¡Feliz Día de la Patrona de las Hermanas de la Misericordia!

El viernes de esta semana, 24 de sept., es la fiesta de Nuestra Señora de la Misericordia, la patrona de mi congregación. No es una fiesta solemne de la Iglesia universal, pero para nosotras las hermanas y nuestras asociadas (hombres y mujeres que han hecho una alianza con nosotros, siguiendo una vida de misericordia, el carisma de nuestra congregación), la fiesta es motivo para celebrar. Fue María, una mujer y la madre del Misericordioso, que nos desafía vivir la misericordia. Como María nos disponemos a recibir la Palabra de Dios y actuar de acuerdo con ella. Vamos a reunirnos por oración para reanimarnos espiritualmente y por un tiempo social con algo para comer el viernes en nuestra casa central en Rochester. Echo de menos este tipo de vivencia comunitaria.

La misericordia es tan central en nuestras vidas y nuestro servicio. Tanto me gusta el nombre de mi congregación, misericordia. Como otras organizaciones, gobiernos y congregaciones, tenemos Constituciones y en la primera oración de ese documento se dice, "Catalina McAuley (nuestra fundadora), respondiendo desde la fe a la misericordia de Dios, escuchó el llamado de Jesús de entregarse con audacia y amor a los necesitados de su tiempo." El 11 de diciembre de 1831 Catalina fundó la congregación, aunque ella nunca había pensado fundar una congregación religiosa. Mujeres solteras en ese tiempo no andaban las calles ayudando a los necesitados, pero como miembros de una congregación religiosa les fue posible. Ella sentía la misericordia para los pobres, los enfermos y los que faltaban educación y quería responder con misericordia a los que vivían en Irlanda donde ella vivía. Desde mi entrada a la congregación hace 62 años he visto muchos cambios en la manera de responder a los necesitados de nuestros tiempos. La idea es que nos comprometemos a seguir a Jesucristo en su compasión por los que sufren. La mayoría de las congregaciones religiosas tienen los tres votos de castidad, pobreza y obediencia, pero nosotras también tenemos un cuarto voto de servicio a los que sufren pobreza, enfermedad e ignorancia. Hay énfasis especial en ayudar a los pobres y apoyar a las mujeres.

Como Cristo había pedido sus discípulos ir a todas naciones, para proclamar el evangelio, hemos tenido que desarrollar una visión global de las obras de la misericordia. Estamos en América Latina, América del Norte, Europa, algunos países de África y Asia. Nuestras hermanas en las Filipinas fundaron una misión recientemente en Vietnam.

Ustedes pueden decirme si yo logro ser un testigo de misericordia y justicia. Es mi intento, pero a veces no lo hago bien. Es solo con la misericordia de Dios que podemos ser misericordiosos. Ninguna persona puede hacer todo solo, y es por colaborar con otros en las obras de misericordia, cuando voy aprendiendo de otros cómo ser misericordiosa. Tenemos que estar por medio de oración y observación atentas a las necesidades de otros y usando talentos personales, vivir la misión de la misericordia. Algunos retos son reverenciar la



dignidad de cada persona, crear un espíritu de hospitalidad, y buscar integrar la palabra y acción en nuestras vidas. Invito a todos ser más misericordiosos.

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Mark 9:30-37

Jesus teaches his disciples that the greatest are those who serve all.

Conversations such as the one described in today's Gospel are common in family life. Perhaps these examples are familiar: "I should get the first piece of cake because I am the youngest;" "I did the dishes yesterday; someone else should do them today." How might we respond if Jesus asked about our family arguments? What would Jesus say to us in reply? All of us need the reminder found in today's Gospel: To be great in God's Kingdom is to be the servant of all.

As you gather as a family, recall a recent family argument about household chores or an example of bickering among family members. Talk about what was at issue in the argument. Together imagine that Jesus entered the room just as the argument ended. What would you tell Jesus your argument was about? What might Jesus say in reply? Read together today's Gospel, Mark 9:30-37. How was your family argument like the argument among Jesus' disciples? What might your family do to remember that those who are great in God's Kingdom are those who willingly serve others? Pray together that your family life will reflect your commitment to serve one another with love. Pray Saint Ignatius of Loyola's Prayer for Generosity.

*Eternal Word, only begotten Son of God,
Teach me true generosity.*

Teach me to serve you as you deserve.

To give without counting the cost,

To fight heedless of wounds,

To labor without seeking rest,

To sacrifice myself without thought of any reward

Save the knowledge that I have done your will.

Amen.

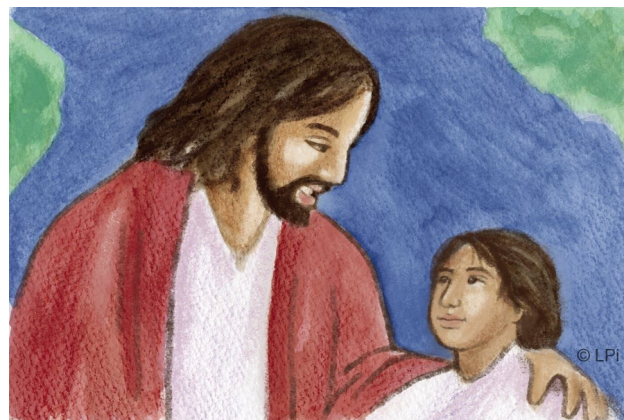
