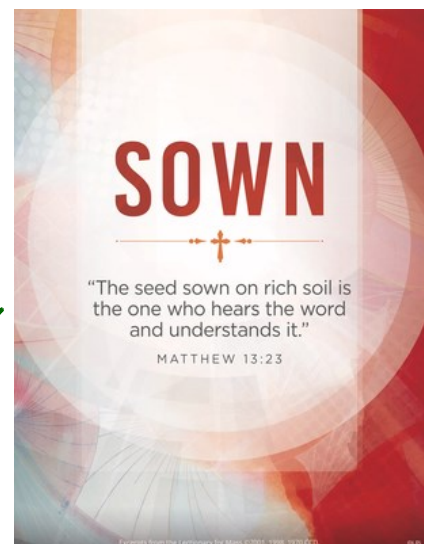

## Greetings and Salutations,

For those of you who I haven't yet had the chance to meet, my name is Fr. Michael Merritt, and I am the new priest for the parishes of St. Michael's, St. Joseph the Worker, and the Catholic Community of the Blessed Trinity. I wanted to take the following space to write a little bit about myself, so that you might get to know me a little better.

One of the nice things about being here in Wayne County is that it is not very far from where I grew up. I spent most of my childhood in Farmington, so I went to school in Canandaigua, and St. Mary's Parish in Canandaigua was my home parish. I have a small immediate family, with just one brother, and my parents still live in Farmington. I graduated from Canandaigua Academy in 2006, and I decided to go to Siena College out in Albany.

It was in high school that I really began feeling a pull toward the Church, and when I started to think that I might have a vocation to the priesthood. I continued to discern while I was at Siena, and when I graduated in 2010, I felt that I had to pursue a priestly vocation before I did anything else.

In 2011, I was accepted to be a seminarian for the Diocese of Rochester, and I was sent to St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore to further my education and formation. It was there that both my faith and my relationship with God continued to grow. Praised be to God, on June 3, 2017, I was ordained to the priesthood for the Diocese of Rochester by Bishop Matano.

I have spent the last three years serving at St. Francis and St. Clare Parish in Waterloo and Seneca Falls, and while it was difficult saying goodbye, I am very excited to be assigned to this cluster of parishes. Know that I will keep all of you in my prayers, and I ask that you continue to pray for me going forward. If you need anything, please don't hesitate to ask. I am here to serve you and the community, and I look forward to getting to know all of you better in the coming weeks and months. 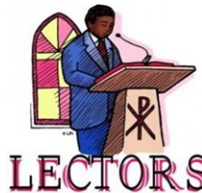


## Palabra de Dios—Dios Nos Habla

El lector/la lectora termina la lectura durante la Misa por decir Palabra de Dios. ¿Qué quiere decir esto? Sí, es Dios hablándonos, dándonos un reto de cómo actuar, de cómo vivir nuestras vidas como discípulos de Jesucristo. Pero ¿estamos escuchando? Tantas veces al oír "Palabra de Dios" al final de la lectura, pensamos: ah, no sé de qué trató la lectura. ¿Dónde estaba yo en mi mente cuando el lector estaba leyendo? No vamos a recibir el mensaje de Dios si no prestamos atención. A veces no prestamos atención porque tenemos preocupaciones o los hijos están inquietos o estamos prestando atención a los que están sentados cerca de nosotros. O a veces estamos tan cansados que es difícil mantener los ojos abiertos, y los pobres oídos quieren descansar junto con los ojos.

Jesús dice, "El que tenga oídos, que oiga." A veces necesitamos ejemplos para entender. Jesús usaba parábolas para que él pudiera dar una enseñanza por usar unos cuentos sencillos para ayudar a la gente entender por aplicar las ideas sencillas a sus vidas.

Hoy en el evangelio podemos pensar cómo algunas personas reciben el mensaje de Dios inmediatamente con entusiasmo, pero rápidamente pierden el entusiasmo, porque descubren que el compromiso es a largo plazo, no solo por una semana o un mes. Es para la vida. Dios pide constancia, y los más dedicados pueden aceptar eso, y ellos piden la ayuda del Espíritu Santo para cumplir. A veces permitimos tantas otras cosas ocupar nuestro tiempo y ponemos Dios, oración, Misa, acciones de caridad, mi ministerio en la iglesia a un lado.



Durante la Misa dependemos de los lectores para proclamar el mensaje de Dios por el uso de sus voces. Dependemos de los dones de individuos para proclamar de tal manera que la asamblea va a estar alerta al mensaje de la lectura, y para que mantenga sus oídos atentos y sus mentes alertas. Queremos que la semilla de la palabra de Dios esté bien recibida para que los de nuestra asamblea póngala en práctica, que vivan según lo que Dios nos dice.

### ¿Qué significa la palabra Misa?

La celebración de la Eucaristía recibió distintos nombres en el transcurso de los siglos.

#### A partir del siglo cuarto...



El nombre más frecuente es el de "Misa", palabra que proviene del verbo latino "misere", que significa "enviar". Las palabras "misión, misionero" derivan de la misma palabra.

#### ¿Cómo surge la palabra "Misa"?

En la iglesia antigua, los que participaban del catecumenado, o sea, los que se preparaban para el Bautismo, no podían participar todavía de la Eucaristía, por lo que, después del rezo del Credo, el sacerdote los despedía en latín, diciendo:



"Miseri est finis", (la reunión ha terminado)  
"missa in pace" (vayan en paz).

En ese momento, los catecúmenos se retiraban y los que estaban bautizados pasaban a participar de la Eucaristía. Los fieles fueron asociando el latín "missa" para llamar así a todo el servicio de la liturgia.

Según enseña el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, en el número 1332, se denomina al sacrificio eucarístico con la palabra Misa "porque la liturgia en la que se realiza el misterio de salvación se termina con el envío de los fieles (del verbo 'misio'; enviar) a fin de que cumplan la voluntad de Dios en su vida cotidiana".

## Family Ministry

Gospel Reading *Matthew 13:1-23*

*Jesus teaches that the kingdom of heaven is like  
seed that has been sown on good soil.*

Today's Gospel reminds us that in order for God's Word to take root in us and produce abundant fruit, we must endeavor to be like good soil. Families, in particular, hold the responsibility for "preparing the soil" so that the seeds of God's Word can grow strong.

There are many ways in which families do this—family traditions in which faith is celebrated, prayer and reading of Scripture, and instruction on the faith. In these ways, parents fulfill the promises they made at their child's Baptism.

Gather together as a family and reflect together on the Sacrament of Baptism. Tell the story of the Baptism of each child, showing any pictures that were taken. If you have your child's Baptism candle or gown, share these as well. Recall together that one of the promises that parents make at their child's Baptism is to bring them up in the practice of our faith. Talk together about the importance of this promise to your family. Then read together today's Gospel, Matthew 13:1-23. Reflect together on the ways in

which your family practices your faith (daily prayer, Mass attendance, religious instruction, etc.). Remind one another that we do these things as a family so that God's Word can take root in our



lives and produce abundant fruit. Conclude in prayer together by praying today's Psalm, Psalm 65.
