The church will be cleaned after each Mass for everyone's protection.



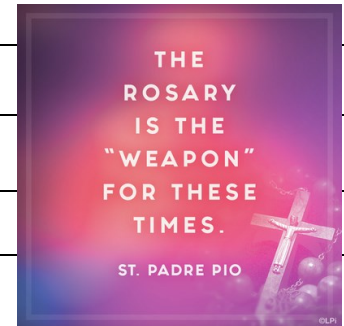

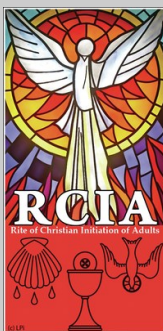

Nuestra Señora de la Misericordia

Esta semana, 24 de septiembre, voy a celebrar con las otras hermanas y asociados de mi congregación la fiesta de la patrona nuestra, Nuestra Señora de la Misericordia. Bueno, no es como otros años porque no podemos reunirnos todos en un espacio, el Centro de la Misericordia en Rochester, sino en comunidades individuales y virtualmente. Se fundó la congregación en 1831 por Catalina McAuley en Dublín de Irlanda.

Catalina quería ayudar a los necesitados de Dublín y las mujeres que venían a la ciudad desde el campo. Hoy en día todavía el Instituto de las Hermanas de la Misericordia de las Américas quiere servir a los necesitados, los enfermos y los que faltan una educación adecuada. Como María, la madre de Jesús quería entrar plenamente en la misión de su Hijo, también nosotras, con María como nuestro modelo de fe, estamos abiertas a recibir la Palabra de Dios y ponerla en acción en nuestras propias vidas y en la vida del Instituto.

Estamos en solidaridad con los que son económicamente pobres, y especialmente con las mujeres y los niños. Apoyamos a las mujeres que buscan la plenitud de la vida e igualdad en la Iglesia y la sociedad. Queremos que los seres humanos estén en armonía con la creación. Tantas veces las acciones de los seres humanos son causas por la destrucción de la naturaleza. Vemos que necesitamos crecer en un aprecio por la realidad internacional de la congregación; aprendiendo trabajar en cooperación con las de otras culturas. Intentamos apoyar a los inmigrantes y refugiados—los que buscan la paz y huyen de la pobreza, la injusticia y la violencia. Luchamos por la justicia en muchas áreas de la vida.

Como en todas las vidas es necesario juntar la oración y la acción. Actuando por parte de Dios sin tener una buena relación con Dios no sirve. La fundadora escribió una oración que usamos mucho.

Family Ministry

Gospel Reading Matthew 20:1-16

In the parable of the workers in the vineyard, Jesus teaches about God's generous mercy.

The workers in this parable sound very much like squabbling children, comparing what they have each been given and making complaints to the parent. Among children there is a tendency to equate love with gifts and material things. This tendency can devolve into a spirit of entitlement, which runs counter to the spirit of gratitude. Any effort we make to overcome this tendency, to keep love from being entwined with gifts and possessions, will enable our children to accept completely the love that God gives freely and generously. Observe together any tendency within your family to make comparisons. Are children sometimes heard saying that another child received a greater portion of a favorite food at dinner or dessert? Does one person complain that a parent spends more time with one child over another? Ask if such comparisons are helpful. Discuss together why such comparisons are made. Then read together today's Gospel, Matthew 20:1-16. Consider these questions: Why do the workers grumble? Is the landowner's assessment accurate? Unfortunately, we are sometimes like these workers when we make the comparisons we discussed earlier.

Conclude in prayer together remembering that love cannot and ought not to be measured. Sit quietly together acknowledging God's great love for each person as individuals and for your family. Pray together today's psalm, Psalm 145, or the Lord's Prayer.
