#### Fr. Mike's Message...

## Feast of St. Patrick

Of all the Saint feast days on the calendar, there is one that might actually be more celebrated in secular society than in the Church. That saint is St. Patrick. Many of the big cities in the United States even have large St. Patrick's day parades or celebrations. It is a great day of partying for many, and a celebration of all things Irish, although unfortunately the connection with the actual saint and our faith has greatly been lost. My guess is that many who celebrate St. Patrick's day probably don't know that much about the Saint himself, which is a shame, as he led a fascinating, faith-filled life.

St. Patrick lived in the early part of the 5<sup>th</sup> Century, though was not originally from Ireland. He was born in Roman-controlled Britain, possibly in Scotland. When he was a teenager, he was captured by Irish pirates and taken to Ireland, where he was forced into slavery for 6 years. In his early twenties he escaped from his captors, and he fled Catholic Charities of Wayne County: Deacon Peter S. Dohr, hundreds of miles to the coast, where he then was able to board a ship back to Britain. After being reunited with his family, he began to study Christianity with a deep fervor.

Eventually, St. Patrick went to France to study theology, and he was ordained a Priest. The Bishop who ordained him, St. Germain, would later take St. Patrick under his wing, and he became a missionary companion of St. Germain's, on their mission to Britain to combat some of the heresies that had arisen there. All the while, however, St. Patrick felt the call to return to Ireland. In his writings, he talked about having visions of children near the Western sea, asking him to come back to the country.

After prompting from St. Germain, Pope Celestine I entrusted to St. Patrick the mission of going to Ireland to convert the country. At the time, Ireland was a pagan land controlled by the Druids. After being consecrated a Bishop, St. Patrick was sent to evangelize the Irish people. He arrived in Ireland in 433 AD. There are a few legends surrounding his mission, many of them deal with his interactions with the Druid chieftains, each of whom was unable to stop or harm St. Patrick in any way. Over the next few decades, the people of Ireland were slowly converted to Christianity, and Churches would be built all over the country. After half a lifetime of evangelization, St. Patrick died on March 17, 461 AD.

St. Patrick was a fascinating saint for many different reasons. From a slave, to a refugee, to a cleric, to a missionary, St. Patrick's life was filled with incredible moments, moments that he always attributed to Divine Providence. If you are interested in learning more about his experiences, I would encourage you to read Confessions, St. Patrick's own writings about his life and reflections on both his ministry and his relationship to the Lord. In this Lenten season, St. Patrick is a perfect reminder of how both prayer and faith have the power to change the world.

# Oración en Este Tiempo de Cuaresma

Por tradición se dice que hay tres cosas esenciales para hacer durante la Cuaresma para acercarte más a Dios y vivir como un cristiano: oración, ayuno y limosna. Miremos la primera cosa: oración. Quizás vas a decir que, por supuesto tú oras, quizás cada día o una o dos veces por semana o por mes. Pregúntate si has llegado a tener una relación con Jesucristo por medio de tu oración. ¿Basta hablar con Él una vez por mes o por semana? ¿Realmente tienes una relación íntima con Jesucristo? Si tienes una amiga o un amigo, ¿cuántas veces estás en comunicación con ella o él? Al principio quizás una vez por mes, pero para conocerlo más, tienes que estar en comunicación mas frecuentemente. También con Dios Jesucristo.

La oración no es solamente rezar unos rezos rápidamente y contar eso como oración. Hay que ser personal en tu oración, hablando de tus deseos, esperanzas, tus dudas, tus ambiciones, tus angustias, los gozos, fallas, fracasos, tus planes, tu necesidad de ayuda de cómo seguir adelante, de qué dejar atrás, de qué hacer con una relación, de tu amor de Jesucristo, el deseo de tener a Cristo en todo lo que haces... Puedes escribir a Cristo, cantarle, escribirle un poema, expresar la alegría que sientes al pensar en Él por medio de los artes. Por supuesto hay otras maneras de expresar su amor de Cristo: bailar o caminar con Cristo, cantarle, tocarle un instrumento, o dejar la música hablarte de Cristo. Deja a Cristo entrarte durante todo el día, no solamente al levantarte o acostarte. Nuestro Dios está con nosotros todo el día, toda la semana, todo el mes y el año y espero durante todas nuestras vidas.

Desde el Concilio Vaticano II la Iglesia ha puesto más énfasis en conocer las Sagradas Escrituras, leerlas, estudiarlas, y especialmente orar por medio de ellas. Después de leer un trocito de la Biblia, piensa en lo que has leído, qué te enseña en tu propia vida de cómo actuar. Este tipo de oración no debe ser solo de la cabeza. Tiene que expresar a Dios desde el corazón tus sentimientos, tus afectos de alabanza, amor, confianza, agradecimiento, angustias, expresiones de tus necesidades, tus debilidades, tu contrición, la necesidad de la ayuda del Espíritu Santo. Puedes pedir a Jesucristo por situaciones difíciles o qué hacer en relaciones difíciles... Intenta hacer algunas resoluciones cortas y posibles y a la vez pidiendo la ayuda de Dios para cumplir con ellas.

He hablado de oración personal, pero es esencial participar en oración comunitaria, por ejemplo, la Misa, el Vía Crucis, un día de oración con otras. Por estar con otras personas en la oracion recibimos más determinación y fuerza. Juntos animamos unas a otras no solamente orar, sino vivir la vida cristiana diariamente y más auténticamente.

## Family Connection

In today's Gospel, the voice from heaven speaks to the disciples saying, "Listen to him." The Transfiguration was a focused moment for the disciples when they heard God speaking to them and experienced Jesus in glory. They most certainly left this focused moment with a new appreciation for the importance of Jesus' words even if they did not yet understand everything that he had taught them. During Lent, we are invited to consider our attentiveness to Jesus and to one another. In the pace and noise that often characterizes family life, how well do we listen to one another? What opportunities do we have for quiet pray-

As you gather as a family, count the number of pieces of equipment in your home that produce sound: televisions, radios, CD players, computers, video games, etc. Observe if sometimes more than one piece of equipment is playing simultaneously and how this might affect communication. Discuss the question: What is it like to try to talk with one another when this equipment is on?

Read aloud today's Gospel, Luke 9:28-36. Consider whether the noise and pace of your family life allows family members opportunities for quiet prayer. During Lent, it may be appropriate for your family to choose a time for quiet in the household by turning off televisions, radios, and CD players. Consider whether your family would like to establish such a time during this Season of Lent and suggest that it might allow you the opportunity to listen more attentively to one another and to find time for quiet prayer. Spend a few such moments as a family, asking God to help you listen well to one another and to Jesus.
