

Fr. Mike's Message... **Assumption of Mary**

Next Sunday, we as a church will be celebrating the Assumption of Mary. This solemnity, which is celebrated every year on August 15, is so special and important that it is one of the six Holy Days of Obligation on the liturgical calendar. It is the day on which the Church commemorates the moment that the Blessed Virgin Mary was assumed, body and soul, into heaven.

We know that, from the moment of Mary's conception in her mother, Anne's, womb, the Lord had set her apart for a special purpose. Her conception was immaculate, meaning that she was conceived without Original Sin. The sin of Adam and Eve (disobeying God) was the very first sin committed by human beings, or the "Original Sin". This sin broke the perfect relationship between God and humanity, This "original sin" has tainted our souls, so much so that, no matter how hard we try, we will commit sin throughout our life. The one exception to this was Mary. Through God's grace, she was spared this plague upon her soul (thus Mary being referred to as one "full of Grace").

Because of this, Mary is the only human being who never committed a sin (Jesus of course also didn't commit sin, but he was both human and divine). As I mentioned earlier, all of this was because she had been chosen for a special purpose. That purpose was to bear the Son of God. As God is perfect, he needed to enter this world through a perfect vessel.

Only by understanding her Immaculate Conception can we truly understand her Assumption. The grace that filled Mary from the beginning of her life continued through to her death. The Church has always taught that, at her death, Mary was assumed body and soul into heaven. This teaching is very important and has far reaching implications. The Church has also always taught that a human being is made up of a body and a soul. When we die, our soul leaves our body behind. Our bodies are corrupted by the sins we commit, so they cannot enter into the kingdom of heaven. But we also believe that, at the end of time, our souls will be united with new bodies, bodies that are not corrupted by sin. Mary is the example. Her body and soul are already united in heaven. Because she did not commit sin, her body was not corrupted, and her body was brought into heaven with her soul.

Just like her other feast days, the Assumption is an opportunity for all of us to celebrate Mary. Despite her special status, Mary remained a humble servant of God throughout her life. Her assumption was her final reward for her life of faith and obedience to the Lord. May we never cease to follow Mary's example in living a life serving the Lord and our brothers and sisters.

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: John 6:41-51

Jesus responds to the murmurs of the crowd, who wonders what he means when he says that he came down from heaven.

Today's Gospel focuses our attention on our faith in Jesus' presence in the Eucharist. Jesus is the bread of life. He gives us his Body and Blood as bread so that we may have eternal life. When we receive the Body and Blood of Jesus in the Eucharist, our lives begin to reflect the reality that our communion with Jesus prepares in us. Our Eucharist leads us to live as people of the promise, confident that we will one day share the fullness of life with God.

As you gather as a family, talk about our hope that one day we will share eternal life with God in heaven. This hope can transform the way we live our daily lives, Calling us to be people of hope and expectation. In today's Gospel, Jesus promises us this gift of eternal life in the Eucharist. Read together today's Gospel, John 6:41-51. Observe that Jesus taught us that those who listen to God know that Jesus has been sent by God for the life of the world. Jesus fulfills this promise to us through his passion, death, and Resurrection. He gives us the gift of himself in the Eucharist, which is his Body and Blood, given so that we may have eternal life. Conclude in prayer together asking God to increase our faith in Jesus' presence in the Eucharist. Pray together the ACt of Faith.

O my God, I firmly believe that you are one God in three divine Persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. I believe that your divine Son became man and died for our sins, and that he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe these and all the truths which the holy Catholic Church teaches, because you have revealed them, who can neither deceive nor be deceived. Amen.
