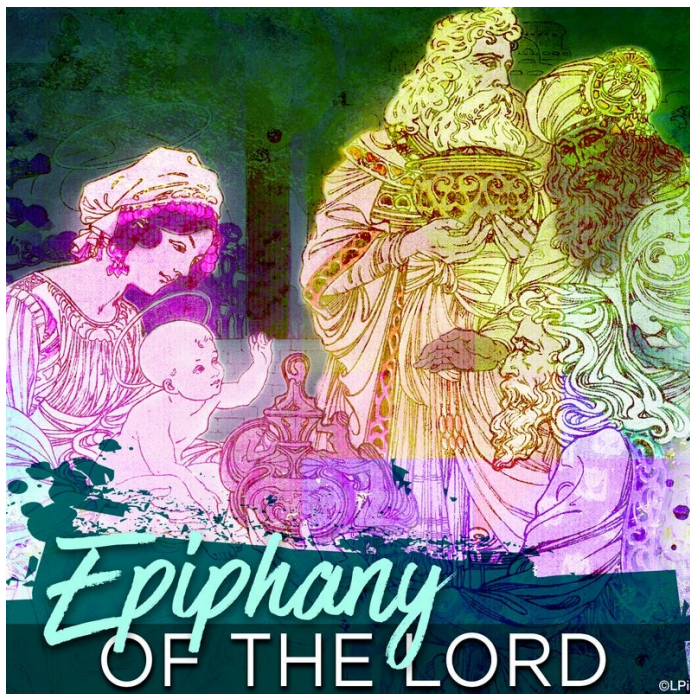

The Light of the Moon

If you own a television that has been turned on at any point in the last month or so, chances are you've caught at least a scene or two of the 1946 classic film "It's a Wonderful Life."

If you're not familiar with the movie, it follows the life of George Bailey from childhood through adulthood. A dreamer by nature, George has big plans for himself that involve world exploration and adventure — but family and community obligations keep him tethered to the same spot on the map, leading an altogether ordinary life.

One of the most memorable scenes from that movie is of George dancing with his sweetheart Mary while they sing "Buffalo Gals — Won't you come out tonight/And dance by the light of the moon?"

That lyric always catches my ear. Of course, the moon doesn't have any light of its own. All the moon has is the ability to reflect the light that shines upon it.

The same holds for us, doesn't it? Our stewardship is purely a reflection of the grace granted to us by another. "Upon you the LORD shines," writes Isaiah, "and over you appears his glory." Every good action we will ever take begins in the mind of God. The fact that we have the honor of carrying it out on His behalf is a beautiful gift. It is God that makes our ordinary lives extraordinary.

In the end of the movie, George Bailey realizes that he had a far greater life because, instead of being the hero of his own story, he allowed himself to reflect goodness onto others. Remember — the magi didn't chart their own course. They merely followed the star.

Mucha gente no tiene una casa o un departamento donde pueden vivir y dormir, donde pueden bañarse, vestirse y comer. Otras no pueden conseguir un trabajo. La casa o el departamento son regalos y el trabajo son regalos por los cuales debemos estar agradecidos a Dios.

Piensa en las oportunidades que ha tenido en la vida: una educación, o dones personales de humildad, bondad, compasión, amor, fe, alegría, paz, entendimiento, empatía... Al pensar en todo esto, puede ser que dentro de cada persona va surgiendo un agradecimiento grande. Tantas veces una respuesta a todo esto es un deseo de regalar a otros algo o un compartimiento de regalos recibidos.

¿Qué podemos regalar a otros? Douglas Richards sugirió algunos en su libro de 41 Regalos. Algunos ejemplos son el regalo de optimismo, o de buen consejo, o estar paciente con los problemas de la vida, dar unas sonrisas, el regalo de creer en sus capacidades. También podemos agregar: dar una palabra amable, dar ayuda, asegurar al otro de su oración, el regalo de escuchar con atención, el regalo de perdón; también compartir su fe, esperanza, amor y servicio.

Celebramos el regalo y la gracia que Dios manifestó entre nosotros y dentro de nosotros en Jesucristo. Que estemos agradecidos a Dios que hemos llegado a conocerlo. ¡Que tremendo regalo!

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Matthew 2:1-12

The Magi seek out Jesus and do him homage.

The tradition of giving gifts at Christmas is thought by some to be rooted in the gift giving of the Magi. In many cultures, gifts are not exchanged at Christmas, but rather on the feast of the Epiphany. Whenever you exchange your Christmas gifts, take some time to reflect on this tradition of gift giving at Christmas. Think of the best gift you have received. What was it? What made it special? Was it the gift itself, the thought that went into it, or the person who gave it to you? Read today's Gospel, Matthew 2:1-12. The gifts of the Magi—gold, frankincense, and myrrh—have come to be understood as symbols of Christ's royalty, divinity, and eventual suffering and death. They are special because in giving them, the Magi acknowledge who Jesus was to be: our Savior. We pray that we will

acknowledge Jesus as Savior in all that we do and say. Conclude by singing together "We Three Kings."

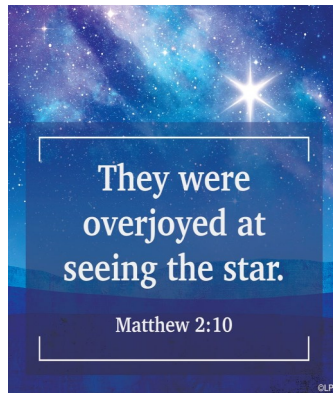
