This weekend we are celebrating the independence of our country, we do well to be so thankful for this country in which we live. May we wisely and generously use the gifts of freedom and abundance that God has showered upon us in loving service of others.

Jesus in today's gospel returns to his home, to those he knows., He experiences a huge surprise. They got used to Jesus assisting Joseph in woodworking, probably speaking very little. But here they meet Jesus, who speaks of God with great eloquence, wisdom and self-confidence, and in addition he has the power that changes the lives and condition of the people. The image of Jesus as youth was so imprinted in their minds that it disabled them from seeing another face of Jesus who came to them. Such disbelief in Jesus - his task and tools - did not end 2000 years ago. It is mine and probably yours frequent experience! Many of us have become accustomed to the image of Jesus from childhood, or youth hood, in which each of us sits on long-established positions: "This Jesus will bring nothing new to my life. I know what He requires of me, and I just have to survive until the end of my days here on earth. Maybe there will be some surprise on the other side of my life, but I'm sure not here!". This attitude of resisting the newness of Jesus is often expressed, among others attitudes in the lack of adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, not reading the Holy Bible, the rare use of the sacraments (boredom and the same stuff in the Eucharist; I would have to go to the confessional with the same sins and so on). This reality works also in our human interactions: how many times do we approach our loved ones the same way! Do you believe and notice that those who have been around you for a long time( your spouse, your child, relative, neighbor, priest, co-worker...) can surprise you (not in the sense of a scandal)? Do you believe that he or she can bring closer and reveal God to you, and that God has endowed them with gifts showing us the power of God's transforming love? Let us ask the Lord this week for open eyes and open hearts, which will allow us to be effectively surprised by the action of God and of our fellow men in our lives.

#### Nuestros Símbolos Católicos

La Iglesia Católica usa símbolos en sus celebraciones, sus rituales y en sus edificios. La semana pasada escribí sobre la celebración Eucarística (Misa) que celebramos todos los días. Hay dos partes principales en la Misa: *Liturgia de la Palabra* y Liturgia de la Eucaristía. Cada liturgia tiene un mueble conectado a ella. La iglesia tiene un lugar especial para la lectura que es el ambón. Desde el ambón un lector laico proclama la Palabra de Dios desde las Escrituras, un cantor canta el salmo y el sacerdote o el diácono lee el evangelio y explica las lecturas para nuestras vidas diarias por medio de las homilías.



Estas palabras no son solamente dirigidas a los de hace muchos siglos sino son dirigidas a nosotros para vivir en 2021. Dios se comunica con nosotros hoy, revelándose de nuevo. Debemos respetar el ambón como el altar. La mesa de la Palabra debe guiarnos a la mesa de la Eucaristía. Alimentados por la palabra

de Dios proclamada dese el ambón, estamos mejor preparados para recibir el Cuerpo de Cristo.

Y ¿Qué es el libro desde el cual el lector lee? No es la biblia, pero contiene mucho de la biblia. El *leccionario* es el libro que contiene el ciclo de tres años de lecturas (año A es del evangelio de San Mateo, año B es de San Marcos y año C es de San Lucas) proclamadas para exponernos a una variedad de libros de la biblia. La primera lectura es normalmente desde las Escrituras de los Hebreos salvo en el tiempo pascual cuando es de los Hechos de los Apóstoles. Respondemos a esta lectura con

un salmo responsorial. LITURGIA DE LA PALABRA: desde el AMBÓN se lee la Palabra de Dios, que es HOY para CADA ponerla en

Hace muchos años fue solamente el sacerdote que firmaba su frente, labios y corazón con la señal de la cruz antes de proclamar el evangelio, pero en nuestro tiempo todos lo hacemos. Las palabras al hacer esta acción son: "Que el Señor esté en mi mente, en mis labios y en mi

corazón." Nos abrimos plenamente a la Palabra de Dios, no solamente una parte.

La Liturgia de la Palabra termina con la asamblea recitando el Credo y haciendo peticiones.

Yo describo esto para que podamos entender mejor, escuchar

### Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Mark 6:1-6

Jesus is rejected in his hometown.

Our family plays an important role in shaping us and forming our self-identity. In family life, we find a safe place to discover who we are and who God calls us to be. But sometimes the influences from outside our family can make us unrecognizable to those who know us best. These outside influences can lead us away from God, or they can lead us toward a deeper relationship with God. In today's Gospel, we see that the people of Nazareth could not recognize Jesus as the Son of God. They could know him only as the son of Mary. We hope that through our family life we will be encouraged to filter the many influences on our lives through the lens of faith so that we will become the person that God calls us to be. As you gather as a family, talk about the people and events that are influencing members of your family. Acknowledge that many of these people and events are positive influences, helping us be better people and leading us to a deeper relationship with God. Also acknowledge, however, that there are negative influences in our lives that risk pulling us away from God. Observe that Jesus was a person who allowed his relationship with God to be the most important thing in his life. This led many people to have faith in him as the Son of God. However, not everyone could recognize this about Jesus. Read today's Gospel, Mark 6:1-6. Ask: Who does not recognize Jesus as God's Son in this Gospel? (some of his kinfolk in Nazareth) Observe that because of the people's lack of faith, Jesus could not perform many miracles in Nazareth. Conclude by praying together that our families will continue to help us follow God in our lives. Pray together the Prayer for Vocations.

#### Prayer for Vocations

God, in Baptism you called me by name and made me a member of your people, the Church. Help all your people to know their vocation in life, and to respond by living a life of holiness. For your greater glory and for the service of your people, raise up dedicated and generous leaders who will serve as sisters, priests, brothers, deacons, and lay ministers.

Send your Spirit to guide and strengthen me that I may serve your people following the example of your Son, Jesus Christ, in whose name I offer this prayer. Amen.
