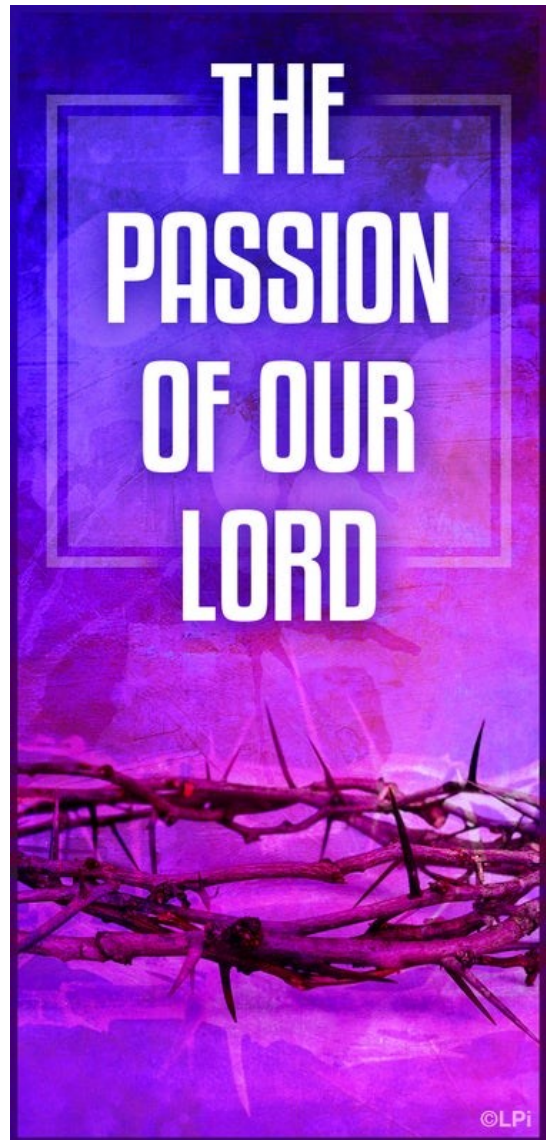

Desde la Alabanza Hasta la Muerte

¡Semana Santa—la semana más importante entre todas las celebraciones que tenemos en nuestra religión! Hoy con la celebración de Domingo de Ramos vemos el tipo de rey es Jesús por la manera que Él entra la ciudad de Jerusalén. No está vestido de ropa fina con corona encima de su cabeza. No es un rey guerrero encima de un caballo que significaba supremacía, pero es un hombre humilde y pobre sentado encima de un burrito que significa normalidad y deseos de paz. Mucha gente prepara su "alfombra roja" por extendiendo sus mantos y ramas cortadas en el campo. Obviamente no fue un rey rico, sino un hombre de Dios—conocido y humilde.

Leemos la pasión y la muerte de Jesús según San Marcos este año. Vemos a Jesús cenando con sus discípulos; seguramente estaban presentes más que los doce porque prepararon un cuarto más grande. Durante la cena Jesús sufrió porque supo que uno de los presentes iba a entregarlo para morir. A pesar de esto, Jesús quería dar a sus discípulos su presencia continua, su persona. "Esto es mi cuerpo. Esta es mi sangre que se derrama por todos." Todavía en nuestro tiempo tenemos esa presencia tan real con nosotros en el sacramento de la Eucaristía. Podemos recibir la fuerza para seguir adelante por medio del sacramento de la Eucaristía.

Seguimos el camino de Jesús hacia la muerte. En el huerto de Getsemaní vemos a Jesús sintiendo el miedo de la muerte, pero a la vez deseando hacer lo que su Padre quería de Él. La muerte es algo desconocido a nosotros, y muchos tienen miedo de ella, pero no podemos evitarla; algún día podemos orar como Jesús "No se haga lo que yo quiero, sino lo que tú quieres." Vamos aprendiendo de aceptar la voluntad de Dios.

Tan difícil es entender cómo la peor muerte para los criminales—crucifixión—puede estar conectado al ministerio del Mesías. Una mezcla de cosas y personas encontramos en esta vida de Jesús: los que profesaron su amor y fidelidad hasta que eso significaba morir, los discípulos temerosos que no tenían la valentía para seguir a Jesús muy de cerca por miedo de encontrar el mismo tipo de muerte como su maestro. La gente declara a Jesús su rey hasta que sus líderes religiosos estaban condenándolo y el líder del gobierno lo condenó. Así somos nosotros a veces. Nuestras convicciones no son bastante fuertes y nos dejamos aceptar ideas que van en contra de lo que creemos y deseamos. Una muchedumbre puede llevar a individuos a actuar de una manera diferente que su espíritu interior desea. ¡La cobardía!

Simón de Cirene es forzado a cargar la cruz de Jesús. ¿Cómo fue su reacción? ¿Estaba enojado, farfullando en voz baja todo el camino cuesta arriba? ¿O quizás en su interior sentía compasión por Jesús? ¿Y nosotros—cómo respondemos a las personas que tienen necesidades? ¿Vivimos la caridad? Decimos que somos cristianos—seguidores de Cristo. ¿Actuamos como Él? Que vivan esta semana santa como manera de merecer el perdón y mantenerse en el camino de Jesús. *Hna. Kay*
