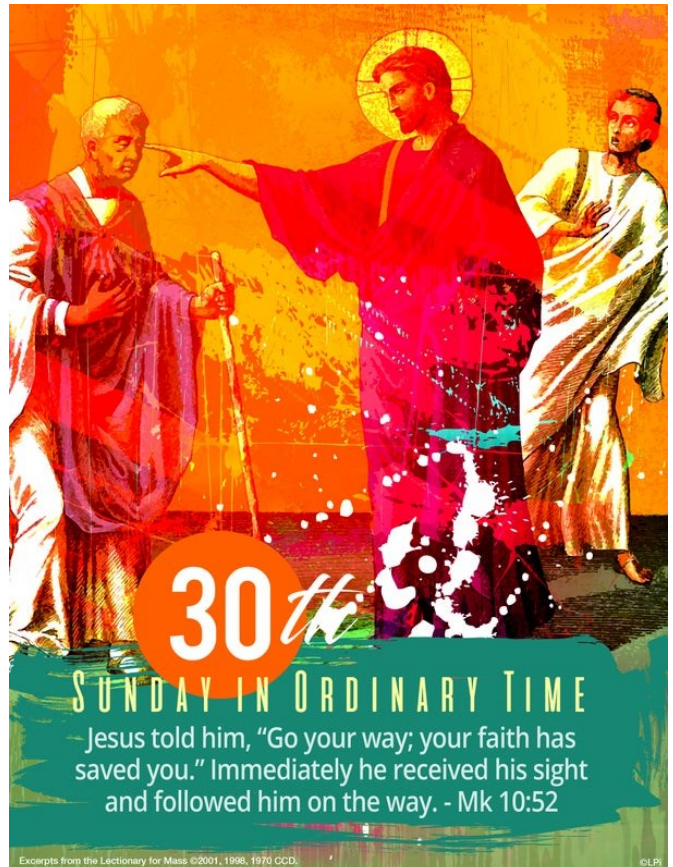

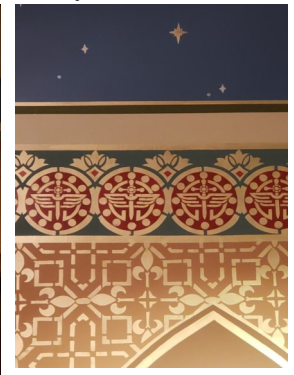
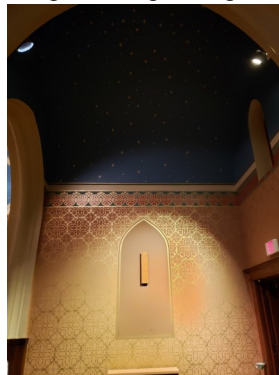

Christmas Bazaar

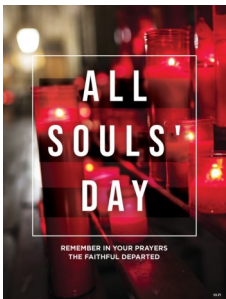

Hechos Pequeños de Amor Tienen Mucho Valor

Ah, ese abrazo tan fuerte que di y recibí a la vez contenía tanto significado. Supe que ella estaba sufriendo, y quería entregarle el amor que Dios y yo tenemos para ella. Nosotros seres humanos sentimos tantas emociones y a veces es difícil describir o entenderlas. En un tiempo de la pérdida de un ser querido vamos desde la tristeza que acompaña la pérdida hacia las gracias que queremos expresar a Dios por todo lo que la persona significaba para nosotros. Entre los sufrimientos tan importante es expresar el cariño que teníamos para la persona muerta. El abrazo—un entendimiento del dolor del otro; un deseo de expresar su amor hacia el otro; un esfuerzo para extender la carga de la pérdida a otros para aliviar y compartir el dolor un poco.

En este tiempo de la pandemia cuando están diciendo que debemos distanciarnos de otros, ponemos aún más valor e importancia en el toque y el amor del otro. Eso es también amor.

Hay que expresar nuestro amor hacia otros no solamente por palabras sino con los sentidos: una mirada de cariño, estando al lado de otro a su invitación, tocando el brazo como signo de querer compartir la tristeza, compartiendo afecto, usando maneras amables para afirmar a otro... Hay que olvidarte y pensar en el otro y amar al otro, mostrando el amor de muchas maneras. Demasiado veces no expresamos nuestro amor a un ser querido y frecuentemente no pensamos en las cosas pequeñas que podemos hacer para los demás. Abre tu corazón y sentidos a otros.

Cristo nos dio la ley cristiana: “Amarás al Señor tu Dios con todo tu corazón, con toda tu alma y con toda tu mente. Este es el gran mandamiento, el primero. Pero hay otro muy parecido: Amarás a tu prójimo como a ti mismo.” (Mt. 22:37-39) ¿Nuestra tarea? Practiquen y vivan el amor cada día, extendiéndonos a otros en actos de bondad y apoyo.

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Mark 10:46-52

Jesus restores sight to the blind man, Bartimaeus

Today's Gospel offers us a powerful example of faith and persistence in prayer. Those around him rebuked Bartimaeus for his efforts to attract Jesus' attention. When silenced by the crowd, however, Bartimaeus called out all the more. He is persistent and bold in his confidence that Jesus will show mercy on him and do what he asks. His persistence and great confidence that Jesus would help him reminds us of the confidence with which our children bring to us their needs. In their faith and trust we can find an example of the attitude with which we might approach God in prayer. As a family, recall a request that has been made repeatedly by one family member to another. Talk about why the request continues to be made if the answer continues to be no. Then read together today's Gospel, Mark 10:46-52. After reading the Gospel, pose questions such as these to your family: Why must Bartimaeus be persistent in calling out to Jesus? (Some people in the crowd are telling him to be quiet.) What does Bartimaeus do when some try to stop him? (He calls out to Jesus all the more.) When Jesus stops and calls for him, what does Jesus do and say? (He restores Bartimaeus's sight; Jesus tells Bartimaeus his faith has saved him.) When we pray, God wants us to be so confident he will help us that we don't permit anyone to keep us from bringing our needs to God in prayer. Invite family members to identify the things they need most from God. Pray these prayers of petition together as a family, confident that God will hear and answer your prayers. Respond to each petition, "Jesus, Son of David, have pity on us." Conclude by praying the Glory Be to the Father.

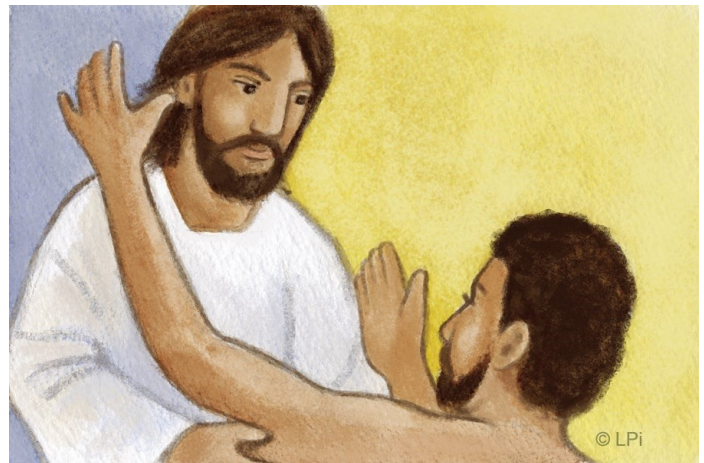
