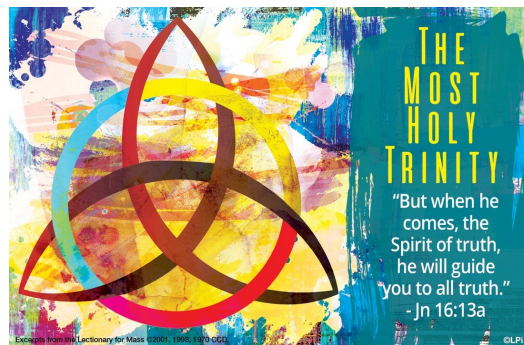

Corpus Christi

With Pentecost behind us, the Church moves out of Easter Season and into Ordinary Time for the rest of the Summer and Fall. However, that does not mean that our celebrations come to an end. This weekend, the Church celebrates Trinity Sunday, when we recognize and honor the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The fact that God is one nature in three persons might seem crazy to some, but for us, it is the very heart of our Christian faith.

Next weekend, the celebrations continue. The week after Trinity Sunday every year, the Church celebrates the Feast of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, more commonly known as Corpus Christi. Now, of course, we celebrate the Eucharist every time we celebrate the Mass. But the reason why we have this feast day is to mark an entire Mass dedicated to the Eucharist itself, where even the Scripture readings and Mass prayers reflect on the Institution of the Eucharist by Christ. Now, we do celebrate the Institution of the Eucharist on Holy Thursday, but having a feast day for the Eucharist outside of Holy Week and the Triduum allows us to celebrate the Mystery fully in a spirit of joy.

The origin of the feast day comes from St. Juliana of Liege. St. Juliana was a nun who lived in the 13th Century. As a child, she has been orphaned and was raised by the same group of nuns whom she would join when she got older. When she was 16, St. Juliana began having the same vision multiple times. In her vision, she saw a full moon with a dark spot or stripe in the middle of it. Over time, she came to understand that the brightness of the moon represented the Church, but the dark spot represented the lack of a feast day dedicated to the Holy Eucharist. St. Juliana kept this vision secret for many years before revealing it to a few trusted friends and spiritual advisors. Eventually, after her death in 1258, Pope Urban IV instituted the Feast of Corpus Christi on the Universal Calendar of the Church in 1264.

Adoration of the Eucharist is of vital importance to the Church. This has always been the case, but it is especially true in the modern day. That is why, for the next three years, the Bishops of America have issued what is being called the "Eucharistic Revival". Parishes and Dioceses are being asked to foster devotion and adoration to the Eucharist with different programs and events over these years, beginning with Corpus Christi. On the Feast of Corpus Christi this year, the Bishop is going to be celebrating Mass in Corpus Christi Church at 10 am, with a Eucharistic Procession after Mass, and anyone who would like to go is invited. I would also ask everyone to keep an eye out for some of the different things that we will be doing as a parish over the upcoming months and years for the Eucharistic Revival. May we continue to keep Christ at the center of our life, and may we always remember to adore and worship Him in the Blessed Sacrament, the Most Holy Eucharist

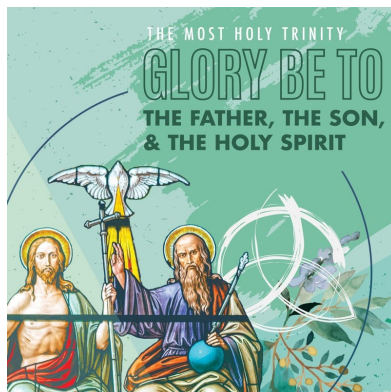

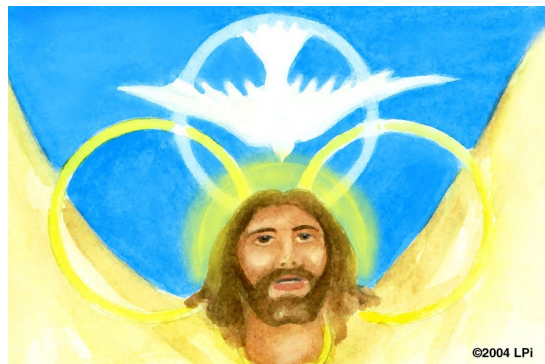
