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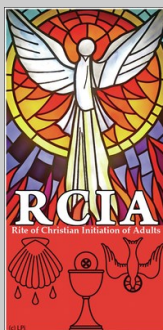

Perdón de Corazón

“Señor, si no te olvidas de las faltas, ¿quién podrá subsistir? Pero de ti procede el perdón” (Sal. 130). Nadie es perfecto; tenemos faltas, omisiones de bien, pecados, pero Dios, quien es tan bondadoso y compasivo, nos perdona nuestros pecados no solamente una vez sino muchas veces. ¿Y nosotros, nos permitimos perdonar al otro y a nosotros mismos?

Hace años escuché algo de una señora que estaba conduciendo su carro cuando de repente otro auto estaba al lado su carro y un adolescente tiró un pavo congelado por el para brizas de su carro, pegándole directamente en la cara. La señora necesitaba múltiples cirugías para reconstruir los huesos de la cara y restaurar su apariencia. El joven fue arrestado y llegó a la corte con la posibilidad de 25 años en la cárcel. Cuando él la vio afuera de la sala de corte, él se disculpó y le suplicó que lo perdonara. Después de todo el dolor, las cirugías y la deformación de su cara, ella perdonó al adolescente. Ella acunó su cabeza mientras el sollozaba, y acarició su rostro y palmeó su espalda, a la vez diciendo “Está bien, pero haga algo bueno con su vida.” Con el paso de los años el vínculo que creció entre la víctima y el agresor fue un correctivo mucho mejor que una celda en la cárcel. Los dos participaban en un programa para adolescentes en probation, dando sus testimonios.

En nuestro mundo tenemos que ejercer ambos la misericordia y la justicia. Perdonar significa soltar la herida; es un gesto del espíritu—no es calcular el pago hecho. Perdonar no olvida la justicia, pero sí tenemos que olvidar la venganza. Es dar al otro otra oportunidad y esa oportunidad puede abrir otra puerta a la persona perdonada. Debemos aprender de nuestros faltas y pecados, recordándolos e intentando mejorarnos.

Jesucristo nos desafía de ser santo como es su Padre. Él enseñó: “Amarás al Señor tu Dios con todo tu corazón, con toda tu alma y con toda tu mente, y amarás a tu prójimo como a ti mismo.” El buscar venganza contra otra persona es contra esta enseñanza; el abstenerse de guardar rencor o tomar venganza es amar a otro como a uno mismo. Al guardar rencor daña no solamente al otro, sino a sí mismo. ¿Por qué perdonamos? El perdón disminuye los síntomas de ansiedad y depresión, se mejora amistades y un sentido del bienestar, disminuye el estrés, disminuye el dolor del estómago, y las dificultades de sueño. El perdón es la manera de ser más como Dios. Hay que esforzarse por perdonar sin recibir una disculpa, como Jesús en la cruz. Hay que ver la situación desde la perspectiva de la otra persona



y mostrar una empatía para la otra. No deje que el deseo de la venganza toma posesión de usted. Así va a perder su libertad y su alegría de vivir. Vive en el amor.

Family Ministry

Gospel Reading Matthew 18:21-35

Jesus teaches that we must forgive one another as God has forgiven us.

Children learn to trust God's mercy and forgiveness when they experience forgiveness from those closest to them. We hope that we model God's love and forgiveness within our family life. Today's Gospel reminds us that forgiveness is measured by its quality more than its quantity.

Invite your family to consider some recent times when family members sought the forgiveness of another. Ask if there were any statements made that put conditions on our forgiveness such as "I will play this game with you if you apologize for knocking over my blocks" or "I will accept your apology after you clean up your room." Do we sometimes "keep count" or put conditions on our forgiveness of one another? This is something we may be doing without realizing it.

Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 18:21-35. Ask if we sometimes find ourselves sounding like Peter, concerning ourselves with quantity of forgiveness rather than offering forgiveness abundantly and unconditionally. Reflect upon the parable that Jesus tells. What does the servant do that makes the king so angry? He refuses to forgive his fellow servant the debt that he owes. Because we have all received God's forgiveness, God expects that we will also be forgiving toward others. Jesus' answer to Peter's question is found at the end of the parable. The number of times that we forgive one another is less important than the depth of our forgiveness. We must forgive one another from the heart.

Conclude in prayer together that God's love and forgiveness is evident in your family life. Pray together today's psalm, Psalm 103, or the Lord's Prayer.
