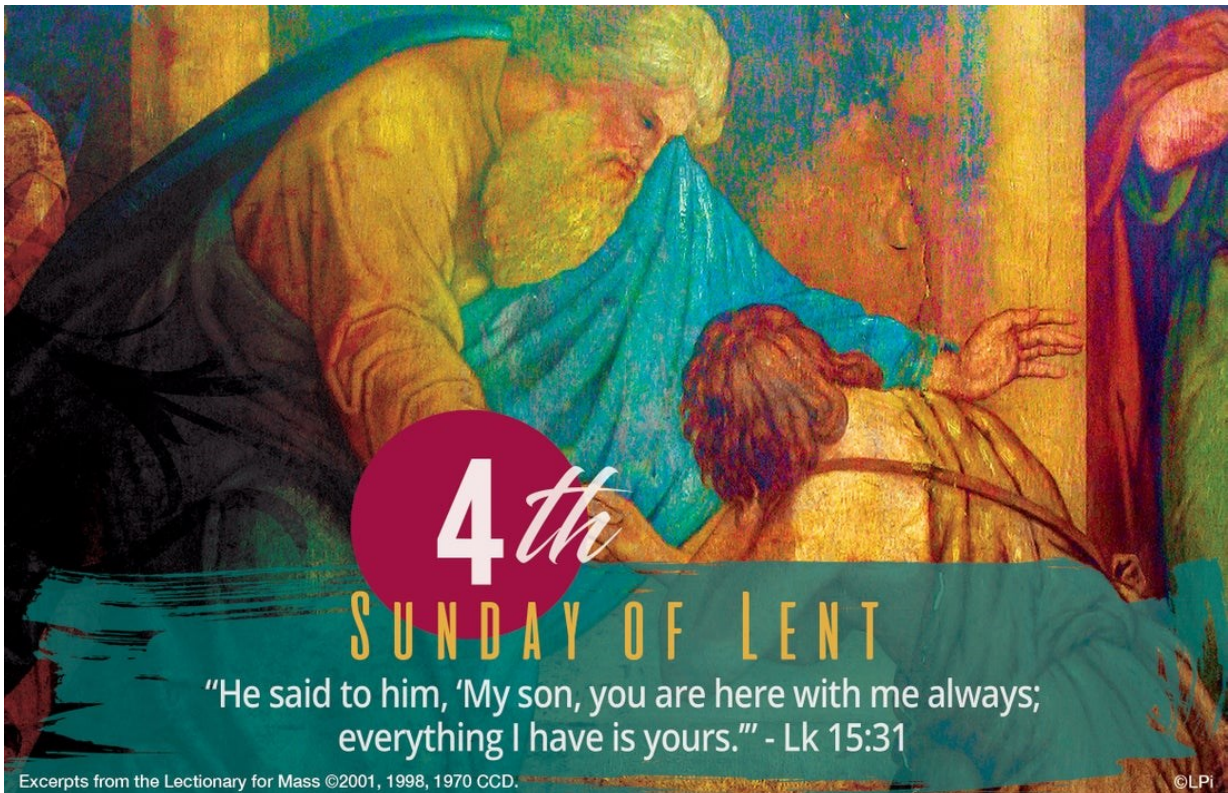

Ayuno en Este Tiempo de Cuaresma

Las últimas semanas he escrito sobre dos de los tres pilares de la Cuaresma: oración y ayuno, y hoy yo iba a escribir sobre el tercer pilar de la Cuaresma: dar limosna. Pero eso es solamente una parte de algo mas grande. La Cuaresma es un tiempo para mirar su vida de amor y de caridad. Cada uno de nosotros recibe el desafío durante este tiempo de cómo vamos a formar una vida de amor, y esa vida de amor debe incluir limosna. ¿Por qué no ayudar a otras personas que están sufriendo por falta de algo material? Si tengamos los medios de ayudar, debemos hacerlo por el amor cristiano.

Es durante este tiempo que estamos intentando conocer al Dios de amor por medio de oración, lectura bíblica y compartir con otras. Queremos responder a Dios con amor. Si estamos diciendo que amamos a Dios quien no podemos ver, ciertamente debemos amar a nuestros hermanos quienes vemos. El ayuno y la abstinencia nos ayudan controlar nuestros apetitos y deseos para cosas materiales. Tenemos que estar alertos a las necesidades de otras; no debemos hacer ayunos y poner a un lado obras de caridad. Si dejamos de comer dulces o de fumar y si tengamos enojo, ¿qué vale si tenemos impaciencia con la otra persona?

Durante el resto de la Cuaresma mira cómo puede ayudar al otro, sea un compañero de trabajo, un vecino, otro estudiante en la escuela o un miembro de la familia. En el trabajo ¿abusamos o nos aprovechamos de otros? ¿Trabajamos lo que debemos o somos perezosos?

Puede ser que usted trata mejor a los de afuera de su casa que a los miembros de su familia. ¿Todos los miembros de su familia hablan entre si? O puede ser que hablan, pero solamente lo necesario. ¿Hay amor en la familia? ¿Los esposos prestan atención una al otro? ¿Toman tiempo con sus hijos? ¿Los jóvenes se quedan en casa para pasar tiempo con su familia? No necesitan salir a cada rato para estar con sus amigos. Es importante tomar interés en sus padres y sus hermanos. A veces los padres no saben que sus hijos tienen dificultades porque no han tenido conversaciones con ellos. La comunicación no es por gritos, malas palabras y gestos. Debe ser por preocupación, gestos positivos, y ayuda dada.

¿Cómo es su corazón? La Cuaresma es un tiempo de empezar un cambio de vida y de abrir su corazón por el amor y con el amor. Estas son algunas preguntas que pueden hacerse: ¿Cómo nos llevamos los miembros de mi familia unos con otros? ¿Hay abuso? ¿El hombre es machista y trata a su esposa como una sierva? ¿Abusa de ella? ¿La esposa explota a su esposo para recibir cosas materiales? ¿Cuántas horas dedica cada semana a su familia, sus hijos? ¿La familia está viviendo de acuerdo con lo que Dios quiere de ella? ¿Hay respeto y amor entre los miembros? Que Dios los acompañe durante este tiempo de Cuaresma.

Family Connection

"Hey, that's not fair!" How many times have we heard this spoken in our family? Family members challenge one another's generosity, operating from the perspective of limited resources. If we have given to one, perhaps there won't be enough for the other. Jesus wants us to understand that this is not how it is with God's mercy and forgiveness. God offers his love to all of us in abundance. The forgiveness of the father in the parable is an image of God's love for us, generous beyond measure in his love for both of his sons. Can we truly believe that God acts this way towards us and accept his mercy without jealousy, knowing that God's love for another does not diminish his love for us? As you gather as a family, talk about the words and phrases you speak to one another when angry. Identify words or phrases that reflect jealousy towards one another. Talk about why we sometimes feel jealousy towards one another. Read aloud today's Gospel, Luke 15:1-3,11-32. Talk about why the older brother is jealous of the younger brother. Identify words that the family members in the parable might say to one another to begin to heal their broken relationships. Make a family commitment to say these types of words and phrases to one another with greater frequency. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.

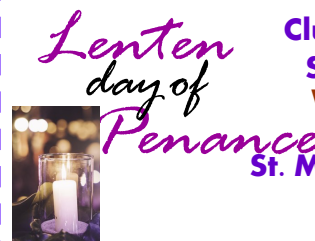
