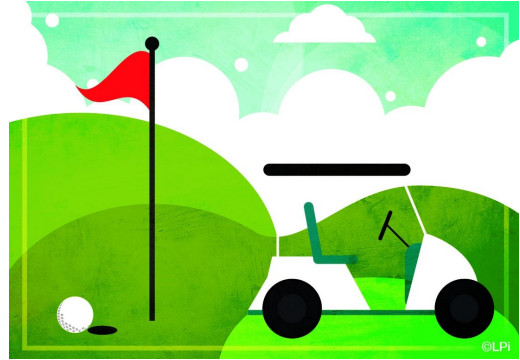




Año de San José

En diciembre de 2020 el Papa Francisco convocó el Año de San José que durará hasta el 8 de diciembre de 2021; es en conmemoración del 150° aniversario de la declaración de San José como patrono de la Iglesia universal. Es San José, el hombre justo, quien nos enseña cómo tratar a los otros seres humanos justamente y con igualdad y cómo ser un padre.

Sabemos muy poco sobre San José desde los evangelios, pero se puede saber el tipo de padre fue. Sabemos que fue un humilde carpintero, desposado con María, un hombre justo abierto a hacer la voluntad de Dios manifestada en la ley y en los cuatro sueños que tuvo. Estaba presente por el nacimiento de Jesús en Belén y vio a los pastores y los sabios del Oriente adorando al bebé Jesús.

Por un sueño él consiguió la valentía de aceptar la paternidad legal de Jesús; creó en el mensaje del ángel y obedeciendo al ángel, él aceptó a María como su esposa y puso el nombre de Jesús a su niño que le fue dado por el ángel. Él con María obedecieron la ley y fueron al templo a unos 40 días después del nacimiento para presentar al niño y él escuchó la profecía de Simeón. Según el cuento sobre la niñez de Jesús, para proteger a Jesús de Herodes, José, obedeciendo el ángel de otro sueño, llevó el niño y María a Egipto y permaneció allí hasta le fue más salvo. Cuando Jesús era más grande, teniendo doce años, Jesús acompañó a sus padres en una peregrinación a Jerusalén, pero se quedó en el templo cuando los de la peregrinación dejaron la ciudad. José y María lo buscaron muy angustiados. Así son padres que aman a sus hijos.

No sabemos mucho de San José, pero tres papas dieron títulos a José: Patrono de la Iglesia Católica, Patrono de los trabajadores y Custodio del Redentor. Muchos del pueblo lo invocan para tener una buena muerte. Lo poco que sabemos de José nos indica que fue un padre que amó su familia y la protegió y trabajó para proveer por ella. Seguramente José fue como los padres que aman a sus hijos—un padre de ternura—abrazando, besando y jugando con su precioso hijo Jesús. Él ya había tenido confianza en los ángeles de sus sueños, acogiendo a María y aceptando las responsabilidades de un padre hacia su hijo. Así tenía que ser un padre valiente, encontrando maneras de proteger y guiar a su hijo. Como carpintero José trabajaba honestamente para sostener a su familia. De José Jesús aprendió el valor y la dignidad de trabajar y poder comer de su trabajo.

José tenía humildad; él no buscaba estar reconocido por otros. Vivió en la sombra; fue su hijo que era lo más importante. Él vivió bien su papel en la historia de la salvación.

El papa Francisco escribió la siguiente oración a San José:

**Salve, custodio del Redentor
y esposo de la Virgen María.
A ti Dios confió a su Hijo,
en ti María depositó su confianza,
contigo Cristo se forjó como hombre.
Oh, bienaventurado José,
muéstrate padre también a nosotros
y guíanos en el camino de la vida.
Concédenos gracia, misericordia y valentía,
y defiéndenos de todo mal. Amén.**

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: John 6:1-15

Jesus feeds the crowd of more than five thousand people with five barley loaves and two fish.

Parents may sympathize with the disciples' protests when Jesus asks Philip where food might be found for the crowd. In the responses of both Philip and Andrew, we hear feelings of inadequacy as they survey their limited resources in the face of such great need. We may sometimes share these feelings about our own material possessions or our emotional and spiritual resources in the face of our family's needs. This is a Gospel of hope for these times, which are all too frequent in parenting and family life. As Jesus made the five barley loaves and two fish sufficient to more than meet the needs of over five thousand people, Jesus will also work with what we have to provide for our family's needs. When we offer our efforts to God, we ask him to transform them so that they will be more than adequate to the tasks and needs before us. As you gather as a family, talk together about the things that your family needs, starting with the basics—food, shelter, safety, and so on. Continue by naming other things that a family needs to be happy and healthy—time together, cooperation, patience, and so on. Observe that sometimes we can feel like we don't have enough of the things that we need or want. Read together today's Gospel, John 6:1-15. Talk about how Jesus provided plenty of food for the crowd with just five barley loaves and two fish. We have faith that Jesus will also take what we have and make it enough to satisfy and fill all our needs. We ask for this blessing when we offer to God the work of each day in prayer in the Morning Offering. Pray together the Morning Offering, asking God to bless and make fruitful the work of each of our days.
