be an occasion to reflect upon the importance of this virtue. A family spirit of hospitality is a sign of faith.

When your family gathers, ask each person to consider the following questions about manners: What does it mean to be a good host? What does it mean to be a good guest? Invite each person to share their thoughts and experiences about being a guest or a host. When they have finished, read aloud today's Gospel, Matthew 10:37-42.

Ask family members to describe what Jesus says about hospitality extended to his disciples. (Those who receive Jesus' disciples also receive Jesus himself; hospitality to Jesus' disciples will be rewarded.) Then encourage family members to talk about what it means to be a good guest or a good host. You might also talk about ways in which your family's hospitality might be improved upon. Conclude in prayer together that your family grows to be one in which Christian hospitality is experienced by all. Pray together the Lord's
