

Parish Pastoral Council Nominations

You may know we have a Parish Pastoral Council but do you know what this council does? The council helps the pastor develop a vision for the parish, helps the pastor determine the priorities of the parish, and promote communication to the parish. Our council has nine adult members and two youth members.

The adult members of the council serve three-year terms, renewable once, while the youth members serve one-year terms, renewable as long as they are in high school. This year we will be selecting three adult parishioners to begin three-year terms on the council. We are now taking nominations until May 16th. We will select the members in a drawing at the end of the 10:30 am Mass on May 23rd.

To serve on the council, one must be a registered and supporting member of our parish who regularly attends Mass and is committed to dialogue and spiritual growth. El Cirio Pascual

La Vigilia Pascual (este año celebrada el 4 de abril) empieza con un fuego nuevo afuera de la iglesia. El pueblo con los ministros se reúne alrededor de un fuego nuevo y crepitante que da calor a todos. Dios ya comunicó el fuego de su luz y el sacerdote reza que en este tiempo pascual Dios enciende en todos los deseos de cosas celestiales. El cirio pascual se enciende con el fuego nuevo y el cirio está llevado adentro de la iglesia. Tres veces se canta "Luz de Cristo" y el pueblo responde "Demos gracias a Dios."

Este cirio es el símbolo dominante del tiempo pascual. Es alto y decorativo; se crea luz para el pueblo y disipa la oscuridad del pecado. Es Cristo, el Resucitado, la Luz del mundo quien está presente en la asamblea. Después vienen el Gloria, los aleluyas, evangelio y la celebración de la Eucaristía. Este año la celebración de la Resurrección empezó esa noche y todavía estamos celebrándola. Por 50 días celebramos; por siete semanas tenemos el cirio pascual encendido proclamando que Cristo se resucitó para que nosotros podamos resucitar.

Para los bautismos y los funerales usamos el cirio pascual también. El bautismo nos incorpora en el cuerpo de Cristo y nos da una parte en su resurrección. Ustedes han visto que los padres y padrinos reciban una vela bautismal encendida desde el cirio pascual con la instrucción de mantener la luz de Cristo—la llama de la fe— encendida en la vida del niño. Yo pido a los padres del recién bautizado llevar la vela a su hogar y en cada aniversario del bautismo del niño que ellos la encienden para recordar a ellos y al niño mientras va creciendo de donde viene su fe: la luz de Cristo resucitado.

También encendemos el cirio pascual para los funerales. En los funerales usamos algunos símbolos del bautismo: rociado de agua, colocación del manto blanco (como una prenda blanca) sobre el ataúd y el encendido del cirio pascual. Cristo resucitó de entre los muertos para que nosotros podamos pasar desde la muerte hacia la vida—el primer paso es por el bautismo y el ultimo es la muerte humana para entrar a la vida celestial.

Espero que cada tiempo de la Pascua de la Resurrección les dé una inyección nueva de amor, fe y esperanza. Dios nos ama; Dios Jesucristo por su resurrección nos da la esperanza de nuestra propia resurrección. Que mantengamos una fe firme en la resurrección de Cristo. *Hermana Kay*

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: John 10:11-18

Jesus says that he is the good shepherd who knows his sheep. The Good Shepherd makes sacrifices for the sheep not because it is required, but because it is a choice. That sounds a lot like parenting and the dynamics of a healthy family life. Parents choose to make sacrifices for their children out of love, not obligation. Christian parents model and invite their Children to Choose to make sacrifices for other family members and for other people, acting out of love rather than obligation.

When you gather as a family, invite each family member to consider the attitude that permeates their participation in family life. Read a common examen, such as any of the following: Do we do family chores cheerfully and without having to be asked multiple times? Do we gladly share with others? Do we willingly contribute to the family good when asked? Read aloud today's Gospel, John 10:11-18. Discuss together how the example of the Good Shepherd might inspire your family life. Invite each family member to make a renewed commitment to one action/attitude to focus on in the upcoming week that show that we will choose to follow the example of the Good Shepherd. Pray together that we will be able to honor our commitment. Pray together Saint Ignatius of Loyola's Prayer for Generosity.
