

Domingo de la Palabra de Dios

En septiembre de 2019 el Papa Francisco instituyó este domingo especial en el aniversario (1,600) de la muerte de San Gerónimo quien había traducido las Escrituras a latín, el lenguaje del pueblo. Este domingo especial pone énfasis en la importancia de las Sagradas Escrituras para todas nuestras vidas como creyentes empezando con el uso de las Escrituras en las liturgias de los sacramentos. Observamos este domingo cada año en el tercer domingo del Tiempo Ordinario. Realmente un día especial como esto es para despertarnos a la necesidad de crecer en el conocimiento y el amor de las Escrituras y del Señor resucitado, quien sigue hablándonos por medio de su Palabra.

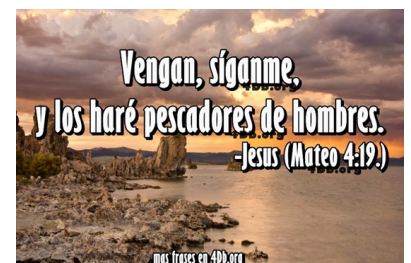
Cuando inauguró este domingo especial Francisco había dado algunas sugerencias para destacar mas la importancia de las Escrituras; por ejemplo, llevar en procesión el Evangelionario o ponerlo encima del altar. También los que predicán deben ayudar al pueblo entender las Escrituras, y aun sugiriendo dejar espacio para el silencio para poder meditar para que la gente pueda recibir la Palabra hacia adentro.

Los que proclaman la Palabra deben prepararla interiormente para entender el significado de la lectura y exteriormente practicarla. Es posible dar una corta monición o introducción a la lectura ante que sea proclamada. El ambón de donde es proclamado la Palabra debe ser usado solo para la proclamación de la Palabra de Dios, la homilía y posiblemente las intercesiones. Hay que mantener respeto para el ambón como tenemos respeto para el altar.

A veces hay una oportunidad en la comunidad de estudiar y reflexionar sobre los textos de las lecturas del domingo que está por venir. También siempre usamos un salmo como una respuesta a la primera lectura. Sería bueno conseguir un mejor conocimiento y entendimiento de los salmos, y posiblemente orar los salmos por orar la Liturgia de las Horas que pone énfasis en la oración de los salmos. Hay una liturgia para orar en comunidad los salmos—un libro de las Sagradas Escrituras.

Si nunca se ha sentado para leer las Escrituras, sería bueno este año conocer a Jesucristo personalmente por medio del uso de la Biblia. Este año usamos el evangelio de Marcos ante todo en las celebraciones litúrgicas de domingo. Es el evangelio que fue escrito primero y es el más corto de los evangelios. Empezamos este Tiempo Ordinario la semana pasada usando el evangelio de Juan con Juan el Bautista indicando a sus discípulos que deben seguir a Jesús, y una vez que ellos van caminando detrás de él, Jesús los invita a seguirlo. Hoy, usando el evangelio de Marcos, vemos a Jesús predicando y después caminando a la orilla del lago Galilea mientras que él invita a ciertas personas a seguirlo.

Así es en nuestra vida cristiana: Jesús nos invita personalmente y podemos aceptar o negar la invitación. Al aceptar la invitación, debemos darnos cuenta de que es una invitación a la conversión. Después de relacionarnos con Jesús y de conocerlo, no podemos mantenernos igual como antes. Ahora Jesús extiende la invitación a usted por leer un poco del evangelio de Marcos cada día y reflexionarlo y aplicarlo a su vida diaria. ¡Feliz seguimiento de Jesucristo! Si no tiene una Biblia, yo tengo algunas por \$15. *Hermana Kay*

Family Ministry

Gospel Reading Mark 1:14-20

Jesus calls the fishermen, Simon and Andrew, James and John, to be his disciples

Today's Gospel describes how Jesus called his first disciples and the immediacy with which these men dropped everything to follow him. We can only begin to imagine what Jesus' presence must have been like to invoke such a response in these first disciples. While a few of us might relate to such a radical conversion, many of us would find such a sudden change in ourselves or in another person unsettling. There are few things for which we would willingly drop everything. And yet this is the immediacy with which these first disciples responded to Jesus. These first disciples were willing to drop everything in order to make Jesus and the Kingdom of God the most important things in their lives.

Gather as a family and talk about circumstances in which you have had to "drop everything." (the call to pick up a sick child from school, the cry of a hurt or angry child) How did you feel about having to change your plans in each of these situations? How do we feel when someone asks us to drop everything to help him or her? For many of us, it is not easy to drop everything to respond to the needs of another.

Read today's Gospel, Mark 1:14-20. Invite your family to imagine what Jesus' presence and invitation to these first followers must have been like that they responded by leaving their livelihood to become his disciples. How might our life change if we understood the Kingdom of God to be as important and immediate in our lives? Ask God to help you experience the Kingdom of God with such immediacy. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.

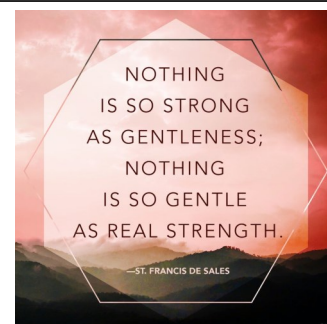
