

For most of us, the parts of the gospels that we remember the best are the parables that Jesus told. We can immediately recall the parable of the good Samaritan, or the story of the man born deaf. Jesus knew that stories would be the way into people's hearts. They have a way of making us ask, "Now what is that story telling me?

Megan McKenna is a popular speaker, story-teller, women's advocate who is known for her retreats, books, and wisdom. Below is one of the stories she tells in THE ARROWS OF GOD, a small book in which she retells the familiar story of the hidden treasure. Hopefully, it will generate some discussion among us as to how it relates to the society and times we are living right now.

Once upon a time there was a king who ruled a small kingdom. It wasn't great, and it wasn't really known for any of its resources or people. But the king did have a diamond, a great perfect diamond that had been in his family for generations. He kept it on display for all to see and appreciate. People came from all over the country to admire it and gaze at it.

Soon the word of it spread to neighboring countries, and more people came to look at it. Soon the people felt that the diamond was theirs; somehow it gave them a sense of pride, of dignity, of worth. Then one day a soldier came to the king with the news that, although no one had touched the diamond, for it was guarded night and day, the diamond was cracked. The king ran to see, and sure enough, there was a crack right through the middle of the diamond.

Immediately, he summoned all the jewelers of the land, and had them look at the diamond. One after another they examined the diamond and gave the bad news to the king: the diamond was useless; it was irredeemably flawed. The king was crushed; so were the people. Somehow they felt they had lost everything.

Then out of nowhere came an old man who claimed to be a jeweler. He asked to see the diamond. After examination, he looked up and confidently told the king, "I can fix it. In fact, I can make it better than it was before." The king was shocked and a bit leery. The old man said, "Give me the jewel, and in a week I'll bring it back fixed." Now, the king was not about to let the stone out of his sight, even if it was ruined, so he gave the old man a room, all the tools and food and drink he needed and he waited. The whole kingdom waited. It was a long week.

At the end of the week the old man appeared with the stone in his hand and gave it to the king. The king couldn't believe his eyes. It was magnificent. The old man had fixed it and it was even better than it was before. He had used the crack that ran through the middle of the stone as a stem and carved an intricate, full-blown rose, leaves, and thorns into the diamond. It was exquisite.

The king was overjoyed and offered the old man half of his kingdom. He had taken something beautiful and perfect and improved upon it! But the old man refused in front of everyone, saying, "I didn't do that at all. What I did was to take something flawed and cracked at its heart and turn it into something beautiful."

"¡Ay de mí, si no anuncio el evangelio!" Así se expresa San Pablo en su primera carta a los corintios. Esa fe firme que Pablo tenía en Jesucristo al escribir a los corintios no siempre había tenido-- no hasta algunos años antes cuando la luz de Cristo lo tiró al suelo y la voz de Cristo le preguntó por qué él estaba persiguiéndolo. Una fe gratuita, una fe firme, una fe que le pidió acción y compartimiento, una fe que le dio vida, una fe que le dio un porqué por vivir.

Por años Pablo no había prestado atención a la verdad del evangelio de Jesucristo, pero una vez que vio la luz y fue bautizado, él era un discípulo firme, uno que creía firmemente en la verdad del evangelio y la salvación por medio de Jesucristo.

¿Y nosotros? ¿Nos sentimos tan retados por nuestra fe, nuestra creencia en Jesucristo y sus palabras de hacer de todos pueblos sus discípulos y de enseñar a otros su evangelio? ¿Nos sentimos tan convencidos que vamos a decir: "¿Ay de mí, si no anuncio el evangelio?" ¿Cómo puedes anunciarlo a tu familiaa tu esposo(a) y a tus hijos, a tus compañeros de trabajo, a tus vecinos, tus compañeros de clase? No es solo con palabras; los hechos, las acciones, y la manera por la cual estás con otra persona enseñan mucho. Vuelve al evangelio de este domingo. Jesús se levantó temprano para ir aparte para orar y ganar la fuerza para su día de acción. Su día estaba lleno de actividades: de prestar oído al sufrimiento y los dolores de la gente y al mal y las tentaciones que existían en todas partes. Escuchando, echando afuera el mal, consolando, curando, estando presente, sirviendo de muchas maneras y también predicando con palabras, pero más frecuentemente predicando con acción.

Piensa en tus días y las oportunidades que tienes para mostrar que tienes tiempo para la otra persona, para escuchar a pesar de tu cansancio, para aliviar el dolor del otro... Piensa cómo puedes servir al otro—lavar los platos después de la comida para la cocinera, preparar alguna comida favorita para su esposo o hijos. Puedes hacer algo que no le gusta hacer sin quejarse o dar al otro un regalito, aunque no es un día especial. Ah, hay tantas maneras de mostrar el amor, la bondad, el respeto, la empatía al otro. Así uno va predicando el amor del evangelio, y otros entonces pueden decir: "Miren cómo los cristianos se aman uno al otro." Que esto sea un desafío para todos nosotros.

Family Ministry

Gospel Reading Mark 1:29-39

Jesus cures Simon's mother-in-law and many others as well. We know from last week's Gospel that Jesus gathered and prayed with the community in the synagogue. Today we learn that Jesus also took the time to pray alone. Following the example of Jesus, we also pray together with our community, and we take the time to pray alone. Our children observe our prayer with others. We might want to take the opportunity to talk with them about our private prayer, however, so that through our example, they may learn to make private prayer an important part of their daily lives. Gather as a family and talk about the ways in which your family prays together (at Mass, grace before meals, bedtime prayers). Invite each member of the family to talk about his or her private prayer: When do you pray? Where do you pray? How do you pray? What do you pray for?

Jesus modeled for us a life of prayer. Read together today's Gospel, Mark 1:29-39. Talk about this Gospel with your family. Ask questions such as the following: What do you think Jesus was praying about in today's Gospel? What guidance have you received from God in prayer? Conclude by asking God to bless our times of prayer so that we can know and follow God's ways. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.


