

Fr. Mike's Message...

Raise your hand if you have ever said or done anything to someone that you immediately regretted.

My guess is that just about everyone who is reading this is either raising their hand or at least nodding in agreement. We all make mistakes; we all say and do things that we wish we could take back. But of course, we can't take it back. When we say or do something hurtful to someone, the guilt can eat away at us. It becomes a huge weight on our shoulders, a terrible burden to bear. The same is true with our sins. Our sins are our offenses against God, and the guilt of our sins can weigh us down as much as an offense against a family member or close friend. Often, however, we don't even realize how much it is affecting us, until we go to the sacrament of confession and feel the weight lift off our shoulders. I have said this before, but there have been times where I have seen people almost float out of the confessional after there confession, because they feel so much lighter and freer with the weight of sin off their shoulders. Just as we need forgiveness from God, so to do we need to forgive others who wronged us. God forgives us our sins because he loves us so much. All he asks is that we show that same type of compassion and love to others. So, if you are struggling to forgive someone who has wronged you, or are still holding on to a grudge, I encourage you to try and let go of that anger and bitterness. Seek them out and try for a reconciliation. Even if they haven't yet asked you for forgiveness, seek them out anyway. They might not know how to approach you to apologize. The pain that is eating at you might also be eating at them as well. That simple act of forgiveness might be able to bring healing to both you and the other person as well. Share God's merciful loving spirit as often as you can. Remember, to err is human, but to forgive is divine.

Los Ángeles en la Vida de la Iglesia

Esta semana, 29 de sept., vamos a celebrar la fiesta de los arcángeles Miguel, Gabriel y Rafael. Ellos no son como otros santos porque no fueron personas corporales. No hablamos de sus padres ni de donde eran. Son unos de los seres espirituales que las Sagradas Escrituras llamaba ángeles; la existencia de ellos es una verdad de fe. No podemos verlos; son criaturas de Dios entre sus criaturas visibles e invisibles. Son pocos que tienen nombres: Miguel, Gabriel, Rafael y Uriel. Por el anuncio a María por el arcángel Gabriel sabemos más de Gabriel que de Miguel o Rafael. Hay una oración a Miguel creada por el Papa León XIII en la cual pedimos a Miguel por la fuerza para defendernos contra el mal en el mundo y en nuestras vidas. Miguel significa "el que se parece a Dios." Hemos visto dibujos de Miguel, el jefe de los ejércitos de Dios, con un traje de soldado romano, y con una espada y alas grandes y doradas. San Miguel es el jefe de los ejércitos de Dios; frecuentemente es representado con un pie en la cabeza de demonios, con su espada en alto listo para combatirlos.

Encontramos a Miguel en el libro de Apocalipsis como capitán de los ejecitos de Dios triunfando sobre los demonios, expulsándolos del cielo, y arrojándolos sobre la tierra. Vendrá un tiempo de gran liberación en el futuro, pero mientras tanto vamos enfrentando el mal, y es posible pedir la ayuda de San Miguel:

San Miguel Arcángel, defiéndenos en la lucha. Sé nuestro amparo contra la perversidad y acechanzas del demonio. Que Dios manifieste sobre él su poder, es nuestra humilde súplica. Y tú, oh, Príncipe de la Milicia Celestial, con el poder que Dios te ha conferido, arroja al infierno a Satanás, y a los demás espíritus malignos que vagan por el mundo para la perdición de las almas. Amén.

Es verdad que los ángeles son muy importantes en la Iglesia, pero son criaturas de Dios, por lo que no se les puede igualar a Dios ni adorarlos como si fueran dioses. Según la enseñanza de la Iglesia hay muchos ángeles que sirven como custodios de los seres humanos, ayudándonos estar mas cerca de Dios, protegiéndonos, guiándonos, asistiéndonos en la vida diaria. 


