

#### Fr. Mike's Message...

#### A Different Kind of "Triduum"

The Triduum (Latin for "three days") is the period of time that begins on Holy Thursday and ends at the Easter Vigil/Easter Sunday. These three days mark the high point of the Liturgical Year, as we celebrate the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. While the Triduum occurs in the Spring, the Church also celebrates another "triduum" in the Fall. We just celebrated this three-day period last weekend. Every year it falls on the days of October 31, November 1, and November 2. It is a three-day period where we remember the souls of all the faithful departed who have gone before us.

This begins on October 31. Now, in secular society, this day is celebrated as Halloween, a day where we celebrate everything that is spooky and scary. Many of these traditions stem from Celtic as well as other pagan cultures. However, Halloween's connection to spirits, souls, and the dead also has its roots in Christianity. After all, Halloween is simply "All Hallows Eve", the night before the Church celebrates the hallowed ones: the Saints who have died and are in Heaven. Halloween was most likely also influenced by the primarily Mexican "Día de los Muertos" (Day of the Dead) celebration that goes from November 1 to November 2, where people create altars for deceased loved ones, celebrate with traditional food and drink, and even sometimes dressing in costume. In the Church, it has often been commemorated as a day of fasting and prayer for the dead, in preparation for the following day's

On November 1, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of All Saints, or All Saints Day. It is a very special day in the liturgical year, so much so that it is one of the Holy Days of Obligation. It is the day where we celebrate all those men and women who have, by virtue of their lives on Earth, have entered into the Heavenly Kingdom of God. This includes the ones that we know and honor by name, as well as the ones that we will never know about but lived holy lives nonetheless. The saints are our role models for how to live on Earth, while also interceding for us in Heaven. This is a reminder that we can always turn to the saints in prayer, and we are assured that they will always be guiding us along our Earthly journey.

The Fall "triduum" ends on November 2, the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed, or All Soul's Day. On this day, we recognize all those who have died. This is particularly a day in which people celebrate loved ones who have passed. But this day is markedly different from All Saints day. That day is a day of celebration for those who have finished the journey and are in paradise. On All Souls Day, we remember those who have died and are still in Purgatory awaiting entry into the Heavenly Kingdom. This is an important day of prayer. While we pray to the Saints, we pray for the souls that are still on the journey, waiting to enter their eternal home.

The month of November has been designated as a special month where the Church remembers and commemorates the dead. I encourage all of you to take the opportunity to pray for loved ones you have lost as well as those in Purgatory who still need prayers but have no one to pray for them. Remember that life is short, so let's make the most of it while we are here, in humble and joyful service to God.

We are limited to the number of people at each Mass, with social distancing. You are not obligated to go to Sunday Mass at this time. The Bishop encourages people to go to daily Mass to help with the overflow of Sunday Masses. Please do not sit where there is tape across a pew. Also, please remember to practice these few guidelines, below, when coming to Mass. These are for the safety of you and others.

- ⇒ If you don't feel well, please stay home.
- ⇒ Please wear a mask in church at all times. This protects all, especially our elderly.
- $\Rightarrow$  Wash your hands with sanitizer when you enter & when leaving the church.
- $\Rightarrow$  Please remain 6 feet apart from each other. Please sit in open pews.

# Gospel Reading Matthew 25:1-13

Jesus tells the parable of the wise and foolish virgins, teaching his disciples the importance of being prepared to receive the Kingdom of Heaven. In the daily activities of family life, we can easily find excuses for not attending to our spiritual lives. If not given top priority, prayer and reading Scripture risk becoming occasional activities rather than daily practices. In today's Gospel, Jesus reminds us that if we fail to give our spiritual life priority, we will find ourselves unprepared to receive Jesus. Daily prayer and spiritual practice keeps us ready to receive Jesus.

Gather together as a family and talk about some of the things our faith Calls us to do every day and every week to keep God first in our lives. Talk about what might happen if we don't do these things regularly. Explain to your family that Jesus taught us that it is important to keep ourselves ready to re-Ceive him when he comes again. Tell them to listen as you read the parable that Jesus tells in today's Gospel. Read aloud Matthew 25:1-13. Talk with your family about why Jesus says that it is so important to remain ready to receive the Kingdom of Heaven. Pray together that your family will always keep God first in your lives so that you will all be prepared to receive Jesus when he comes. Pray together the Act of Hope. FUMILY
