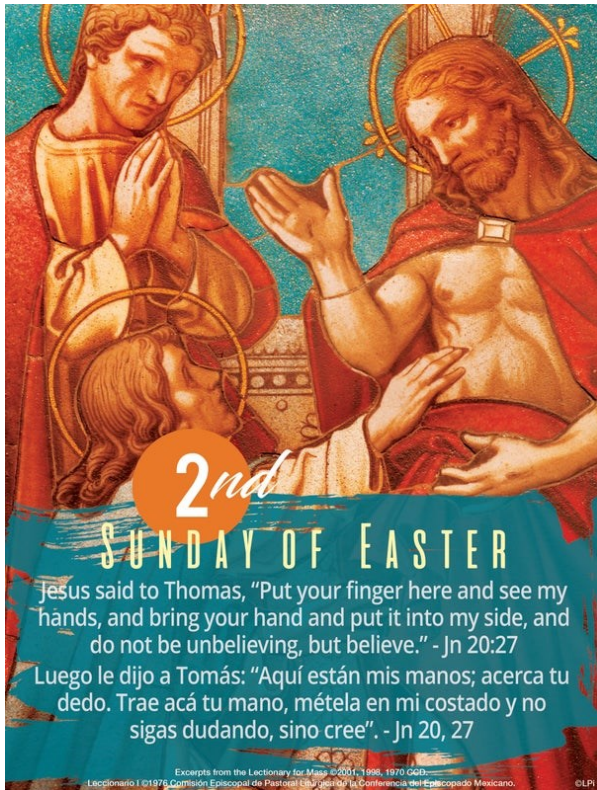

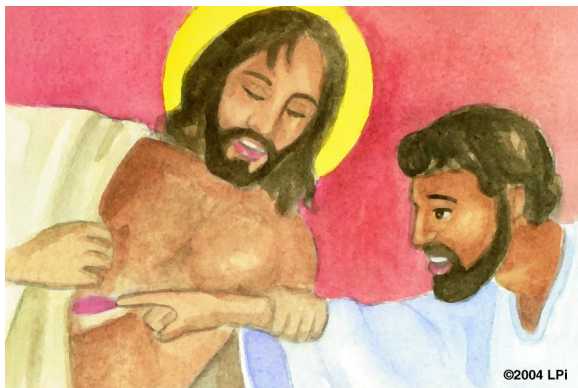

**La Misericordia de Dios Se Muestra de Muchas Maneras**

Rezamos el salmo 117 hoy: "Diga la casa de Israel: eterna es su  
misericordia. Diga la casa de Aaron: eterna es su misericordia.  
Digan los fieles del Señor: eterna es su misericordia." Todos  
respondemos:

"Den gracias al Señor porque es bueno, porque es eterna su mi-  
sericordia."

Reconocemos el amor de Dios por reconocer las muchas veces  
en el Antiguo Testamento cuando Dios había mostrado su mise-  
ricordia a su pueblo en la tierra. En el tiempo presente Dios nos  
muestra esa misma misericordia amorosa. Una y otra vez Dios  
muestra misericordia al perdonar. En nuestro tiempo tan lim-  
pios, libres y felices nos sentimos después de celebrar el sacra-  
mento de Reconciliación.

Igualmente, la práctica de la misericordia requiere que noso-  
tros perdonemos a los que nos han ofendido y herido. Significa  
que nosotros los perdonamos y no exigimos que, según la justi-  
cia humana, ellos restauran lo que han destruido. Jesús nos pidió  
ser misericordiosos como su Padre es misericordioso. Sin la  
misericordia, perdón y reconciliación no habrá sanación. Puede  
ser que una nación, institución, un grupo o un individuo nos ha  
atacado o abusado. Tenemos que actuar como personas maduras  
y soltar nuestras acusaciones y pensamientos contra otros y ac-  
tuar misericordiosamente.

Yo recuerdo algo que aprendí sobre la cualidad de la miseri-  
cordia cuando en enseñanza media yo estaba estudiando *El Co-  
merciante de Venecia* escrito por Shakespeare.

*"La cualidad de la misericordia no se tensa.*

*Cae como la suave lluvia del cielo*

*Sobre el lugar de abajo. Es dos veces bendito:*

*Bendice al que da y al que toma....*

*Misericordia es un atributo de Dios mismo;*

*Y el poder terrenal entonces se muestra como el de Dios*

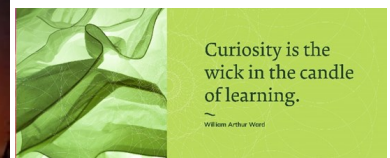
*Cuando la misericordia sazona la justicia."*

Como Dios debemos moderar la justicia con la misericordia. No  
es algo fácil para hacer, pero es tan necesario para estar en paz  
con otros y nosotros mismos.

Sí, tenemos que aprender de nuestro gran maestro Dios. Pa-  
dre John Hardon define la misericordia como la disposición de  
ser bondadoso al otro o perdonando al otro. Hay acción en esto;  
la persona quiere ayudar al otro que tiene una necesidad, espe-  
cialmente la necesidad de perdón o reconciliación. Aprendamos  
de Dios. Hoy es la fiesta de la Divina Misericordia que fue  
anunciado por el Papa Juan Pablo II el 30 de abril del 2000 du-  
rante la canonización de Sor Faustina Kowalska. El papa desig-  
nó el segundo domingo de Pascua como el domingo de la divina  
misericordia. El decreto vaticano aclaró que el segundo domingo  
de pascua seguía con las mismas lecturas del misal romano.

### Family Connection

Our family life would no doubt be enhanced if we were able to transform Jesus' greeting into a central feature in our family's interactions. After his Resurrection, "Peace be with you" is the first thing that Jesus says to his disciples. This could be our daily family prayer for one another. In today's Gospel, we also hear that Jesus next breathed on his disciples and gave them the gift of the Holy Spirit. In Baptism, each of us has received the gift of the Holy Spirit as well as the forgiveness of sins. Peace is a fruit of the Holy Spirit. Our Baptism, then, invites us to share in the peace that Christ gave to his disciples and commissions us to share that peace of Christ by generously forgiving others as Jesus taught. As you gather as a family, think about gifts that you might receive together such as a coloring book and crayons, a book and bookmark, or an electronic item and batteries. Observe that Jesus also paired two gifts together in today's Gospel. Read aloud this Sunday's Gospel, John 20:19-31. Discuss the two gifts Jesus gave to his disciples: peace and the Holy Spirit. Ask: **What were the disciples to do with these gifts?** (They were sent as Jesus was sent by the Father to forgive sins.) Recall that we have each received Jesus' gift of the Holy Spirit at our Baptism and that peace is a fruit of the Holy Spirit. Observe that since we also have received these gifts from Christ, we are also sent to be people who forgive others as Jesus taught. Determine an action that your family can do to share peace and forgiveness with one another. Pray together the Prayer to the Holy Spirit or the Peace Prayer of St. Francis.

*Prayer of St. Francis*  
Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:  
where there is hatred, let me sow love;  
where there is injury, pardon;  
where there is doubt, faith;  
where there is despair, hope;  
where there is darkness, light;  
where there is sadness, joy.  
O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek  
to be consoled as to console,  
to be understood as to understand,  
to be loved as to love.  
For it is in giving that we receive,  
it is in pardoning that we are pardoned,  
and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.  
Amen.
