I'm sure that in any given week, you receive many requests for donations. You deserve to know how those donations are used, so following is an outline of what the annual Catholic Ministries Appeal (CMA) is all about. The money received in this annual drive is used for the following ministries, some of which support the people of St. Michael's Parish directly while others help our neigh-

-- Pastoral Care. People from the diocese, when they are patients at Strong or Unity Hospitals, are visited by our priest-chaplains. (This is an outreach that is very close to my heart, as it was my assignment until I returned to St. Michael's.) Priest-chaplains visit the sick, bringing them the Eucharist and working with their families.

-- Priestly vocations. Your CMA gift helps to fund the formation of those entering the permanent diaconate as well as those preparing for diocesan priesthood. Right now there are a number of seminarians preparing to serve in the Diocese of Rochester. The Vocations Office works to make this possible.

--Outreach to the needy. CMA helps to fund programs such as Catholic Charities, which serves individuals who have developmental disabilities, as well as their families. It counsels those who need employment support and education, as well as provides childcare and adoption

The Catholic Family Center offers housing services for the elderly, the homeless, refugees, and those in need of utilities assistance. It reaches out to approximately 250,000 people each year.

--Faith Formation. Your gifts have made possible Youth Ministry programs such as diocesan-led retreats and national events; e.g., the National Catholic Youth Conference. They support college campus ministries, providing spiritual homes for our children while they are away studying and getting ready for their journey to adulthood. I encourage all parishioners to participate in this annual act of love and support.

--Migrant Ministries. This outreach helps to provide housing, education assistance, and worship facilities for migrant workers throughout our diocese. The diocese has established Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish in Marion, NY as part of its outreach to these workers and their families.

These are such important areas of our lives. I wholeheartedly encourage you to consider contributing, in any way you can, to the Catholic Ministries Appeal Fund. Thank you and God bless all of you.

It's tax time. Have you considered a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)?

When planning your IRA withdrawal strategy, you may want to consider making charitable donations through QCD.

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your required minimum distributions (RMDs) for the year, as long as certain rules are met.

In addition to the benefits of giving to charity, a QCD excludes the amount donated from taxable income, which is unlike regular withdrawals form an IRA. Keeping your taxable income lower may reduce the impact to certain tax credits and deductions, including Social Security and Medicare. Also, QCDs don't require that you itemize, which due to the recent tax law changes, means you may decide to take advantage of the higher standard deduction, but still use a QCD for charitable giving. Orando el Padre Nuestro

Durante el tiempo de la Cuaresma es bueno mirar nuestra oración. ¿Oras cada día? ¿O cada dos días? ¿O una vez por semana? Es bueno mirar cómo es tu comunicación con Dios. Oración debe estar dirigida a Dios, y es solo para Dios. Por eso no cabe en la oración el actuar para que otros puedan verte "humildemente" metido en la oración.



Cuando los discípulos pidieron a Jesús enseñarles a orar, El los enseñó el Padre Nuestro. Tan íntima es la oración que podamos dirigirnos a Dios como su hijo o hija. El hijo o la hija habla con cariño, con amor a su padre, y así debe ser

en el Padre Nuestro, pero hay una diferencia aquí porque estamos compartiendo con otros; decimos nuestro padre. Desde el primer siglo los cristianos han usado esta oración para su oración personal y oración en comunidad.

La oración enfatiza la gloria de Dios, y también que es nuestro padre. Jesús dijo a sus discípulos que ellos pudieron llamarlo a Dios Padre como Jesús lo hacía. Esto nos da otra relación con Dios.

Nosotros los discípulos nos damos cuenta que Dios santifica su propia nombre y también extiende su propio reino.

La oración es en el plural; nos damos cuenta de las dimensiones comunitarias de la oración. Pedimos por el pan del día, por el perdón, por protección del mal. Hay una parte donde reconocemos que tenemos una responsabilidad mutua de perdonar a otras personas.

En este tiempo de la Cuaresma sabemos que Jesús habló de ayunos, dando caridad y la oración como importantes. Nuestra oración debe ser sencilla y humilde, siempre con una consciencia de que no somos una gran cosa. Cuando oramos, la manera mejor es entregarnos totalmente a Dios. Esta oración se dirige a Dios como un niño habla a su padre. Reconociendo esto podemos ver el cariño que resulta en la oración y puede inspirar más confianza en nosotros.

Si queremos dedicarnos a una vida de oración, debemos reconocer que Dios es nuestro Padre, que debemos santificar el nombre de Dios en todo lo que hacemos, que debemos extender el Reino de Dios, que debemos hacer la voluntad de Dios, y que debemos reconocer nuestra dependencia en Dios por nuestras necesidades y que necesitamos perdonar a otras, huir de tentaciones y con la ayuda de Dios estar lejos de mal.

Lo que puede ayudarnos es vivir siempre en la presencia de Dios, poniendo las necesidades del Reino sobre todo y solamente querer seguir la voluntad de Dios, siempre con la esperanza de tener satisfechas las necesidades diarias, el perdón

de nuestros pecados y deudas, y liberación del mal.

Ponemos confianza en nuestro Padre que nos protege, nos ama, nos perdona y provee por nuestras necesidades.

Family Ministry

Gospel Reading John 2:13-25

Jesus drives out the moneychangers from the Temple and says that he will destroy the temple and raise it up again.

Today's Gospel invites us to reflect upon our worship of God. For Jesus and his Jewish contemporaries, the Temple was an important, holy place where they gathered to worship God. The Christian understanding of worship was transformed in light of Jesus' Resurrection. In the Christian understanding, God is worshiped in a person, the person of Jesus Christ. As we read in today's Gospel, Jesus is himself the Temple that will be destroyed, but in three days God will raise him up again.

As you gather as a family, talk about places and times when you have experienced God's presence. After his Resurrection, Jesus' disciples understood that Jesus was present with them as they gathered to pray and especially when they gathered to share a meal. Read together today's Gospel, John 2:13-25. Jesus teaches us in today's Gospel that he is God's presence with us. Thank God for Jesus' presence with us, especially in the Sacrament of the Eucharist. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.
