Advent! Christmas! Holy Family Sunday! New Year's Day (The day Jesus got His name!) Epiphany! The Baptism of the Lord! And, in a little over a month, Ash Wednesday! The Holy Season of Lent! Palm Sunday! Holy Thursday! Good Friday! Easter! The Easter Season! Pentecost! But, come on, really? The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time? Booor-ing! How... *ordinary*.... But is it? Actually, our *ordinary* lives as followers of Christ are absolutely *extraordinary*. As we hear the readings this Sunday, we can hear the voice of God calling each one of us to an extraordinary life. Really? Most definitely. Our Heavenly Father, who loved us *so much* that he sent His Only Son to be our Savior, Our Lord, and *our brother*, has in store for us something really extraordinary. For we have been called out of a world dominated by sin into the grace-filled life of the followers of Jesus Christ. As Samuel answered the call he received in the middle of the night and the Apostles answered the call when they heard it in the land of Israel, so too is God calling you to an *extraordinary* life! Think about it. We come to Mass each Sunday and Holy Day. Sometimes the church is decorated for Christmas or for Easter — poinsettias or lilies! But, at other times, the church looks, well, ordinary. But what happens here at every Mass? The Word of God is proclaimed, prayers of praise are offered, and — a drum roll, please — the Lord Himself offers us *Himself! He offers us His Body and His Blood*. Can there be anything more extraordinary than that? I can't think of anything. What do we hear in today's Gospel? We hear that two disciples of John the Baptist followed Jesus. And "Jesus turned... and said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "...where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come, and you will see." So they went and saw where Jesus was staying." Jesus, in this Ordinary Time calls you as well. There are no Christmas trees to distract us from where Jesus is now staying. Look, there he is! On the altar, in the hands of the priest, in the Tabernacle, waiting for you, calling you, welcoming you, desiring to make your life *extraordinary*, calling you to that place where, "every tear will be wiped away" to that place where you will become like God for "you will see him as he is!" Rejoice for the Lamb of God Who takes away the sins of the world is here, with us forever!

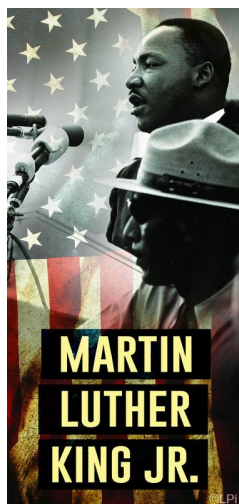

Llamados por Dios para Servir y Dejar a que Otros Conozcan a Dios

Ya hemos dejado el tiempo de Navidad y hemos entrado al
Tiempo Ordinario de la Iglesia. La primera lectura que
encontramos este domingo es el Señor llamando a Samuel en su
sueño tres veces. Cada vez inmediatamente Samuel responde a
Elí “aquí estoy” hasta que Elí se dio cuenta que Samuel tenía
que responder directamente al Señor y no a Elí. Fue Dios que
estaba buscando a Samuel, y después de responder directamente
a Dios, Samuel hacía lo que Dios pedía en su vida. Dios estaba
con él, ayudándolo ser un seguidor fiel.

En el tiempo de Navidad recordamos que Jesús nació por el
amor de Dios y después se creció en todo sentido—celebramos
su Bautismo la semana pasada. El compromiso de Bautismo nos
conecta a Jesucristo fuertemente. En el evangelio de hoy
escuchamos a Juan el Bautista indicando a dos de sus propios
discípulos que ese hombre Jesús era el Cordero de Dios. Juan
aceptó que él había cumplido su ministerio y ahora fuera
necesario para ellos conocer a Jesús directamente. Jesús pudiera
ayudar a ellos llenar sus corazones y vidas con la Verdad, la Luz
y un Camino directo. Siguió a Jesús sin saber exactamente lo
que querían de Él y lo que Él iba a pedir de ellos. “¿Qué
buscan?” Jesús les preguntó. No supieron exactamente lo que
estaban buscando. Quizás fuera Él que los guiara a la felicidad,
a la Verdad, a Dios. ¿Dónde estaba eso? Puede ser en la casa de
Él, en su manera de vivir y de actuar. Como Juan había
predicado quizás Él también pudiera enseñarlos. Fascinados por
Él, se quedaron con Él ese día. Pero después de eso los dos
compartieron con otros la buena nueva que ellos habían
encontrado al Mesías. ¡Hay que compartir las buenas noticias!
¿Pueden recordar tiempos cuando han tenido buenas noticias y
que querían informar a otros especialmente a los más conocidos
inmediatamente? Es difícil mantener su silencio.

Ellos estaban buscando la felicidad y esa felicidad estaba en
escuchar a Jesucristo y hacer lo que Él quería de ellos.
Queremos complacer a las personas que nos aman y muestran
ese amor. Queremos hacer lo que el otro nos pide. Así es con el
evangelio; Jesucristo ha compartido una manera de vivir que nos
traerá la felicidad. “Aquí estamos, Señor, para escuchar y hacer
tu voluntad.”

Este puede ser nuestro reto este año: responder con acciones a
la llamada de Dios diariamente en nuestras vidas. Dios está con
nosotros.

Family Ministry

Gospel Reading John 1:35-42

John the Baptist recognizes Jesus as the Lamb of God, and Jesus receives his first followers.

In today's Gospel we learn about one of at least two family relations that appear among Jesus' first disciples. Andrew is the brother of Simon, whom Jesus renames Peter. In next week's Gospel, we will learn about the brothers James and John, the sons of Zebedee. We know from the letters of Paul and other witnesses to the early Church that it was a common occurrence for an entire household to be baptized together. From the very beginning of the Church, families helped one another to know and follow Jesus. We hope and pray that this continues to be true in our family life.

Before your family gathers, look around your house and gather some items that your family might have that remind you of your faith. Perhaps you have a cross or crucifix displayed in your home, a statue of Mary, or statues or other art depicting saints. In today's Gospel we learn about how Andrew led his brother, Simon, to Jesus. Read today's Gospel, John 1:35-42.

In our family life, we also help to lead one another to Jesus. Talk together about the items that you gathered, discussing what these items mean to you and how you might use them during the day for prayer. Pray that your family will continue to help one another grow in our faith in Jesus. Pray together the Glory Be to the Father.
