Fr. Mike's Message...

Our Lady of the Rosary

Many of you probably already know that the month of October, along with the month of May, is a month that is dedicated by the Church to the celebration of Mary. In particular, the month is dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary. But you might not know why it is the case that October is dedicated to Mary.

The feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary falls on October 7. This day was chosen because it commemorates a great battle that took place in the year 1571. Over the centuries, there had been a number of military battles between the Christian forces of Europe and the Muslim Turks (these battles are commonly known as the Crusades). The Crusades were started by the Pope in the early part of the second millennium to try and check the rise of Islamic states that had conquered previously Christian areas. While the Crusades formally ended in the 13th-14th centuries, battles between the two sides continued. In the year 1571, the Turks were once again threatening to invade Europe. They had moved to the Mediterranean Sea and were approaching Venice and Sicily. It was at this time that Pope Pius V called for the kingdoms of Europe to send men to defend the Continent from the invaders. He also called for rosary groups in Rome and the rest of Europe to undertake special processions and recitations of the Rosary, begging for Our Lady's intercession. The two sides met at the battle of Lepanto, off the coast of Greece. Though surrounded and heavily outnumbered, the European ships broke the Turkish line and soundly defeated the invading forces. Europe had been saved, and Pope Pius V declared the day of the victory to be commemorated and dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary. The tradition then grew that the entire month of October would be dedicated to Mary through the recitation of the Rosary.

Though no longer involved in the Crusades, we as Christians still face difficult battles throughout our lives. The Blessed Mother continues to be a powerful spiritual force for all of us. As our mother, Mary will always be there to watch over and protect us. The month of October is a time when we can devote ourselves to praying the Rosary, using it as a constant reminder to seek out Mary's intercession, and to look to her whenever we are in need.




Cuidado del Medio Ambiente

Ah, la naturaleza me da tanta alegría por su belleza. Me encanta mirarla, caminar por ella, admirarla y dar gracias por la variedad que está a mi alrededor, en los cielos y en los mares. ¡Qué afortunados somos! La creación de Dios es maravillosa, pero nosotros no la cuidamos bien.

Algunos ejemplos de eso es que se usan pesticidas que matan lo bueno. Las pobres abejas que necesitamos para polinizar van muriendo porque las toxinas están encima de las plantas. También las pesticidas entran a la tierra y el agua subterránea afectando los animales y los peces. También podemos ver que gobiernos federal o estatal pasan leyes que bloquean prohibiciones locales del fracking o gas. Necesitamos una educación en el medio ambiente para desarrollar esta espiritualidad; esta tendría que incluir información de las ciencias y una sensibilización y prevención de riesgos ambientales. No podemos continuar pensando que nosotros los seres humanos somos superiores y podemos hacer cualquier cosa que queremos. Tenemos que cambiar nuestra manera de pensar y eso va a ayudarnos a cambiar nuestro estilo de vivir. Debemos tener una preocupación mas compasiva para la protección de nuestro mundo. Desde adentro nosotros como cristianos necesitamos una conversión ecológica. Nuestro encuentro con Jesucristo se ve en nuestra relación con el mundo a nuestro alrededor.

¿Vamos a proteger o destruir la creación de Dios?

Podemos empezar con unas cosas sencillas: evitar el uso de plásticos, reducir nuestro uso de agua, cocinar solo lo que se puede comer, reciclar, plantar un árbol, cuidar otras cosas vivas, apagar las luces no necesarias... Es un comienzo y hay tanto mas posible.

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Mark 10:17-30

A man with many possessions asks Jesus what he must do to gain eternal life.

Today's Gospel might make us uncomfortable about our possessions. This discomfort offers us an opportunity to consider our possessions and our family's commitment to the poor. Material possessions are a necessity in our culture. Our use of these possessions and our attitude about their importance is our choice, however. It is a choice we can make with the awareness that our faith in Jesus commits us to show our care for the poor.

As you gather as a family, consider together these questions: Would it be possible to inventory our possessions? Are there things in our house that we no longer need or use? What might we do with these things? Read together today's Gospel, Mark 10:17-30. Talk about the warning about material possessions that Jesus gives in this Gospel. How does this make you feel? Choose an action that helps your family show its commitment to the poor. Conclude by praying together

the Peace Prayer of Saint Francis.
