

The cloud is lifting! How difficult these times of COVID have been but the cloud is lifting! Especially since Easter Sunday morning, I have been so moved to see so many of our people returning to Mass. I cannot think of anything sadder or more difficult during the lockdown than the empty pews of our churches. Anything. Now, though, we're coming back and we should come back with joy and with determination! While serving at Mass for Corpus Christi, I thought of how fitting it was that Bishop Matano and other bishops in New York State had chosen that day to reinstate the obligation of Sunday Mass attendance. If you have your Catholic Courier at home, I encourage you to read the Bishop's recent comments on this important matter. How strongly it brings to mind comments he made in his inaugural Mass when he was installed as the Bishop of Rochester. "If I can say no to the invitation of Jesus who himself declares IF YOU DO NOT EAT THE FLESH OF THE SON OF MAN AND DRINK HIS BLOOD YOU WILL NOT HAVE LIFE IN YOU. If we can dismiss this solemn declaration, of Jesus" Bishop Matano says, "then how easy it becomes to say no to any person or institution and to break or dishonor any commitment." And here is the most important question of all, on whose authority do we say these things? Not on mine, not on Father Felicjan's, not really even on the bishop's - or the Pope's! No, we speak only with the authority of Christ! It's not telling the whole story when we say, "As Catholics, we believe that the Eucharist is the Body and Blood of Christ." As though it is one option among many - a special "Catholic" teaching that others are free to accept or reject. Jesus said these words when he had his largest following - five thousand people ready to accept his every word, ready to do whatever he asked but, when Jesus said it was his body and his blood and when the crowd complained, he only tightened his words, made them more specific, more literal, more, shocking, truly shocking. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him. And everybody left except for the Twelve Apostles! Do not interpret Jesus' words! I say it again: Do not interpret Jesus' words! Accept them! Believe them! Accept that he who is God from God and Light from Light, he who defeated the power of death and hell and rose triumphantly from the grave, is truth himself and cannot lie or deceive. We have returned to Mass. Let us offer our sacrifice of praise! Let's us worship in spirit and in truth! Let's us believe and receive for the One who conquered sin and death beckons us: Come and eat! This IS my Body! Deacon Kiley

# ¿Es un Buen Padre?

¿Como padre, cómo sabe si es un buen padre o no? La relación del amor entre un padre y su hijo(a) tiene que ir en ambas direcciones. Sí, trabaja para que ellos tengan ropa, techo y comida, pero ¿es solamente que salga en la mañana y regresa en la tarde con sus dólares ganados, y las cuentas pagadas junto con su esposa? ¿Cuánto tiempo dedica a los hijos? Si solamente paga algunas cuentas, no es bastante.

Un buen padre empieza a pasar tiempo con sus hijos cuando están en el vientre de su madre. El padre empieza por escuchar los latidos de su corazón, siente sus pataditas, y le habla y le canta. Al llegar a casa el padre debe conversar con sus hijos, hablándoles y escuchando a sus hijos hablar de las actividades de su día. Saber comunicarse con los hijos implica saber escucharlos y aprender no reaccionar de manera exagerada ante de lo que dicen. Si explota o grita o los critica con severidad, no van a decirle las cosas. Debe darles la libertad de expresar lo que piensan y lo que han hecho. Si les habla con calma y si los escucha desde el corazón, probablemente van a abrirse a usted. En la carta de Santiago, él escribe: "Toda persona tiene que ser presto en cuanto a oír, lento en cuanto a hablar y lenta a la ira." Escuche con amor.


Discipline a sus hijos con amor y elógielos. Cuando discipline a sus hijos, hágalo porque los ama y quiere que les vaya bien en la vida, no porque su autoridad ha sido cuestionada o porque usted se siente decepcionado. Combine la disciplina con consejos. Junto con la disciplina va la educación y corrección. Si solamente está corrigiendo y castigando, y nunca elogia a sus hijos, está perdiendo algo importante. Debe mostrar su amor por reconocer no solamente lo malo, sino también lo bueno. Los hijos no deben recibir solo manzanas podridas de usted sino "manzanas de oro con adornos de plata" (Prov. 25:11).

Hay que dar un buen ejemplo de cómo vivir y actuar. Ellos aprenden de sus padres y madres. La forma de tratar un hombre a su esposa se ve en la casa. Los hijos pueden ver. Hay que tratar a su esposa con respeto y amor. Que haya amor y unión entre esposos y entre los padres y sus hijos. La casa es una iglesia doméstica donde todos deben ver vivido el amor de Dios para con todos y el amor entre los miembros de la familia. Esto empieza con el amor entre los esposos.

Enséñeles amar a Dios y de a poco los ayuda, junto con su esposa, a formar una relación con su Padre en el cielo (su papito). Ayude a ellos hablar a Dios usando sus propias palabras y escuchando a Dios. Lleve a sus hijos a la iglesia los domingos y los explique a una edad apropiada lo del edificio y los muebles de la iglesia. Ayúdelos persignarse, usar el agua bendita y aprender las oraciones usadas en la Misa.

# Gospel Reading: Mark 4:35-41 Jesus calms the storm .

Worries and concerns are part of human life. Jesus teaches us, however, that we ought not to let worries and concerns consume us. Jesus teaches us that our faith ought to lead us to trust in God's protection and love, no matter how strong the whirlwind going on around us. Like the disciples, we can bring our worries and concerns to Jesus in prayer. Jesus will hear our cries for help. He knows that our faith Can be fragile and he will act so that our trust in God will be strengthened.

As you gather as a family, invite each family member to talk about something that might be worrying them. Talk about how important it is to share worries and concerns with other people. When we do this, we learn to see our worries from a different perspective. Read today's Gospel, Mark 4:35-41. Ask your family questions such as these: Why were the disciples worried about the storm? Why wasn't Jesus worried about the storm? When we bring our worries to Jesus in prayer, Jesus Can help us see things from God's perspective. Invite family members to name again a worry or concern and pray together that Jesus will help us have faith in God's love and protection. Conclude in prayer together by praying the Lord's Prayer.



Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread: and forgive us

our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.
