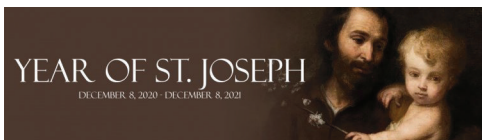

When he disembarked and saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd.

These words from the Gospel dramatically show how much God loves us. We know this both because of Jesus' actions and because of his words. Yes, we all know the scripture where Jesus tells us that *God so loved the world that he sent his only son so that everyone who believes in Him might not perish but might have eternal life!* So, for God, it was not enough to just love us from afar, from way up in heaven. No, his love demanded that he would become one of us and demonstrate his love by the way he lived, the things he said, and the way he died. So, we see in today's Gospel how Jesus' *heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd.* Is there any more beloved passage in Scripture than today's Responsorial Psalm? *The Lord is my Shepherd, there is nothing I shall want!* How we all can remember those days after the terrorist attack on September 11th when, over and over again we heard that Psalm read at the funerals of firemen who had died like Christ, running into burning buildings to save others! Jesus' *heart was moved with pity* and he died on the Cross so that we might live with him forever. But... our scriptures are also a warning for we hear the warning against shepherds who *mislead and scatter the flock!* Wow! It's not easy being a pastor, a spiritual leader of God's people. Who can measure up to Jesus? Yet that is, in a sense, what Jesus expects of those in spiritual authority! I'm going to challenge all of you now. There is a saying that the favorite Sunday dinner is "Roast Preacher!" I believe it. It's so easy to find fault with our clergy and to blurt that out in front of everyone – even our children. Instead, try this: Make a promise today to pray for our spiritual leaders – our shepherds. Pray for the Pope, for the bishops – especially Bishop Matano – for our pastors and priests, and deacons. Pray for the laity who share in the ministry with the clergy. Pray for those in seminaries or houses of formation as they prepare to become priests, deacons, religious sisters and brothers, or lay leaders. AND... pray that more people will answer God's call to them to embrace the difficult life of a religious vocation. Let us pray: Lord, help us to appreciate our shepherds. Bless them and inspire more young people to answer the call! Amen

Dios Es Más que una Idea o Doctrina

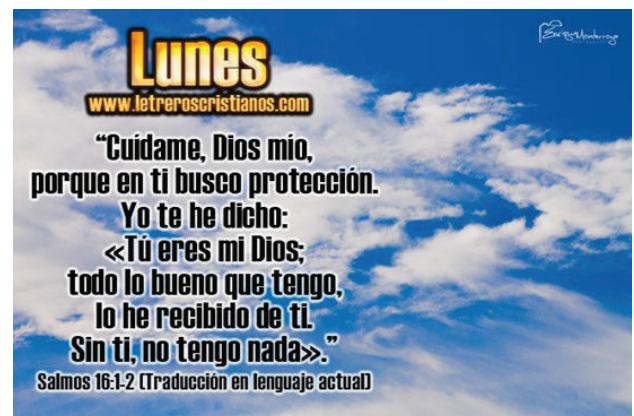
Recientemente yo estaba hablando a un hombre y le pregunté qué estaba haciendo para ayudar a sus hijos crecer en la fe. El me dijo que ellos estaban aprendiendo la doctrina. Pero, piénsalo: doctrina es un conjunto de enseñanzas, verdades sobre Dios o dogmas que la Iglesia enseña sobre Dios y la fe. Los domingos profesamos nuestra fe al recitar juntos el Credo. ¿Por profesar nuestra fe, llegamos a conocer a Dios y a Jesucristo? Podemos saber de Dios pero no conocemos a Dios por recitar las verdades, salvo si tomemos mucho tiempo para entender lo que esas doctrinas dicen de Dios por entrar en reflexión y oración sobre ellos. Nuestra fe en Dios tiene que ser más que una lista de creencias. Tenemos que llegar a conocer y formar una relación con Dios. Dios es mucho más que una doctrina.

Cuando los esposos se vieron por primera vez, quizás alguien les dijo los nombres y que fueron hijos de Juan y María y hermano de Luis y Gertrudis, etc. En otro tiempo otra persona los presentó uno al otro y tuvieron la posibilidad de conversar. Al ver que tenían algo en común, empezaron a verse más y salir juntos. Eventualmente empezaron a sentir un sentimiento de cariño hacia el otro y una emoción al ver la otra y pasar tiempo juntos. El amor creció no solamente por saber algo de la otra persona, sino porque estaban conociéndose por hacer cosas juntos y por conversar y así formando una relación más íntima.

No vamos a poder realmente amar a Dios si Dios sea solamente una doctrina o concepto. Debemos relacionarnos con Dios por medio de conversación u oración íntima, por leer y reflexionar sobre las Sagradas Escrituras, por escribirle cartas y mensajes, por escuchar a otras personas hablar de su relación con Dios, y por caminar, pasar por y admirar su creación... Así van a poder encontrar al Dios de amor, de paz, de compasión, de la creación e imaginación, de la justicia, de la luz, y el Dios que está con nosotros en las luchas, los sufrimientos y las alegrías. Y así vamos a descubrir la presencia y acción del Espíritu Santo moviéndonos, inspirándonos e impulsándonos a actuar desde adentro.

Dios es vivo. Otras personas pueden mostrarnos cómo es Dios por la manera que aceptan a todos como hermanos, cómo sirven a los demás y cómo viven su fe—sí en oración pero también en acciones de servicio, de compasión, de preocupación, de presencia, de justicia y de paz. Juntos como comunidad, como el pueblo de Dios recibimos la fuerza los domingos para poder vivir una vida de seguimiento de Cristo y acción cristiana en el mundo. Cristo se hace presente por medio de otras personas y ojalá reflejemos a Cristo a los demás.

¿En tu vida ya estás formando una relación con Dios? ¿Estás mostrando a Dios vivo a otras personas? Adelante vamos para ser más cristiano(a) cada día. Estamos en el camino juntos como hermanos(as).

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Mark 6:30-34

Jesus invites his disciples to rest after their ministry, and Jesus is moved with pity for the crowds who pursue them. Family demands can make us feel like Jesus and the twelve apostles. We wish for times of relaxation and renewal, but there are errands to do, household chores to keep up with, volunteer commitments to keep. These are all good things, but we can be left feeling drained and tired as we try to keep up. Perhaps we might take the opportunity this week to give ourselves permission to find the rest and relaxation that Jesus seeks for his disciples in today's Gospel. One of the gifts we can give to one another in our family life is assistance in finding the time and space to renew ourselves through prayer.

When you gather together as a family this week, bring your family calendar. Together review your family calendar and spend some time reflecting on your family activities. In particular, ask if your family has an appropriate amount of time for rest and relaxation. If not, discuss ways in which this time for renewal might be included in the week ahead. Read together today's Gospel, Mark 6:30-34. Notice how Jesus tried to find time and space for his disciples to rest and relax after they returned from their mission. Conclude in prayer together, asking God to help us find time to renew ourselves so that we might be better disciples of Jesus. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.



Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our

trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.
