Fr. Mike's Message...

Eucharistic Revival

Back on June 19, we as a Church celebrated the Feast of Corpus Christi, where we recognize the great importance of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Along with the Feast of Corpus Christi, the Church in the United States also began our Eucharistic Revival, a three-year sojourn in which we as a Church are trying to rekindle faith and devotion to the Blessed Sacrament. Over the next three years, both on a Diocesan and Parish level, there will be multiple opportunities to both learn about and re-devote ourselves to the Eucharist.

Some of you might remember the pew report done by Georgetown back in 2019. The study polled thousands of Catholics (not fallen away Catholics, but people who still identified as Catholic), asking them whether or not they believed in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. An overwhelming majority (almost 70 percent) believed that the Eucharist was just a symbol, or a representation, of Jesus Christ, but not actually the real Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. This is a very unfortunate trend that has been building for many years. One of my hopes for this Eucharistic Revival is to reinforce the understanding that the Eucharist remains at the center of our faith precisely because it is the actual Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Christ promised us that he would remain with us until the end of time as our "Emmanuel" ("God with us"). And thus, he does remain with us, present in every Tabernacle all over the world.

All of our Parishes currently have opportunities for Eucharistic Adoration (see the bulletin for times), and I hope that more people will continue to take those opportunities to spend time in prayer with the Lord. However, our first region-wide program during this Eucharistic Revival will be a large-scale Eucharistic Adoration, and will take place next month. All of the parishes in the Central region of the Diocese will participate in a 40 hours devotion. The 40 hours devotion is an ancient devotional in which the Blessed Sacrament is exposed for adoration for 40 consecutive hours. The adoration is traditionally 40 hours because that is about the amount of time from Jesus' death on the Cross to the Resurrection.

What we have decided to do as a region is to split the 40 hours of adoration among our 10 parishes. During the second week of September, each of the Parishes will offer an opportunity for parishioners to adore the Eucharist for about 4 hours. Therefore, each of the parishes in our cluster will offer 4 hours of adoration. There is a schedule inside the bulletin this week. We chose that week of September because on Wednesday of that week (September 14), we will be celebrating the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. Christ offered himself on the Cross for our salvation, and we remember and reflect on that sacrifice in our adoration before the Blessed Sacrament.

María, Llevado al Cielo

El lunes, 15 de agosto, celebramos la fiesta de la Asunción de María al cielo. Me acuerdo hace años cuando en una iglesia vi la imagen de la dormición de María. Yo tenía que investigar el sentido de su dormición. Esta tradición de pensar en María durmiendo después de su muerte puso importancia en el papel de María en la historia de salvación. En el siglo VI había una fiesta de la dormición de María. Muchos no querían pensar en María después de su muerte, siendo como cualquier otra persona, sepultada y podrida. Solamente estaba durmiendo, esperando el día de su resurrección. Pero, al extenderse la práctica de esto en el occidente, pusieron énfasis en la resurrección de María y la glorificación tanto de su alma como de su cuerpo.

Más de setenta años atrás el Papa Pio XII en 1950 declaró un dogma oficial de la Iglesia Católica, la Asunción de María. Aunque no se encuentra en la biblia algo de la Asunción de María, la doctrina enseña que al terminar "el curso de su vida en la tierra, fue asunta en cuerpo y alma a la gloria celestial y enaltecida por Dios como Reina del universo, para ser conformada más plenamente a su Hijo, Señor de los Señores y vencedor del pecado y de la muerte." (la proclamación de la doctrina de la Asunción). Según esta doctrina María Virgen tiene una participación singular en la Resurrección de su Hijo y una anticipación de la resurrección de los demás cristianos.

Al proclamar esta doctrina de la Asunción de María tuvo un paso hacia el por qué se le reza y se le venera a María. Ella es nuestra más poderosa abogada del cielo. Y como está con su cuerpo, está también con su corazón humano, con su corazón maternal. Y porque no solo es la Madre de Jesucristo, sino

Family Connection

Families strive for unity and togetherness. Nobody enjoys occasions when divisions in family life become all too evident. Yet, in this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus says that he has come to bring division and that members of households will be divided.

Talk as a family about the things that you do together to bring about family unity (togetherness), such as sharing meals, going to church together, celebrating special occasions, or sharing family traditions. Explain that all of these things are important and that Jesus wants families to show this kind of love for one another. Point out that this Sunday's Gospel sounds as though Jesus is saying something very different. Tell your children to listen closely as you read aloud Luke 12:49-53.

Explain that sometimes as parents, you have to make decisions that are unpopular with your children. You don't do it to divide the family but because it is the right thing to do. In the short run, such decisions may "divide" children from their parents. In the long run, however, doing the right thing will bring about a deeper unity. Talk to your children about decisions that they have to make that might be unpopular with their friends and how these decisions may divide them from others. Encourage them to pray to the Holy Spirit for the gift of courage (fortitude) so that they may do the right thing even if unpopular. Conclude by praying a spontaneous prayer to the Holy Spirit, asking for the gift of courage (fortitude).

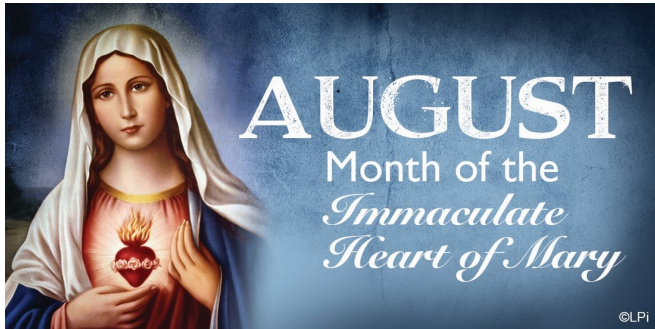
