FR. MIKE'S MESSAGE...

Priesthood

Last Saturday, June 5, two men were ordained to the priesthood at Sacred Heart Cathedral in Rochester: Fr. Joseph Maurici and Fr. Steven Lewis are now the two newest members of the presbyterate for the Diocese of Rochester. I was unfortunately unable to attend, as I had a funeral and wedding that same day, but it did give me cause for reflection.

Every year at this time, whether I am able to attend the ordinations or not, I can't help but think back to my own ordination. On June 3, I celebrated my fourth anniversary of Ordination to the Priesthood. In many ways, I cannot believe it has already been four years since that day. But honestly, I still cannot imagine myself doing anything else with my life. Not a day has gone by since my ordination where I haven't been grateful for the opportunity to serve as a priest.

I'm sure that just about all of us have heard at some point someone say "if you love what you do, you never work a day in your life." While this is a very cliched statement, there really is a lot of truth in it. Even though there are many challenges in pastoral ministry, the joys far outweigh the struggles. To be able to serve as a priest in Christ's Church has been an unbelievable honor and privilege over the past four years, and I can honestly say, as I have said many times, that I cannot imagine doing anything else with my life.

We all know, of course, that there is currently a major shortage of priests in our diocese. More than half of our priests are more than 60 years old, and many of them have either reached senior status or are nearing senior status. It is the reason why so many of our parishes are having to cluster together and merge, and why so many churches have closed in recent years. The Church is in need of more vocations to the priesthood and vowed religious life. We know, of course, that without priests, we have no access to the sacraments.

Now, perhaps more than ever before, we need to pray for and foster vocations throughout the diocese and the world. I ask you to continue to pray for vocations, particularly for the Diocese of Rochester. And if you know of anyone who might be thinking of priesthood, don't hesitate to encourage them. But above all, we must continue to trust in our Good Shepherd, who promised that he would never leave us as orphans, and who never ceases to call those he has prepared to pasture his flock.

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Mark 4:26-34

The reign of God is like a mustard seed.

Church documents call the Christian family the "domestic church." This is both a compliment and a call to commitment. Because the family is a community formed in love and dedicated to the physical and spiritual growth of its members, it is a miniature version of the Kingdom of God on earth. This Sunday's Gospel Reading, Mark 4:26-34, consists of two parables that Jesus used to help us discern the mystery of the Kingdom of God. The beginning of the kingdom is compared to a tiny seed that over time matures and ripens. Many of the things we do within the family seem insignificant. They are part of our daily activity and attract little attention. Yet they show our love and concern for one another. According to the Gospel, it's these small things that yield big results, acting as significant contributions to the growth of God's kingdom on earth. The growth of the seed illustrates the nature and the results of a strong faith. Read aloud together the Gospel of Mark 4:26-34. Consider how your family's concerns reflect the Church's concerns for those members who are poor, forgotten, hungry, ill, shunned, or lonely. Together think of a specific action that you can do to assist a person in your extended family, neighborhood, or parish. Now pray together the Lord's Prayer, pausing briefly to consider the import of the words "thy kingdom come." Each evening this week as you gather for supper, share with one another the simple acts of love you witnessed within the family that day.



Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom Come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our

trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.


