

Dia Mundial de las Misiones

Hoy en la segunda lectura San Pablo, Silvano y Timoteo dan gracias por la manera que los tesalonicenses recibieron el mensaje del evangelio y como sus obras manifiestan la fe en Jesucristo. Jesucristo había pedido a sus apóstoles y a nosotros llevar las buenas noticias a otros. La Iglesia designó el 18 de octubre este año el domingo mundial de las misiones. El Papa Francisco en su mensaje por la ocasión escribió que toda la Iglesia recibe una invitación a divulgar el evangelio por el amor de Dios y del prójimo. ¿Es nuestra respuesta igual a la de Isaías: "Aquí estoy, mándame?" El Papa nos dice que tenemos que remar juntos, y es el Espiritu Santo que nos empuja y nos trae. El Papa escribe, "La vida humana nace del amor de Dios, crece en el amor y tiende hacia el amor. Nadie está excluido del amor de Dios...Nosotros, la Iglesia, continuamos la misión de Jesús en la historia y nos envía por doquier para que, a través de nuestro testimonio de fe y el anuncio del evangelio, Dios siga manifestando su amor y pueda tocar y transformar corazones, mentes, cuerpos, sociedades y culturas, en todo lugar y tiempo."

¿Está convencido de esto, de tu misión como respuesta a la llamada de Dios? Hay que dar testimonio de tu fe en Dios, hay que proclamar el evangelio por palabras y obras. No es fácil si no tengamos una relación personal con Dios. En este tiempo de la pandemia debemos "estar mas atentos a nuestra forma de relacionarnos con los demás." Por la oración Dios "mueve nuestro corazón, nos abre a las necesidades de amor, dignidad y libertad de nuestros hermanos, así como al cuidado de toda la creación." El evangelio nos pide amar a nuestros hermanos y a Dios por compartir el evangelio y por nuestras acciones de ayuda material y caridad.

Gospel Reading Matthew 22:34-40

The Pharisees continue to test Jesus with a question about the greatest commandment.

Children learn about love from real, concrete examples witnessed in family life. We can help children to love God and love their neighbors by showing everyday acts of love, generosity, and kindness—our own expressions of our love for God. These acts, small and large, are the expression of what Jesus identified as the two greatest commandments: love God and love neighbor.

Make a poster together as a family. Write the words Love God in the center of the poster and write the words Love Neighbor near each of the four sides of the poster. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 22:34-40. Talk about how Jesus taught us that our love for God is revealed in the love that we show to other people. On the poster, use pictures and words to show some of the ways that your family shows their love for other people. Pray together that your family will continue to express your love for God by loving others. Pray the Act of Love. FOMILY
