

May is the month dedicated to the veneration of Our Lady. This month is full of many feasts in honor of the Mother of God: Mary Queen of Poland (3 May), the Holy Virgin Mary, Mother of God's Grace (7 May), the Blessed Virgin Mary of Fatima (13 May), the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of the Church (20 May), the Most Holy Mary Help of Christians (May 24), Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary (May 31)

May is the most warm and mild of the spring months. They also call it "the month of flowers". This is due to the fact that after the first rains, good weather finally returns. The fields and gardens begin to turn green, the air is filled with a pleasant scent of flowers. It can be said that May is the peak of spring.

In ancient times, the month of May was dedicated to the Roman goddess Maya - mother of nature and fertile land. Since the Middle Ages, in the "*month of flowers*", Christians began to venerate the Blessed Virgin Mary in order to express their deep respect for the virtues and beauty of Our Lady. Perhaps also to eradicate existing pagan mores about flora.

Mary helps everyone. Especially to those who turn to her in need. And great miracles are worked through her intercession. Confirmation of this can be an interesting story by the Salesian priest Bruno Ferrera called "*Golden Shoes*".

There was once a widow who had two daughters. The woman worked a lot to keep them. She weaved day and night. On the Feast of Our Lady, she took her yarn to her neighbors in the hope that she would receive payment for the work she had ordered. However, she did not get a penny. Each had a reason not to pay the woman.

On the way home, the widow stopped in the church to pray in front of the statue of Our Lady of the Rosary.

"Holy Mary! You, who are also a mother, tell me what to give my poor daughters for dinner? I have no means to light a fire in the oven, I have neither flour nor bread ... Help me, because I am desperate."

Our Lady took pity on the poor widow. She stretched her leg forward and kicked off her golden slipper in front of her. Shivering with joy, the woman hurried to the jeweler to sell the gift of the Holy Mother. However, the man immediately understood that the shoe belonged to Mary. He called the city guards and the woman was put in prison.

Before the court, the widow desperately asked to pray in front of the statue of Our Lady of the Rosary.

"Holy Mary," pleaded the woman, "could you please confirm that you gave me this shoe, that I didn't steal it?"

They all watched silently. And here the figure began to come to life. The face slowly took on color and Our Lady, putting her foot forward, threw off the second golden slipper. At that moment, everyone believed in the miracle. The widow, on the other hand, returned home to her little daughters with Mary's golden shoes. Praised be the Lord Jesus Christ! *Fr. Felicjan*



Family Connection

Gospel Reading: John 15:1-8 Jesus teaches that he is the vine and that his disciples are the branches.

The goal of our life of prayer is to increase our awareness that Jesus lives with us always. Prayer is more than a dialogue with God; prayer is a lifting of our minds and hearts to God so that God might dwell and act within us and through us. The pinnacle of our life of prayer is our communion with Jesus in the Eucharist. Through this sacrament, we receive Jesus himself, and he remains with us. Our life of prayer and our union with Jesus will lead us to fruitful service to others.

Place a plant in your gathering space. Invite everyone to look at the plant, noting the connection between the plant and its leaves. Talk about the integral connection between all the parts of a healthy plant. Introduce today's Gospel by saying that Jesus talked about his relationship to his disciples using this metaphor. Read today's Gospel, John 15:1-8. Talk about the ways in which we are invited to relate to Jesus as his disciples today—prayer, Scripture, the Eucharist, and so on. When we do these things, Jesus promises to remain with us and to lead us to serve others well. Pray together that we will continue to be attentive and open to Jesus as he works in our lives today. Pray together the Acts of Faith, Hope, and Love.
