

# ¿Es Malo Que los Esposos Busquen Agradarse?

San Pablo en la segunda lectura de hoy quiere que todos vivieran sin preocupaciones. El desea que los solteros y solteras se preocupan de las cosas de Dios. El, siendo un hombre soltero, piensa que su estilo de vida es mejor porque puede dar su tiempo a las cosas de Dios. El piensa que los casados—hombres y mujeres—están divididos en el corazón. Se preocupan de las cosas de esta vida y de cómo agradar a su esposa/esposo.

¿Qué piensan ustedes: es malo que los esposos busquen agradarse? Sería malo de no buscar agradarse. Eso no debe ocurrir solamente durante el noviazgo. Es como pensar en pescar—el éxito es en pescar un pez y no importa lo que pasa después—uno va a comerlo, pero no necesita dar nada al pez. Ya pertenece al pescador. Gospel Reading Mark 1:21-28

Jesus heals a man with an unclean spirit and his fame spreads throughout Galilee

The people who heard Jesus teach and saw him heal in today's Gospel were said to have been astonished and amazed by the authority of his teaching. So compelling were Jesus' words and actions that the news about him could not be contained; it spread quickly throughout all of Galilee. Two thousand years later, the news about Jesus continues to spread. We are called to participate in sharing the Good News of Jesus with others in our words and in our deeds. Gather as a family and try to name some amazing things, events, or people. In today's Gospel we hear that the people were astonished and amazed by their experience of Jesus. Read today's Gospel, Mark 1:21-28. What did the people who saw and heard Jesus find so amazing? (In Jesus, the people heard and saw the power and authority of God at work.) People should see in our lives the power and authority of God at work. Can you name any modern examples of people in whom you have seen the power and authority of God at work? Conclude in prayer together that we will experience wonder at the work of God in our world today. Pray together the Prayer to the Holy Spirit. .

# PUBLIC POLICY ADVOCACY WEEKEND February 13/14, 2021

Advocacy Issue: Funding for Nourish New York initiative

NOURISH NEW YORK is a New York State initiative that provides funding to Food Banks to purchase New York State-produced farm products. This accomplishes two goals.: it offers market support to farmers, the fishing community, and food processors who have been impacted by the economic effects of the pandemic, while getting high-quality food to individuals and families across the state through the regional Food Banks to local parish and community food pantries. The initiative provided \$35 million in funding from May I to December 31, 2020. 4,152 farms have provided over 17 million pounds of high quality New York-produced food to New Yorkers in-need.
