
On July 4th, we celebrate this country's Independence Day. It is a 3-day weekend filled with family barbecues, hot dogs, apple pie, picnics and outdoor activities. There are patriotic parades, flags flying and fireworks. This day represents the birth of the United States of America as an independent nation. Americans are freedom loving people who value their independence as individuals as well as for the country. Liberty, freedom and justice are the cornerstones of our democracy. They were spelled out in the Declaration of Independence. We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. In the midst of all the celebrations it is important to reflect on one of the words in that statement. That word is "endowed". It means gifted. All of these rights that we refer to have been gifted to us. The statement continues identifying the source of these gifts, "by their Creator". Therefore along with celebrating independence as a nation there should also be recognition of where this independence comes from. Our Independence is rooted in our Dependence on God. All that we have comes from God. **Every Sunday our liturgies emphasize this dependence on God.** In the Liturgy of the Word we are reminded of how God worked in the lives of the Israelites and how much they depended on Him. The Psalm tells us "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want". **We depend on God for our salvation.** The Gospel of Matthew tells us to "not be anxious about your life, what you shall eat or what you shall drink, nor about your body, what you shall put on... Look at the birds of the air: they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them." In the Prayers of the Faithful we present our needs and petitions to God knowing how dependent we are on Him. In the Lord's Prayer we are reminded that God is our provider when we pray: "Give us this day our daily bread." The word Eucharist means thanksgiving. Each Sunday when we participate in the celebration of Mass, we acknowledge our dependence on God and give Him thanks for all our blessings. One day a year we celebrate our country's independence. **Each Sunday we celebrate our dependence on God.** Each Sunday is Independence Day. Have a happy and safe Fourth of July weekend and remember to always pray for our military personnel, past and present. Fr. Felicjan

Next week, July 10th we will have the collection for the Church in Central and Eastern Europe. This collection will help those living in countries formerly under communist rule. Please be generous with your donation.





SUMMER SCHEDULE

Que Seamos Instrumentos de la Paz de Dios

¿Qué viene a la mente primero para responder a la pregunta: "Que es la paz?" Una calma después de algo violento. Quizás la paz lograda por un tratado, un acuerdo o pacto que concuerda entre los gobernantes para poner fin a una guerra. La paz viene siendo como un estado de calma o serenidad o un momento de felicidad o bienestar personal o grupal. También, consiste en ser **una persona solidaria**, quien trata bien a las personas, no hace daño al prójimo, respeta la opinión de las otras personas, y acepta las diferencias. Hay un estado de armonía, concordia y de fraternidad; no dejan lugar a cualquier enemistad.

¿Qué es la paz? La paz es el valor que tienen los seres humanos capaces de entender y escuchar a los demás, es aceptar al prójimo tal cual es, es aprender a resolver las dificultades por medio de la conversación, evitando la violencia. Es un valor que puede adquirir cada ser humano; se refiere a ese poder de comprender al prójimo, sin sentirse afectado; por ejemplo, en casa no haya gritos, críticas, quejas, mentiras, debe haber aceptación, diálogo, tolerancia y apoyo mutuo.

Paz interior: Es la que se consigue cuando la persona decide fortalecerla, no llega por sí sola, se debe romper con algunos obstáculos personales como el miedo, pero esto es algo que se puede ir trabajando aplicando o ejercitando actividades como la meditación u oración que nos ayuda tener comprensión, buena conciencia y bienestar interior. Las personas que la poseen expresan calma y tranquilidad, rara vez pelean con otras por algo, estos desarrollan la capacidad de evadir las ansiedades, la envidia, el odio y el rencor, lo que hace posible tener una actitud positiva que atrae y hace sentir bienestar. Oh, Señor, hazme un instrumento de tu paz.

Paz externa: Se adquiere siempre y cuando las necesidades de la sociedad sean satisfechas, en este caso son respetados los derechos humanos; no hay enfrentamientos externos que afecten a las personas y que viven en armonía.

Paz social: Se presenta cuando hay una convivencia o relación entre dos o más sociedades sin conflictos y bajo buenos tratos. Es cuando se pueden lograr los objetivos trazados en la sociedad de forma adecuada y llevadera.

Paz religiosa y positiva: Se obtiene cuando el espíritu se eleva. Para algunas personas este tipo de paz se refiere a algo simulado y para otros un medio para lograr la vida eterna. Dios está en el medio de su vida.

Read aloud Luke 10:1-12,17-20. Talk about why it was important that Jesus sent his disciples out in pairs. Discuss ways that your family can work more closely together to support one another and to make the household run more smoothly. Pray for the strength to overcome the temptation to be too individualistic and to recognize the need for working together as a family.


