**Fr. Mike's message...**

**40 Hour Adoration**

In my article last month, I talked about how all the parishes in the central region of the Diocese would kick off the Eucharistic Revival with a 40 hour adoration celebration in September. That week is finally upon us. Throughout this coming week, each of our parishes will be setting aside a 3-4 hour block of time for adoration of the Blessed Sacrament. For our parishes, the schedule is as follows:

**Tuesday, September 13**—St. Mary Magdalen, Wolcott (Blessed Trinity Parish) 4-8 pm

**Wednesday, September 14**—St. Michael Church, Newark (St. Michael Parish) 2-6 pm

**Friday, September 16**—St. Michael Church, Lyons (St. Joseph the Worker Parish) 9-10 am

**Friday, September 16**—St. John Church, Clyde (St. Joseph the Worker Parish) 10 am-12 pm


Please check the bulletin or the flyer (posted at the entrance of the Church) for the adoration times of the other parishes in the region. There are sign up sheets in the Churches for people to pick a time when they will come for adoration during that time.

As I mentioned in my last article, the Eucharist lies at the very center of our Catholic Identity. In fact, the Catechism of the Catholic Church identifies the Eucharist as the source and summit of our faith. In other words, everything flows from the Eucharist and everything leads to the Eucharist. Of course, the most important way we celebrate the Eucharist is through the reception of the Eucharist at Mass. However, another very important way we can celebrate the Eucharist is through adoration. Spending time in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament is a beautiful form of prayer, and a truly enriching experience. I would encourage anyone who can to please sign up for a block of time, or, if you can commit to a particular time, to try and get to one of the Churches and spend some time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. I also ask that you please spread the word to others, to let them know of this wonderful prayer opportunity.

### Importancia de los Abuelos en las Vidas de Sus Nietos y Viceversa

El primer nieto para los abuelos les da una gran alegría. Ese bebé tan pequeño con su alegría y sonrisa entra en la vida de sus abuelos y puede capturar sus corazones y emociones. Si los abuelos viven cerca de sus nietos, la relación entre los nietos y abuelos puede hacerse muy importante en las vidas de ambos abuelos y nietos. Los abuelos pueden ser una fuente no solamente de cariño sino de sabiduría, tranquilidad, estabilidad y seguridad. En un tiempo cuando relaciones matrimoniales no siempre son estables, los abuelos pueden dar la estabilidad que niños necesitan en sus vidas. Los niños gozan la presencia de sus abuelos y es algo mutuo.

A veces los abuelos se meten donde no deben meterse, por ejemplo, en la disciplina o la educación de sus nietos, aun rechazando la manera que los padres disciplinan o educan a sus hijos. Los padres tienen esa responsabilidad, no les corresponde a los abuelos. Siempre tiene que respetar los derechos de los otros, sea su hijo o un desconocido. Los abuelos deben respetar a sus hijos, aunque piensen que ellos se equivocan. Puede ser que los abuelos necesitan aprender métodos nuevos de crianza y educación. Los abuelos deben ser abiertos a ideas nuevas y no pegados siempre al pasado.

Los abuelos pueden compartir algo de su sabiduría con los nietos que en el futuro los nietos pueden apreciar. Los abuelos son libres de la disciplina que los padres tienen que hacer. Con sus experiencias de vida pueden compartir sus consejos, su sentido común y aun saber cómo reírse de las "calamidades" cotidianas—consejos sencillos que pueden ser una ayuda en sus vidas. Por su experiencia de vida ellos pueden valorar lo que merece la pena y lo que no. Ellos muchas veces animan a los nietos a desarrollar su propia creatividad.

Ah, es tan fascinante cuando los abuelos hablan de cómo habían vivido y habían hecho cosas en su tiempo—las historias del pasado. También los abuelos comparten tradiciones, mantienen la unión familiar porque las puertas de su casa y vidas están abiertas. Tan importante es respetar las tradiciones del pasado sobre las cuales están contruidos las tradiciones de hoy.

#### 2022-2023 Faith Formation Year

##### Sacramental Preparation: 1<sup>st</sup> Penance/Communion

Students who hope to receive the sacraments of 1<sup>st</sup> Penance/Communion in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade should be enrolled in 1<sup>st</sup> grade faith formation or in a Catholic School. Students who are in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade this year or older who are ready to begin their journey of preparation to receive these sacraments are invited to join us this year! **A parent orientation to 1<sup>st</sup> Penance/Communion will be Thursday, September 15th, 6:30pm at St. John's in Clyde.** *Sacramental preparation is done in addition to regular faith formation classes.*



Classes for Confirmation Prep have resumed. Classes for 2022 are, *October 1, November 5 and December 3.* Classes start at 9 am and end about 11 am and are held at St. John's in Clyde.

### Family Connection

Read or retell in your own words, the three stories from the Gospel. Ask your children to recall games they play that involve losing or hiding something and then finding it. (Hide and Go Seek, Ghost in the Graveyard, Button, Button, Who's Got the Button?) Talk about how exciting it is to find the person or thing being looked for. Ask your children if they have any memories of losing something special or being lost themselves. Share the stories as well as the fears or feelings. Then tell them that just as you would go to any length to find and bring them home if they were lost, so too would God. That is what Jesus is telling us in the three stories. No matter what we do, no matter how wrong we are, God, our loving father, is always anxious to forgive us and welcome us back home.

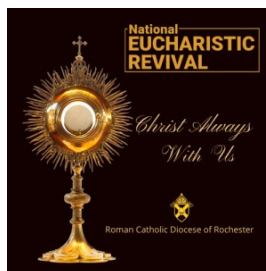

Christ Present in the Church at Prayer While Christ is truly present at Mass in the Word proclaimed, the Eucharistic bread and wine, and in the ministry of the priest, the *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* of Vatican II affirmed that Christ is present "when the Church Prays and sings, for he promised: 'where two of three are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them.'" Mass is not a "spectator sport", in which the priest performs and the people merely watch. The celebration of the Mass - Word and Eucharist - requires the participation of all the faithful because we are "a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people." Through texts in the language of the people, music accessible to that assembly, and a fuller understanding of what we do, we are all called to engage fully each and every Sunday in the holy liturgy.
