

#### Fr. Mike's Message...

#### Divine Mercy Sunday

It has been one week since we began the Easter festivities with our celebration of Easter Sunday. The Sunday after Easter has been known by a few different names over the years: the Second Sunday of Easter, or sometimes referred to as Doubting Thomas Sunday (referencing our Gospel passage today). However, since 2000, this Sunday is now referred to as Divine Mercy Sunday. It was that year that Saint John Paul II instituted a new feast day, the feast of Divine Mercy, based on several visions and revelations received by St. Faustina Kowalska throughout her life. St. Faustina wrote in her diary about how Jesus Christ had been visiting her and revealed to her the mystery of his divine mercy and asked that she spread this devotion to his Divine Mercy throughout the world.

As human beings, we have limitations on everything that we do. We even have limitations on everything we can imagine. Of course, there is nothing limited or limiting about God. This is true of his love, his wisdom, his power, his goodness, his presence, and his mercy. What we celebrate on Divine Mercy Sunday is the infinite and perfect mercy that God is willing to give to us, if we but ask for it. That was the overarching message that Jesus conveyed to St. Faustina, and it is the message that he is continuing to convey to us. There is no sin too great for Jesus to forgive, no heart too hardened for Jesus to soften. The mercy of Jesus is like a fountain pouring forth from him, only waiting to be poured out onto each of us.

If you have the time, I would encourage everyone to come to St. John's Church in Clyde to celebrate the Feast of Divine Mercy. At 2 pm, we will begin an hour of Adoration in front of the Blessed Sacrament, with Fr. Michatek and myself spending that time hearing confessions. At 3 pm we will sing the beautiful Divine Mercy chaplet together, and the afternoon service will conclude with Benediction.

If it has been awhile since you last celebrated the Sacra-

ment of Confession, if there is guilt weighing on your soul, if you just need to place yourself before the Lord to feel his embrace, than please come to our Divine Mercy celebration. This is a wonderful opportunity to pour out our hearts to Christ and receive healing, peace and above all, his Divine, Infinite Mercy.

#### Que Vivamos lo que Decimos que Creemos

El compartir lo que tenemos a veces es dificil porque pensamos que habíamos trabajado mucho para lograr lo que tenemos, sea el tipo de trabajo, la profesión, un sueldo bueno, la confianza que otros ponemos en nosotros, una vida de oración que tenemos, la paz y el amor dentro de nuestra familia, una casa cómoda, comida en la mesa—una vida cristiana... Hemos hecho el esfuerzo y vamos pensando: ¿porque tengo que compartir con Fulano cuando Fulano no ha trabajo tanto como yo? Yo he sacrificado para llegar a donde estoy hoy.

Todos nosotros tenemos la capacidad de responder de una manera positiva para intentar crear un mundo un poco mejor. Recen para que Dios les ayude en esta tarea de vivir su fe, de ponerla en acción. Que seamos un pueblo resucitado, consciente de las necesidades de nuestra comunidad, región, pueblo o ciudad. Individualmente o entre varias personas o como comunidad podemos responder.

También en el evangelio de hoy escuchamos que Jesús deseaba la paz a sus seguidores y quizás pensando en el abandono por sus discípulos el día de su muerte, él les perdonó y les dio el poder de perdonar. ¡Tan grande es la misericordia de Dios Jesucristo! ## Family Connection

Gospel Reading: John 20:19-31

Thomas believes because he sees Jesus.

Within normal family life, there are many opportunities for conflict. Jesus did not promise us the absence of conflict in our lives. Instead, he gave us the gifts of peace, forgiveness, and reconciliation so that we could reduce conflict. The measure of Christian family life is not the absence of conflict, but the manner in which conflict is resolved. Filled with the gift of the Holy Spirit, we ask Jesus to help us to bring peace and forgiveness to situations of conflict in our families.

As your family gathers, take this opportunity to examine how your family resolves conflict. Recall a recent argument or disagreement and discuss how the conflict was resolved. Consider whether the conflict was resolved peacefully, in the spirit of Jesus. If not, discuss alternatives that might be tried in the future. Read together today's Gospel, John 20:19-31. Recall that we have each received Jesus' gift of the Holy Spirit and that the Holy Spirit helps us to be people who forgive others and seek peace. Pray together the Prayer to the Holy Spirit or the Peace Prayer of Saint Francis.

Prayer of St. Francis
Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:
where there is hatred, let me sow love;
where there is injury, pardon;
where there is doubt, faith;
where there is despair, hope;
where there is darkness, light;
where there is sadness, joy.
O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek
to be consoled as to console,
to be understood as to understand,
to be loved as to love.
For it is in giving that we receive,
it is in pardoning that we are pardoned,
and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.
Amen.


