Dear Parishioners,
Many of you have approached me and asked about the war situation in Europe. Many of you are upset about this war in Ukraine. Please allow me to share a few thoughts about the world, wars and peace. In general, we need to pray for peace and conversion of heart of the aggressor, in this case, Russian leadership. *What*



is the Catholic stance on war? To answer that question, I could tell you about Jesus' actions during the Passion, as recounted in the Gospel of Matthew. At one point, Jesus is arrested in the Garden of Gethsemane by a group bearing swords and clubs. Out of a desire to defend Jesus, one of his disciples takes out a sword and cuts off the ear of a guard. Jesus tells him, "Put your sword away. For those who live by the sword die by the sword." In Luke's Gospel, he then heals the man. Thus, Jesus' final miracle before his Resurrection was one of reconciliation, after someone attacked him. I could tell you about St. Francis of Assisi who, during the Crusades in the 13th century, accompanied the armies of western Europe to Egypt. Francis hoped to speak peacefully with Muslim leaders, even if it meant dying as a martyr. He crossed battle lines and was taken to the sultan, Malek al-Kamil, known as a wise ruler. They recognized in one another their mutual humanity, spoke about God, and after many days of dialogue, the sultan gave Francis an ivory gift, which is today in the Basilica of St. Francis in Assisi. Theirs was a model of not only inter religious dialogue but a dialogue of peace. I could also tell you about St. Paul VI before the United Nations, seven centuries later, in 1965, at the height of the Cold War. "It is enough," Pope Paul said, "to recall that the blood of millions, countless unheard-of sufferings, useless massacres and frightening ruins have sanctioned the agreement that unites you with an oath that ought to change the future history of the world: Never again war, never again war! It is peace, peace, that has to guide the destiny of the nations of all mankind!"

You have the response of Jesus, when surrounded by guards with swords and clubs. You have the response of St. Francis of Assisi, in the middle of the Crusades. And you have the response of Pope Paul VI, at the height of the Cold War. Questions of war are complicated. But the teaching of the Catholic church is clear: We are against war. And the person who best explained this was St. John Paul II. For those who say, "The church doesn't understand war or politics," remember that John Paul lived under both Nazi and Communist regimes in Poland and, during his papacy, dealt with nearly every political leader on the world stage. In this time of conflict, let us ask for the prayers of those who understood war and peace: St. Francis of Assisi, pray for us. St. Paul VI, pray for us. St. John Paul II, pray for us. All holy women and men who have worked for peace, pray for us. And may Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, guide our hearts into the way of peace.

Lo Que Es de Valor

Al final de nuestras vidas, ¿qué podremos decir sobre lo que poseemos de mas valor? ¿Casa? ¿Amistades? ¿Un buen trabajo? ¿Familia? ¿Buena educación? ¿Mucho dinero? ¿Cómo van a recordarnos?

Hablamos de la Cuaresma como un tiempo para cambiarnos, de convertirnos y durante este tiempo algunas personas hacen sacrificios para poder controlar sus apetitos o luchar contra adicciones, o dan limosna a los necesitados. En el evangelio de hoy los escribas y fariseos estaban exigiendo que otras vivieran una vida correcta según la ley. La mujer cometió adulterio, pero según la ley solo la mujer merecía el castigo: estar apedreada a la muerte. Los escribas y fariseos iban a cumplir con su deber, sin pensar en las maneras por las cuales ellos mismos no seguían la ley de Dios. Ah, no podemos escondernos en el pecado de otros y excusar los nuestros por considerar que el pecado del otro es más grave que el nuestro. Jesús los retó por: "Aquel de ustedes que no tenga pecado, que le tire la primera piedra." Ellos todos dejaron a Jesús con la mujer.

A veces somos nosotros que criticamos al otro por lo que ha hecho cuando nosotros somos pecadores también. Jesús no condena a la mujer, pero deja a ella saber que él sabe que ella ha pecado, pero la perdona: "Vete y ya no vuelvas a pecar." ¿Por cuántos días o meses piensan que la mujer no pecó? Quizás meses o aun años porque ella había estado tan cerca a la muerte. Pero aun más importante es que ella encontró al Amor, Jesucristo, y fue El que la perdonó; fue El que estaba compasivo y misericordioso. Quizás ella vio lo muy especial en El.

Hay un proceso de conversión y renovación; no es como la conversión de Pablo cuando él encontró a Jesucristo en el camino a Damasco. Después de ese primer encuentro Pablo llegó cada día a conocer a Jesucristo un poco más profundamente. Lo que para él era de valor: su educación y entrenamiento sobre las leyes de los judíos, ahora después de conocer a Jesucristo no tenían valor; fue como basura. "Nada vale la pena en comparación con el bien supremo, que consiste en conocer a Cristo Jesús."

Sí, la meta de la Cuaresma es una conversión—una conversión a Jesucristo, una renovación de nuestra relación con Cristo Jesús. Durante el año nos ponemos flojos y dejamos nuestras buenas intenciones atrás y ponemos las cosas ante el bien supremo—conocer a Jesucristo. Al final de la vida ¿otras van a pensar cuan cerca aparece que hemos estado a Cristo y cómo esta cercanía a Cristo nos ayudó a amar a los demás? *Hermana Kay*
