Fr. Mike's Message...

February 14

As I am sure most of you are aware, tomorrow is February 14, also known as Valentine's day. Of course, Valentine's day is supposed to be a day in which people express their love for each other, supposedly the most romantic day of the year. However, many people don't realize that Valentine's day is named after a martyr of the Catholic Church.

St. Valentine, as far as we know, lived in Rome during the 3rd Century, when the Catholic Church was still a persecuted minority religion in the Roman Empire. Unfortunately, as is the case with many Saints in the early years of the Church, we don't really know much about him. In fact, most of the stories around him are legends, which may or may not have happened. One legend is that he was a Priest who was secretly marrying Christian couples, as well as helping Christians who were being persecuted. Another version of the legend is that he was marrying couples so that the men didn't have to go to war. Another legend says that he was imprisoned for not sacrificing to pagan gods. During his imprisonment, he healed a young woman of blindness and left her a note saying, "your Valentine". The one thing that is agreed upon is that he was martyred on February 14, though even the year is disputed.

With so much dispute as to the life of St. Valentine, even the fact that there is some evidence that what little we know of St. Valentine is actually an amalgamation of multiple people, maybe all named Valentine, the Church decided to remove St. Valentine from the Universal Calendar when they revised the calendar 50 years ago. Now, on February 14, we celebrate the Feast day of Sts. Cyril and Methodius. While Cyril and Methodius don't have the same legends around them as St. Valentine does, we actually know much more about the lives of these two, and their lives were fascinating. Cyril and Methodius were brothers who lived in the middle of the 9th Century. Both men became Monks, and Methodius was eventually consecrated a bishop. These saints are probably most famous for developing a new alphabet, known as the Cyrillic alphabet (named after Cyril). The Cyrillic alphabet is the alphabet used by many Slavic nations, including Russia. They translated the liturgy, as well as the scriptures and other books, into this alphabet, which would be used by the Slavic people. Using a language and alphabet more suitable for the Slavic people than Latin, the two brothers spent a large chunk of their life spreading the gospel to Eastern Europe. Though younger, St. Cyril was in poor health for a long time, and died on February 14, 869 AD. St. Methodius continued his missionary work for another 16 years, eventually dying on April 6, 884 AD. As their lives and their work were so closely related, we celebrate their feast day together on February 14.

Whether you celebrate St. Valentine or Sts. Cyril and Methodius on February 14, there is no debate that this day is an important one, not just for lovers, but for the whole Church. St. Valentine gave his life for the good of all Christians. Sts. Cyril and Methodius spent their lives spreading the Gospel all over Eastern Europe, and the Church in the East owes so much to them. These saints are a reminder of the beautiful, rich history of all the wonderful saints in the Catholic Church.

Family Connection

Gospel Reading: Luke 6:17,20-26 Jesus teaches the crowd the way to happiness.

Today's Gospel offers a contrast to many of the messages we hear in our society today. If we were to accept uncritically the "get ahead" messages of our culture, we would think that happiness means having money, being successful, and having many possessions. In this way, we are not unlike the people who heard Jesus teach on the day that he taught the Beatitudes. They too associated happiness with possessions and success. The report of the Beatitudes in Luke's Gospel, however, takes things one step further. Not only will we not find happiness through the "get ahead" messages of the world, but relying upon these messages will cause us harm. The warnings spoken are particularly Challenging because they suggest that our way of life must change if we are to gain the lasting happiness of eternal life.

Talk together as a family about what society tells us makes a person successful. Make a list of the traits that you associate with a successful person. Then read together today's Gospel, Luke 6:17,20-26. Reflect on Jesus' description of blessedness in the Kingdom of God. Then consider the warnings. Why are these surprising and Challenging? What, then, is the measure of success in the Kingdom of God? Together write prayers of petition based on your discussion. Pray these prayers together, asking God to help your family seek the blessings of the Kingdom of God.
