As you know I have gone to Poland to visit my family (father, 2 sisters, 2 brothers, 12 nieces and nephews). My mother passed away 3 years ago. This year I have the opportunity to be with my family on November 1st at the cemetery. I would like to share with you a few Polish customs on All Saints Day.

In Poland there are thousands of people around the cemetery and the streets are blocked off. Police are everywhere stopping cars from coming in but this is not a major sporting event. It is not a big-ticket concert happening in Cracow. This is the first of November, All Saints Day one of the most important and magical days in the Polish national.

On this day people go to the cemeteries where their loved ones, former family members, are buried. They go because they want to pay respect to those people. They clean the graves. They leave behind these extraordinary votive candles, reeds and flowers in order to remember people that were close to them. It is a beautiful day.

The cemetery is filled with life, filled with color. As the evening descends, the extraordinary sight of a sea of candles in the darkness, everyone coming together to celebrate their culture, tradition and the people that they love. It is a beautiful night.


The origins of All Saints Day lies in a mix of Slavic and Catholic traditions but it is part of the official Catholic calendar and it is celebrated throughout Eu-

rope. But, nobody does it quite like the Polish. These cemeteries come alive with these rippling layers of light. If you were to fly above Poland on this day and in the days ahead you see these cemeteries which have literally sprung to life with light, which is one of the most extraordinary things that happen on this day. A custom that poles practice is that if they find a grave close to the one where they're visiting and cleaning that hasn't been cleaned and doesn't have a votive candle or flowers, they will lay a candle of their own on that grave.


Christmas Bazaar

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Mark 12:28b-34 Jesus is questioned by a scribe about the greatest commandment.

As Christians, our moral behavior is guided by the twopart Commandment taught by Jesus in today's Gospel: love God and love your neighbor as yourself. Many of us learned to use this framework as an examination of conscience. By examining our lives through the lens of these commandments, we have learned that the Challenge of these commandments is not in our desire to follow them but in our Capacity to consistently honor these commandments in our daily lives.

For one week, identify and collect news reports of how Christians show their love for God by loving and serving their neighbor. Clip these news items and share what you have heard when you gather as a family. Read together today's Gospel, Mark 12:28b-34. Talk about ways in which your family might contribute to the examples of Christian service you found. Choose one of these actions to do together as a family. Conclude in prayer together asking God to help us show love to our family members and friends. Pray together the Act of Love.

O my God, I love you above all things with my whole heart and soul, because you are all good and worthy of all my love. I love my neighbor as myself for the love of you. I forgive all who have injured me and I ask pardon of those whom I have injured. Amen.

DIOCESE OF ROCHESTER PERMANENT DIACONATE The deacon is a man of faith, who is called from the community that already recognizes his dedication to service. He makes a lifetime commitment to serving the People of God by proclaiming the Word, assisting and presiding at liturgies, and ministering in the areas of charity and social justice. A deacon gives witness to his availability to the community by addressing present and emerging needs of the Church. The Diocese is inviting interested men of strong and active faith, who can demonstrate a record of service in the communities in which they live, work and worship, who may wish to explore a possible call to ordained ministry as a permanent deacon, to first speak with their pastor for an initial conversation. They may also contact Deacon Edward Giblin, Director of the Office of the Permanent Diaconate, at edward.giblin@dor.org, for additional information. A potential candidate must be at least 35 years of age and no older than 62 years of age at the time of ordination after a five (5) year period of formation. He must be in good health, emotionally mature, have stable relationships and must have the wholehearted support of his wife (if married) and family to enter the phase of inquiry. Because the parish is the primary experience of Church for most inquirers, the parish community is asked as well to invite from among its mem-

bers men who exhibit strong faith and a spirit of service and encourage them to consider a possible vocation to the permanent diaconate.
