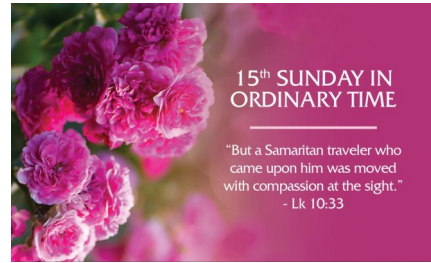

The Gospel of Life

Back on June 24, the Nativity of John the Baptist and the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Supreme Court overturned the Roe vs. Wade decision from 1973. The Roe vs. Wade Court decision allowed abortions to be performed without restrictions in all states in the US. In overturning Roe vs. Wade, this decision, Dobbs vs. Jackson, has not outlawed abortions across the country, but has rather allowed each state to make the determination as to whether or not they will allow abortions and what restrictions, if any, they will impose on abortion.

Over the last several decades, millions of men and women across the country have fought extremely hard to get us to this point. I'm sure that many of you are aware that over 60 million children have been killed via abortion over the last half century. The sheer number of lives lost during that time is almost impossible to wrap your head around. To those who have worked behind the scenes, to those who have protested, prayed, fasted, and done works of penance, know that your efforts have not been in vain. While this is a landmark step in the Right to Life movement, it is by no means the end of the road. In fact, now the road gets even harder. In promoting the Gospel of Life, our work and our mission has always been to convert hearts, not just change policy. As we have seen over the days and weeks since the decision, the policy change has not led to conversion of hearts. Rather, the hearts of many seem to be even more hardened than before.

We have already seen Churches as well as other pro-life institutions targeted in different ways. These will most likely continue. As unfortunate as that is, we cannot let it deter us from our mission, but we also cannot let it change who we are. As I mentioned in my homily a couple weeks ago, this is not a time to seek revenge or retribution. We must meet any injury with love, compassion, and humility.

Perhaps the most important piece going forward is in regard to how we answer what might be the biggest criticism of the pro-life movement: that we care about the baby in the womb, but we don't do anything to help when the child is born. This, of course, is not true in the slightest, as our churches work with many pro-life family care centers to help parents get the care they need, and many of our parishioners work with these families as well. That being said, we need to redouble our efforts in this regard; we need to continue to support those who need help in both carrying a child and raising a child. We also need to continue to support and assist those who are trying to heal after having an abortion, showing them the same love and compassion that Christ always showed to those to whom he ministered.

The road to conversion of hearts is going to be very long and arduous; trying to undo 50 years of ingrained thought and belief will not happen overnight. Only through prayer and service will we have any hope in seeing that the June 24 decision is really a change in the tide, and not merely a blip on the radar.

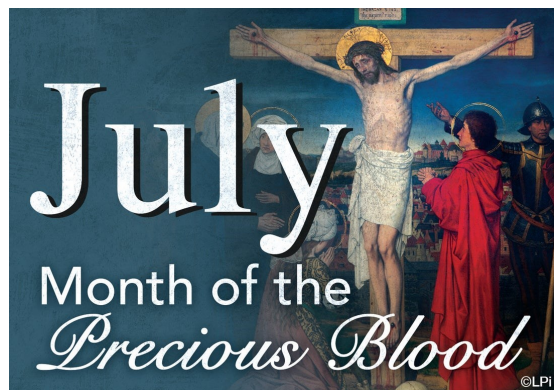

Avivamiento Eucarístico NACIONAL

En estas últimas semanas he escrito sobre la Eucaristía y su importancia en nuestra fe y vida como católicos. Con la fiesta del Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo por todo el mundo se empezó el Avivamiento Eucarístico que durará por tres años, **empezando primero en cada diócesis** (19 junio 2022 – 11 de junio 2023). El Obispo Matano empezó con una Misa y procesión en las calles en Rochester. Durante este **primer año** el personal diocesano, los obispos y los sacerdotes están invitados a "un renovado encuentro personal con Jesucristo", en particular con el poder transformador y la misericordia de Jesús en la Sagrada Eucaristía. Cada diócesis ofrecerá eventos que animen a los fieles a crecer en su comprensión y devoción a Cristo en la Eucaristía, complementados por la formación en línea y recursos que elevarán a Misioneros Eucarísticos en todos los niveles de la Iglesia.

El **segundo año** (11 de junio 2023 – 17 de julio 2024), el **año parroquial**, será una oportunidad para que las parroquias participen mas profundamente en el Avivamiento a través de adoración eucarística, grupos pequeños y familias.

El **tercer año**, el **año de la misión** o envío, habrá un Congreso Eucarístico Nacional (17-21 de julio 2024) en Indianapolis, Indiana donde muchos pueden comprometer de nuevo sus corazones a la Eucaristía.

El **plan** para el Avivamiento incluye **cinco pilares**:

***Fomentar el encuentro con Jesús** a través del anuncio predicado sobre Cristo el Salvador y experiencias de devoción eucarística.

***Contemplar y proclamar la doctrina de la presencia real de Jesús** en la Eucaristía a través de la verdad de la enseñanza de la iglesia, la belleza del culto de la iglesia y la bondad de una vida de servicio.

***Potenciar la creatividad de base al asociarse** con movimientos, apostolados, instituciones educativas y parroquias.

***Llegar a la unidad más pequeña**: parroquia, grupos pequeños y familias.

***Abrazar y aprender** de las **diversas y ricas tradiciones eucarísticas interculturales**.

Family Connection

Families rely on selfless love. Parents show love for their children not just when it's convenient, but whenever their children's needs must be met. Imagine if the members of a family were concerned only with their own needs. How quickly things would fall apart!

In the story of the Good Samaritan, we learn about someone who went out of his way to care for the needs of another. He recognized the victim as his brother and accepted responsibility for him. As a family, talk about the responsibilities of each member of the family. Share how you, as parents, care for the needs of everyone in the family even when it's inconvenient. Ask your children to share times when they did chores and helped the family even when it was not convenient.

Read aloud this Sunday's Gospel, Luke 10:25-37. Talk about how the Samaritan went out of his way to care for the needs of the victim. Make a commitment as a family to follow the example of the Good Samaritan. Explain that the more you learn to accept responsibility for each other's needs at home, the more you'll be able to accept responsibility for the needs of others in the world.

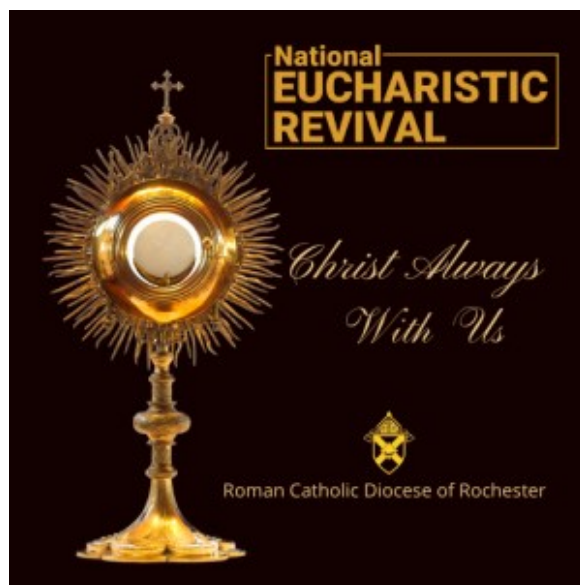
